OPPOSITION LEADER SCORES GOVERNMENT

Items for which they were not entitled to much credit. First of all there was the Dominion subsidy which was fixed by the population and for which the government could take no credit. Then there was the increased subsidy which had been secured for the province in the last year of the old government and amounted to \$130,000 annually. The old government went out of power after having received only the first semi-annual instalment and in that connection he would like to refer to the statesmanlike proposal which had been made by his hon. colleague from Westmorland, Mr. Robinson, who was then Premier, to lay aside \$30,000 annually of that amount to go to pay off the debt of the province. That hon. gentleman in addressing this House the other day had announced that he was to remain in public life no longer and not only this House, but the country generally would learn with deep regret of Mr. Robinson's intention because public life in this province could not afford to lose such

a man. But since his announcement of his retirement Mr. Robinson, who had before been a weakling in the minds of the hon. gentlemen opposite and their press had now developed into a great man and they had been forced to admit his ability as a statesman.

INCREASED BUSINESS

The fees received at the Provincial Secretary's office had increased at an average of \$3,169 per year during the past four years and there has also been an average annual increase of \$6,206 in the taxes from incorporated companies received as compared with the last four years of the old administration. The government was not entitled to credit for bringing about these increases because they had been brought about by the increased business in the province. The hon. gentlemen opposite however when in opposition used to claim that it was questionable whether these amounts should be collected by the old government and the present hon. Premier had in 1905 referred to them as "new and ingenious ways of taking money out of the pockets of the people." If it was not proper in 1905 it was not proper now and the hon. gentlemen should if they were in earnest release the people who are called upon to

make these payments. The fact that there had been a larger number of private and local bills introduced in the Legislature and from which the government very properly received fees very properly was not a matter for which the government could take credit because they did not go out through the province soliciting people to bring legislation before the House and thus increase the revenue.

SUCCESSION DUTIES.

The succession duties were another source of revenue concerning which the hon. gentlemen opposite when in opposition, used to discuss and one hon. gentleman, the hon. president of the council, had taken it to heart very severely and had declared that the government should not take the money from the widows and orphans and that the hon. gentleman had been very anxious to place himself on record on that occasion as he was in the City of St. John on the temperance question. He (Maxwell) had referred to the five per cent. commission paid to the attorney general as money taken and appropriated and had declared that it was literally robbing the widows and orphans. But where were the crocodile tears and heart burnings of the hon. gentleman of 1905? If it was not right then to collect the succession duties and to pay the attorney general for collecting them, it was not right now and the same criticism which the hon. president of the council had levelled at the Hon. Dr. Pugsley could well be levelled at the Hon. Mr. Hazen, who had been attorney general of this province during the past four years.

FALSE ECONOMY.

The hon. gentlemen took credit unto themselves because they said they had put the Royal Gazette on a paying basis but they had forced the people to advertise in the Royal Gazette by putting legislation on the statute books. The receipts from the Royal Gazette for the four years from 1901 to 1907 amounted to \$4,992, while for the past four years the receipts had amounted to \$8,146, almost double. Did the hon. gentlemen opposite take credit for that? If they did, what about taking money from the widows and orphans in forcing all notices of mortgage sales etc., to be advertised in the Royal Gazette and where was the economy of the hon. gentlemen opposite if, with the receipts of the king's printer practically doubled, they were only then able to make the Royal Gazette pay.

SCHOOL BOOKS.

Hon. members of the government take great credit to themselves because they say the cost of school books have been reduced forty per cent. He had no criticism to offer if a fair and honest decrease had been made but he contended that there was no actual reduction in prices. When the expenses of carrying on the School Book Department were taken into account, the cost of the books, freight, superintendence and other expenses he thought it would be found that the books actually cost as much now as under the old administration. He thought that the school book question should be kept out of politics but the government was using it as a political machine to keep themselves in power. It was impossible for a man to get an appointment as a school book vendor unless he had a certificate of character from the Tory dispensers of political patronage. The auditor general's report showed that not all the vendors are paying their accounts although they are Tory appointees. It would seem that the government was forced to make drafts on some of the vendors and that such drafts were not paid and legal action had to be taken.

The government desired to take credit to themselves because the system of book-keeping had been changed. The old system was good enough if properly carried out, and the new system would be no good unless properly carried out. Among the changes in book-keeping inaugurated by the government was to turn the probate court fees into current revenue. Formerly that was kept in a separate account, with the idea that when the fund had accumulated sufficiently it would be used to pay the probate judges and other expenses and thus relieve the smaller estates. But this government gobbled it up so as to have a larger amount to spend.

Among the new items of revenue is the estimate of \$1,000 from the Jordan Sanitarium. The government did not deserve any credit for establishing that sanitarium since it was the gift of a kind and philanthropic lady, a gift which was highly appreciated. He sincerely hoped that any expenditures made for the up-keep of the institution or the care of the inmates might result in great good and such would not be criticised from the opposition side of the House.
