DR. CHARLES A. EATON IS A BELIEVER IN RECIPROCITY

Eminent Baptist Divine Now of New York
Gives out Interesting Interview to Halifax Newspaper--Has a Good Word to say for the Canadian Press

(Halifax Chronicle)

Dr. Charles Eaton, Pastor of the Madison Avenue Baptist Church of New York, President of the Canadian Society of that city, a native of Nova Scotia and although expatriated, still a strong Canadian in sentiment for the Dominion, is a visitor to this city, and when seen last evening at the Halifax Hotel expressed as heartily as if he still dwelt among us, the ardent love and admiration that he still holds for the land of his nativity.

Dr. Eaton was asked to express the views with regard to matters now engaging the attention and thought of Canadians and in the course of the interview he touched upon the Panama Bill, Reciprocity and trade conditions between Canada and the Republic, the political relations between the two countries, the domestic conditions of Canada, compared with those existing in the United States, and also upon the work of Canadian Clubs.

THE CANADIAN CLUBS

The latter subject he spoke of first and described the work of Canadian Society and Canadian Clubs of New York, as one that was endeavoring to interpret Canadian ideals for Americans and American ideal for Canadians. Through these Clubs and Societies, the Canadian residents of the United States are exerting a tremendous influence on American life. They endeavor to arouse interest in the relations between different parts of the world and in all public utterances are made to influence public opinion. Asked as to how such Societies of Canadians were accepted in the United States, Dr. Eaton said that they were looked upon very kindly and with the same attitude as the New England or the Ohio State Society is excepted in the other States.

ATTITUDE OF AMERICANS

"Will this influence which Canadians will assert, affect you to any extent in such issues as the Panama Canal question?" The Dr. replying, described what he considered the attitude of the American people at large. "It is very nearly impossible," said Dr. Eaton, "to tell from the newspaper reports and comments just what the judgment of the American is upon this issue, for the reason that the country is undergoing a terrific Presidential struggle, and the partisan papers will use anything to help their respective side. In this regard practically all the party newspapers are strong for the American idea appealing to the populace through the influence of the patriotic cry. In this connection President Taft, of course is supported by the Republican press, the Democrats, however, are not so strong, the Independent papers awaiting the outcome, in the meantime, assuming a judicial attitude, simply saying 'Our treaties with our nations demand the admission of their ships on an equality with our own.'"

CANADIANS POWERFUL

"Now, as regards President Taft's utterances on the Panama Canal Bill they may be in the effect judicial, but they appear to be intended to be political. My own judgment and personal opinion is, that if the Presidential election was not coming on, President Taft would not have made his suggestion about Congress ratifying his views. Among the more thoughtful people the view is that it will be referred to the Hague. This brings me to the direct answer to your question, yes, Canadian citizens of the United States, have a powerful influence upon the public affairs in that country. There are a million Canadians in the Republic and a very small proportion of them are weaklings. I doubt if any other one million of the population affect thought to the extent to which that million does

BELIEVES IN RECIPROCITY

Turning from the subject of the Canal, Dr. Eaton expressed his opinion with regard to reciprocity and freer trade generally, between the two countries. "I was disappointed, but not surprised at the result of last September's election. Had I been in Canada I would have been puzzled as to my duty and on my ground, I felt that the scheme was too large for one dose.

"Do you mean too liberal?"

"No, but I mean," replied the Doctor, "that it effected too much of Canada's economic structure at one time. I believe thoroughly in the freest Reciprocity between the two countries, but I think it ought to come step at a time, so as not to suddenly dislocate channels of commerce, that have become established. As to the wave of the Old Flag that has always been most tiresome and most offensive proceeding to me. I have no use for titillation of that kind. Again bearing on this matter, I think ninety per cent of the American people are either indifferent to, or ignorant of the question of annexation, and the half of the rest of them talk about it as a matter of form of phrases. I can say I never met one that really desired it, that is perhaps a strange thing to say, but it is a fact. Intelligent Americans consider we have trouble enough of our own without adding to them, if I may be permitted to put it in that way. There should be no difficulty in trading with each other, for any man that thinks soberly, must see that it is inevitable that the business relations of Canada and the United States will increase enormously no matter what political results may follow. It is like the river that must flow to the sea," said the Doctor in concluding his remarks on the subject.

SUN CULT LEADER TO THE BAR

Chicago, Ill., Aug. 31--At the term of the federal court about to convene in this city Otomen Zar Adusht Hanish, leader and founder of the Mazdaznan Sun cult, will be called upon to face the bar of justice. Hanish was indicted by the grand jury some time ago on a charge of sending obscene literature, including the "Inner Studies," to a young woman in Brookfield, Mo. The indictment was voted after Richard E. Hanish, father of the cult head, had related the life story of his son. The father, an aged musician of Milwaukee, in poor circumstances, related the sun cult leader's romantic story of his birth. Hanish had led his followers to believe that he was born in Persia and reared in a monastery by followers of Zoroaster. Sensational testimony is expected at the trial. Among the followers of Hanish are said to be numerous women of social prominence in Mass., Chicago and in Montreal and Lowell, Mass., where branches of the Mazdaznan colony existed.

AMERICAN PRESS ON CANAL CANAL.

a bill at this session of Congress, but they do not weigh a feather as against the possible violation of a treaty. To avert that, we could well afford to wait till next December--or for December of 1912--even at the cost of a certain sacrifice due to delay.

New York Sun--President Taft's sincere and disinterested friends will regret both his approval of the Panama Canal bill and the memorandum in which he defends that act. The opportunity to blunder existed. The President embraced it.

The Sun's opinion of this mishapen measure has been adequately set forth. It is unnecessary to repeat of the law what was said of the bill. What foreign and domestic complications, political and economic, the enactment will precipitate the incidents that have accompanied its passage sufficiently indicate.

The United States will have ample cause to repent this exploit of its Legislature and its Executive.
