Quebec, Aug. 30—It is rumored in political circles here that the position of Clerk of the Legislative Council left vacant by the death of the late Gustave Grenier will be taken by the Hon. C. R. Devlin, Minister of Colonization Mines and Fisheries who will withdraw from the political arena to accept the position. It is also rumored that Mr. J. L. Perren former member for Gaspe will be a candidate in Vercheres County and will when elected be made Attorney General, Sir Lomer wishing to relinquish the post folio and be simple president of the executive council.

SALE OF MONTANA ISLANDS

Helena, Mont., Aug. 30—The largest sale of state lands in the history of Montana was inaugurated today, when 4,000 acres in Granite County were put up for sale at public auction. During September and October similar sales are to be held in numerous counties, until a total of 300,000 acres are disposed of. Much of the land is suitable for agricultural or grazing purposes. The amount to be sold to any one individual or corporation is limited by law, and it is further provided that none of the land is to be sold at a price below \$10 an acre.

SERIOUS ACCIDENT ON CANADIAN PACIFIC

North Bay, Aug. 31—A smashup occurred on the C.P.R. at Mattawam forty miles east of North Bay early this morning. A misplaced switch sent a fast through freight train plunging with terrific impact into the caboose and boarding cars of a wrecking train standing there. Thomas Duncan, conductor and P. Wallace, brakeman, both of North Bay were killed.

F. L. Lerdial, a cable man of Mattawan is reported killed and W. A. Graham, brakeman of North Bay seriously injured. Engineer Jas. Casey of the through freight jumped with his brakeman and escaped injury.

NEW CAR SERVICE RULES

Chicago, Ill., Aug. 31—New rules announced to be put into effect tomorrow by the roads affiliated with the American Railway Car Association are expected to remedy a grievance of long standing in the railroad world. Up to the present time all railroads have been in the habit of using foreign equipment to any part of the country, providing it was reasonably length of time. Under this method the smaller lines have had the use of more cars than they actually owned, while the larger roads which owned the equipment have experienced a car shortage, their appeals for the returns of their property often going unheeded. The new rules provide that all the foreign equipment must be returned to the owners from the point of destination, and not used by the railroad in whose territory the equipment happens to be to haul freight to points farther away. Severe penalties are to be imposed on the companies violating the agreement.

BRIEFS

Montreal, Aug. 31—The local operators of the C. P. R. Telegraph Company, are not satisfied with the award given by the Arbitration Commission which considered their demands for ten hour day and time and a half for overtime. The Commission allowed a ten per cent. increase in wages. Today the committee of the operators which has had the matter in hand decided to take a poll of the men to ascertain whether a majority disapprove of the finding and are ready to recommend a strike to obtain their full demands.

Washington, Aug. 30—Proposed increases in the transportation rates on lumber ranging from one cent to six cents a hundred pounds from points in the south to destinations in Canada, were suspended today by the Interstate Commerce Commission from Sept. first until Dec. first. In a supplemental order the commission also suspended for the same period proposed increases ranging from one and one third to two cents a hundred pounds on lumber from Ohio River transfer points to Canadian destinations. The traffic affected is heavy and the proposed tariff applies to every railroad in the south.
