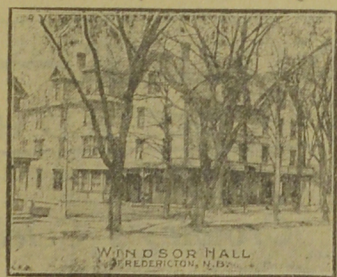

14 YEAR OLD BOY  
 MET HORRIBLE DEATH

Flint, Aug. 30—In the presence  
 of hundreds of people, fourteen-year-  
 old Chester Betts, son of Bert N.  
 Betts of Flint was accidentally  
 caught by the guy rope of a balloon  
 today and carried about 2000 feet  
 in the air before the rope untangled  
 and buried him to his death. He  
 crashed against the roof of a barn  
 and was still alive when spectators  
 reached him but soon expired.

The tragedy occurred at a country  
 fair and when the balloon and aro-  
 naut shot upwards, many people  
 thought the youth dangling with the  
 end of the rope was a dummy.

The heroic efforts of the balloonist  
 to rescue the boy soon disclosed the  
 truth to the crowd below. As the  
 big gas bag swept higher and higher  
 the aeronaut, in peril of his own  
 safety, could be seen working desper-  
 ately to pull the dangling form to the  
 trapeze. Finally the rope twirled  
 away from the lad and the tiny form  
 dropped down like a stone.

TO MAKE A CUT IN  
 OCEAN PRESS RATES

New York, Aug. 31—Another re-  
 duction in the rate for press despat-  
 ches and between New York and Lon-  
 don, over the cables of the Western  
 Union Telegraph Co. will be put in-  
 to effect on Sept. 14th.

Formal announcement of the re-  
 duction is being made on the other  
 side of the ocean by Postmaster Gen-  
 eral Samuel who has jurisdiction over  
 the British land lines, which are own-  
 ed by the government.

The cut leaves the rates as follows:  
 General day and night press rate  
 between London and New York: 7  
 cents a word. Former rate 10 per  
 cent a word. London to New York  
 12 per cent midnight to 6 a. m. Lon-  
 don time 5 per cent a word, New  
 York to London, 12 midnight to 6  
 a. m. (New York time), and 1 a. m.  
 to 4 p. m. (New York time) 5 per  
 cent. This is intended to facilitate  
 the transmission of news at the pe-  
 riods most useful to the newspapers on  
 both sides of the ocean.

ONTARIO FARMER IS  
 CHARGED WITH MURDER

Cobden, Renfrew Co., Ont., Aug. 31

—Shortly after midnight Peter Col-  
 lins, a young farmer of the district,  
 was arrested on charge of murder in  
 causing the death by stabbing of  
 Grant Appleby, a student of the On-  
 tario Veterinary College, Toronto,

who was spending his vacation at  
 the home of his parents, Mr. and Mrs.  
 Thomas Appleby, Roastowship. The

affray took place last evening right  
 in front of the Appleby home, and  
 was the sequence of a quarrel  
 of the night before. The fatality oc-

curred shortly after six o'clock, and  
 immediately afterwards Collins dis-  
 appeared. It was thought that he  
 was fleeing from justice, but it is

now learned that he did not know  
 that the man was dead until he was  
 told at the home of his brother. He

made no resistance when arrested and  
 said it was in self defence. The story  
 told by Collins is that he was on

his way to the farm of James Logan  
 and that as he approached the Ap-  
 pleby home, the two Applebys, Grant,  
 the victim of the killing and his

brother Rueben, came at him to  
 "lick" him. He says he was filling  
 his pipe and had his pocket knife out

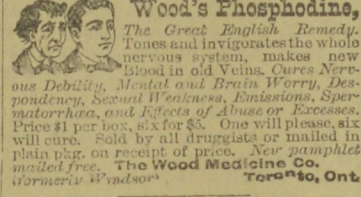
in doing so. In the melee he says he  
 must have stabbed Appleby, though  
 he did not do it with the intention  
 of killing him. That he had some

rough handling is shown by his con-  
 dition. One eye is black and al-  
 most closed. His face is bruised in

several places and he is cut on the  
 back of the head. He explains the  
 bruises on his face by saying that

Appleby had a clevis in his hand,  
 which served the same purpose as

knuckle irons.

AUSTRALIA  
 MAY CHANGE  
 NAVAL POLICY

London, Aug. 31—The London  
 Times recently published a leading  
 article anticipating the possible  
 useful use of the Australian squad-  
 ron to enforce an independent com-  
 monwealth policy in the Pacific.

This, telegraphs the Sydney corre-  
 spondent of The Times, this morning  
 would mean the abandonment of the  
 naval policy of 1909. Such a course  
 is not expected here. On the con-  
 trary, in view of Canada's interest

in the Pacific, it is pointed out that  
 a Canadian unit will be added to the  
 fleet in the near future. Secondly,  
 the Australian view is that the  
 squadron is defensive only and not  
 aggressive except when co-operating  
 as a part of a fleet under imperial  
 command. Thirdly, the external pol-  
 icy of Australia with regard to the  
 Pacific is equally non-aggressive. The  
 federal cabinet is most anxious to  
 deal with all matters of external  
 policy in consultation with the im-

TO TRY WIDOW ON  
 MURDER CHARGE

Tulsa, Okla., Sept. 2—Preparations

are about completed for the trial of  
 the Reuter murder case at the term  
 of the superior court here this month.  
 The defendants in the case are Mrs.  
 Laura M. Reuter, widow of the al-  
 leged victim, and Bud Bellew, Guy  
 D. Mackenzie and Joe Oaker.

The murder of Charles T. Reuter,  
 who was a well known lawyer, is one  
 of the most baffling mysteries the po-  
 lice of this city ever have dealt with.

He was killed in his bedroom at his  
 home on the night of May 5, last.  
 Valuable diamonds he wore and a  
 large sum of money were missing.

Mrs. Reuter was locked in her room  
 across the hall at the time and her  
 scream aroused the neighborhood. A  
 tall man, masked, with a red light  
 hanging from a belt, was seen run-

ning from the house.

The next day Mackenzie, Bellew and  
 Baker were arrested on the theory  
 that Reuter's murder was the result  
 of a conspiracy, with robbery as a  
 blind to conceal the real motive. Not

until the preliminary hearing of the  
 three men began was Mrs. Reuter  
 served with a warrant charging her  
 with being a party to the alleged  
 conspiracy.

COMES TO SPEAK FOR DEBS TICKETS

New York, Aug. 30—J. Keir Hardie  
 member of Parliament and one of the  
 most noted leaders of organized la-  
 bor in England has arrived in New  
 York to begin a speech-making tour  
 of the country in behalf of the So-  
 cialist national ticket headed by Eu-  
 gene V. Debs. Mr. Hardie expects to

be on the stump continuously for  
 about six weeks, with the exception  
 of an interval of a few days when  
 he will go to Guelph, Ont., to ad-  
 dress the annual convention of the  
 Dominion Trades and Labor Con-  
 gress.

Glasgow, Aug. 31—The one hun-  
 dredth anniversary of the launching  
 of the steamer Comet, which marked  
 the beginning of the shipbuilding in-  
 dustry for which the Clyde district is  
 famous, was observed today with an  
 elaborate celebration conducted un-  
 der the auspices of the Corporation  
 of Glasgow. The chief feature of the  
 program was a naval pageant on the  
 Clyde, participated in by a squadron  
 of first class battleships and a di-  
 vision of destroyers. At the corpora-  
 tion banquet speakers of prominence  
 delivered eulogies on Henry Bell, the  
 designer of the Comet. During the  
 day thousands of persons visited the  
 shipyard in Port Glasgow where the  
 Comet was built.

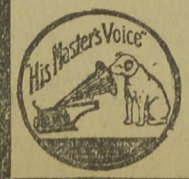
