Texas-Oklahoma League—Greenville and McKinney dropped from circuit. Southeastern League—Disbanded.

United States League—Disbanded. Blue Grass League—Winchester team transferred to Mt. Sterling.

Minnesota-Wisconsin League—Disbanded. Mountain States League—Disbanded.

Ohio State League—Marion team transferred to Ironton.

Southern Michigan League—Saginaw and Bay City dropped from circuit.

South Central League—Clerburne and Tyler dropped from circuit.

Cotton States League—New Orleans team transferred to Yazoo City; Hattiesburg team transferred to Columbus; Meridian, Vicksburg and Yazoo City dropped from the circuit.

## HIT LONGEST HOME RUN EVER MADE.

Chicago, Aug. 29—Henie Zimmerman, third baseman for the Cubs and leading batsman in the National League, hit what was said to be the longest home run ever made on the local grounds in the game with St. Louis here yesterday. It was Zimmerman's fourteenth home run drive this season and was made when one man was on base in the first inning.

The ball struck the lower left hand corner of the score board in left field, near the club house, and experts on long distance estimated that the ball travelled 425 feet before striking the board. Several of the Chicago team declared the drive was the longest ever made in the National League.

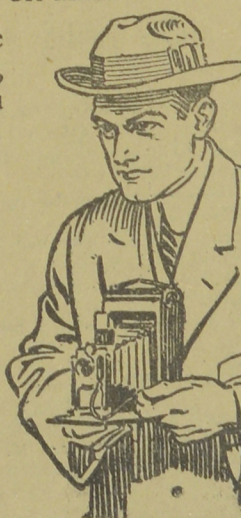
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
