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**CHARLES HOWE OF ST. MARY'S MET DEATH IN MAINE**

Word Received here from Bangor this Morning of his Being Accident-ally Killed at Webster's Brook Yesterday

**REMAINS TO BE BROUGHT HOME FOR INTERMENT**

Charles Howe of St. Mary's was accidentally killed yesterday at Webster's Brook, Maine. This morning word of the accident was received by Chief of Police Hawthorn of this city in a telegram from F. H. Davis, chief of police of Bangor. The telegram stated that Joseph Howell had been killed at Webster Brook and Chief Hawthorn was asked to communicate with the family of the deceased concerning the disposal of the remains. Chief Hawthorn at once communicated with Mr. John Howe St. Mary's, a mistake in the name evidently having been made. It was learned that Mr. Howe's son Charles had been working some time in Maine and was probably the man who had been killed.

**SURVIVING RELATIVES**

The deceased is survived by his father, Mr. John Howe, and by three brother and sisters. The brothers are John, Joseph and Frank of St. Mary's and the sisters are Mrs. Harry Hector of St. John and Miss Elva Howe of Boston. He left home about two years ago and since that time had been employed in the lumber woods and in saw mills in Maine. He was about twenty-six years of age and was well known in this vicinity. One of the brothers of the deceased will leave tonight for Maine to bring back the remains for interment at St. Mary's. Details concerning the accident are lacking.

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**TOBIQUE LOG DRIVING CO. POSTPONES MEETING**

St. John Log Driving Co. Elected Former Board of Directors and Made Expected Changes

The St. John River Log Driving Company held its annual meeting at the Queen Hotel yesterday afternoon. The board of directors was re-elected as follows:—J. Fraser Gregory, G. A. Hilyard, F. C. Beattay, John A. Morrison and A. H. F. Randolph Mr. Gregory was re-elected president and Arthur V. Rowan was appointed manager and secretary treasurer in succession to Lewis H. Bliss resigned. Messrs George and William Aikin of this city who last year were awarded the contract will handle the corporation drive.

President Gregory stated that present expectations were that about 89,000,000 feet of lumber will come into the company's booms including the logs which were hung up and abandoned last year. The Log Driving Company as announced by The Mail some weeks ago will close its plant in St. Mary's at which the pins used in rafting have been manufactured for some years. The boarding house in St. Mary's at which operatives of the Company had boarded will also be closed. These steps have been decided upon in order to curtail expenses.

**TOBIQUE LOG DRIVING**

The annual meeting of the Tobique Log Driving Company which was to be held yesterday in this city was postponed until the morning of Tuesday next, April 9th. when it will be held in St. John. The absence of several members of the company including the secretary J. C. Hartley of Woodstock was the reason for postponement. The directors are Charles Miller, Donald Fraser, Jr., Thomas Hilyard and F. C. Beattay. President Miller stated yesterday that conditions on the Tobique were favorable for stream-driving but that it was difficult to forecast conditions which would prevail later in the spring. He stated also that the Tobique drive would be pretty well up to its average size, 18,000,000 to 20,000,000. J. D. McLaughlin former president of the company was awarded the contract for driving last year. The contract has still several years to run.

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**BROUGHT BRIDE ACROSS OCEAN TO WED AT BOSTON**

Lewis J. Edwards, the New United States Consular Agent at Fredericton Principal in Romantic Wedding in East Boston Immigration Building Yesterday--Bride Native of Germany--Legal Difficulties Prevented Marriage on Other Side of the Atlantic

Mr. Lewis D. Edwards, recently appointed United States consular agent at this port, was married yesterday in the immigration building at East Boston under most romantic circumstances, his bride being Miss Verona Klein, late of Plaven, Saxony, Germany, where Mr. Edwards had been vice-consul and deputy consul in the United States service since June 23rd, 1910. Mr. Edwards and his bride were married immediately on their arrival by steamer from Antwerp, Belgium legal difficulties having prevented the ceremony taking place in Germany or Belgium.

**HAS RECEIVED NO WORD.**

Acting Consular Agent Culver, who has occupied the United States consular office in this city since the transfer of Mr. J. Porter Boyd to Halifax, stated this morning that he had received no advices concerning the date upon which the new consular agent would arrive here but stated that he expected him during the present month. Mr. Culver does not know where he himself will be transferred on the arrival of Mr. Edwards.

**DETAILS OF ROMANCE.**

The following despatch from Boston contains the details of the marriage: Boston, Mass., April 4--Lewis D. Edwards of Cleveland, Ohio, who has recently been appointed consular agent at Fredericton, N.B., was married yesterday in the immigration rooms, East Boston, to Verona Klein. For several weeks Mr. Edwards has been trying to overcome legal difficulties in the way of the ceremony. He tried first to marry in Germany, later in Belgium, but was unable to marry in either of these countries. He decided to try and marry in the United States and arrived yesterday by Steamer Menominee from Antwerp. Following the ceremony Mr. Edwards left for Washington with his bride and before May 1st will arrive at Fredericton to take up his new work. Mrs. Edwards cannot speak English.

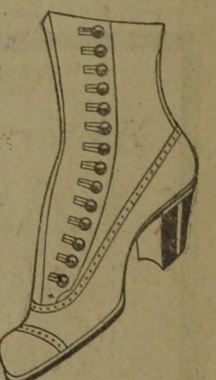
