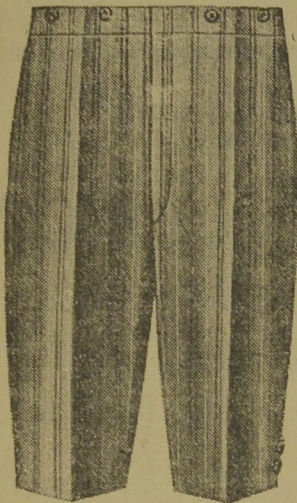

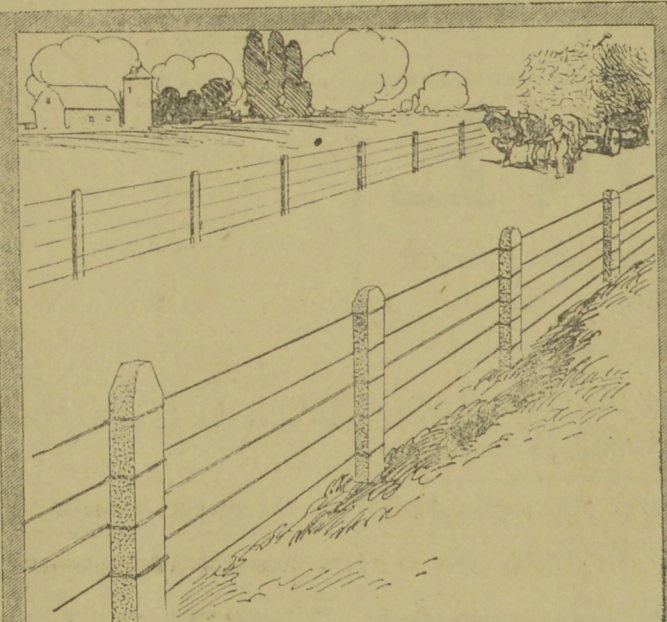
"23" FOR DIRTY DARKIES

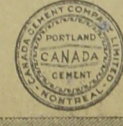
