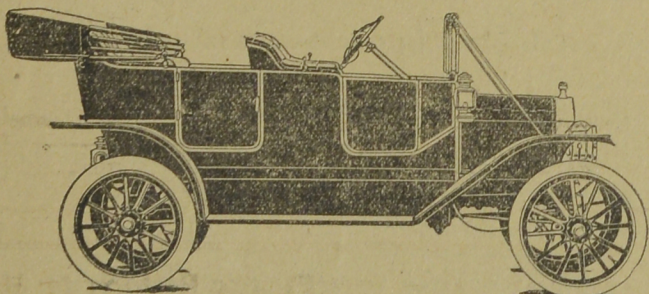

THE HYDRO-ELECTRO BILL
DISCUSSED IN THE HOUSE

*Continued from page one.

HYDRO ELECTRIC.

The House went into committee with Mr. Burchill in the chair and resumed consideration of the bill respecting the New Brunswick Hydro Electric Company.

Mr. Hatheway said the bill did not properly protect the public and particularly the people of the City of St. John.

Mr. Baxter said that as a result of being in communication with the mayor of St. John he intended to propose an amendment to the effect that before the company entered the City of St. John regulations and conditions as well as terms to be approved by the County Council must be adhered to.

Mr. Hatheway said that he had been in communication with Ald. Hayes of St. John, who as a representative of the Treasury Board was of the opinion that the bill should state that the promoters should adhere to the agreement which had been made between the company and the City of St. John last fall. He did not think that the rights should be given away for an indefinite period as stated in this bill when the agreement, as finally settled upon last fall, between the company and the City of St. John, was for a period of fifty years only. Last year the company had said it would expend \$370,000 but the report of the engineer showed that the total cost would be \$130,000. He did not believe that the company would expend \$1,200,000 as they had claimed it was only fair that the House should be given all information as to costs of dams, etc.

The Conservation Commission had recommended that the government should investigate conditions before granting water powers and crown lands. There was a possibility of St. John City controlling its own electricity under the new commission. This company should not be given control of the largest water power privilege at St. John. The company had broken its agreement passed in November 1911, in respect to the definite rate for light and power. There was nothing to prevent the company selling out its franchise in three or six months to the St. John Street Railway Company. The government should assist the people to get cheaper power and should make a careful investigation before granting such extensive privileges. The people of St. John had protested against any legislature granting the right to any company to enter the streets of the city before the council had given permission. The council should have sent a copy of the agreement with the company to the government as soon as it had been passed.

Hon. Mr. McLeod—"It did not reach us until yesterday." Mr. Hatheway said that it was wrong to give power to the City of St. John to expropriate for industrial purposes it was doubly wrong to give a privilege to a private company to expropriate lands for private purposes. The company sought to secure the Gillmour property, but the company would not give them reasonable remuneration. If the House acceded to the request of the company for expropriation rights other companies would naturally expect the same rights.

He hoped the time would come when a Hydro-Electric Commission similar to that in Ontario, would be appointed. The present legislation was a disgrace to the promoters. Mr. Hatheway moved that the provision to enable the company to expropriate lands be stricken out.

Mr. McLaughlin agreed with his hon. friend that the principle involved in granting powers of expropriation was an important one and no legislation should be granted which would give this or any other company such extensive powers.

Hon. Mr. Maxwell rose to a point of order and said the amendment was out of order. The Chairman ruled accordingly.

Mr. Young moved that the committee reconsider the bill.

Mr. Baxter said that the common council had desired that the interests of the city should be protected. He moved to amend the bill to provide that the company, before entering St. John, should comply with all the terms, conditions and regulations, made by the council.

Mr. Hatheway moved an amendment to Mr. Baxter's motion to provide that the company before entering in or upon the streets, square or open plots in the city of St. John they must first obtain the consent of the said city.

The amendment was lost and the motion was carried.

Mr. Baxter moved that provision be made to establish a maximum scale of rates and also that nothing contained in the scale of rates shall prevent them from being subject to revision by the Public Utilities Commission. He said that the rates that were specified were the same as had been agreed on between the company and the council.

Mr. Young moved that provision be made that the company in the construction of dams shall provide fish-

ways for the passage of the fish.

The House took recess at 6 o'clock. The House resumed at eight o'clock and went into committee with Mr. Burchill in the chair and resumed the consideration of the bill to incorporate the St. John Hydro Electric Co.

Mr. Hatheway moved that provision be made that the company must secure the permission of the lieutenant-governor-in-council if they wanted to amalgamate or sell out their interests and that they must first offer to sell out to the government. The amendment was lost.

Mr. Bentley moved that the rates for electric lights and power in York, Queens, St. John and Charlotte counties should not exceed the rates charged in St. John City.

Mr. Baxter, Hon. Mr. Grimmer and Hon. Mr. Maxwell said that the suggestion if adopted, might deprive some of the counties from securing power.

The amendment was lost as was also an amendment moved by Mr. Hatheway that the franchise of the company should be for a term of fifty years.

Mr. Speaker said that the dams might cause the water to spread over the lands and thus obstruct the logs.

Mr. Bentley moved an amendment that the company should arrange for the carrying of the logs without any unnecessary delay.

Hon. Mr. McLeod said that the logs under ordinary conditions, would leave the channel and become hung up.

Mr. Baxter moved an amendment to the amendment that the company should provide efficient sluiceways and apparatus to the satisfaction of the executive council and provide sufficient flow of water for the uninterrupted passage of logs, when in the judgment of the chief commissioner of public works the same should be necessary.

Hon. Mr. Flemming and Mr. Slipp also discussed the proposed changes. The amendment to the amendment was carried.

Hon. Mr. Grimmer moved to amend the bill to provide that the chief engineer of the department of public works should inspect the books of the company to ascertain whether the expenditure as required under the act had been made.

Mr. Young moved that provision be made that York and Charlotte County residents who desired the electricity should receive in all one-fifth of the electricity generated on the Magaguadavic River.

The bill was otherwise amended so as to provide that the fishing and hunting privileges on the waters and lands acquired by the company should not be interfered with and for the payment of the amounts for the privileges and the renewal of the leases; also that the company should place \$10,000 within the executive council as a guarantee that the expenditures called for would be made.

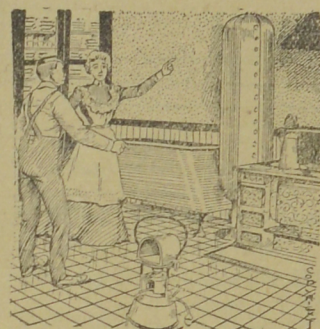
