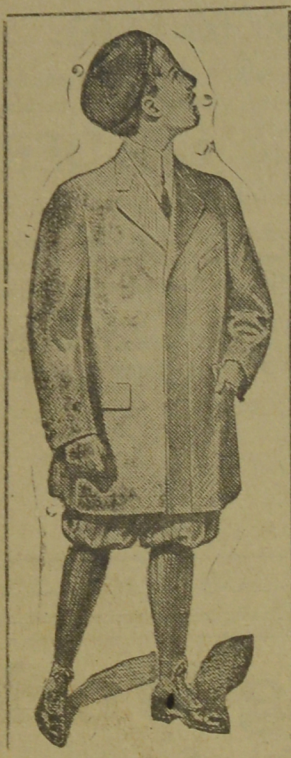

Pets Still on Tobbogan Slide--Eddie Ramsey at Second-Base for Fredericton had Costly Errors-- Local Team Plays at St. John Again Today-- Houlton Reds Beat Woodstock 10 to 1 and are Close on Fredericton's Heels

St. John Aug. 31--What is counted as the finest game of ball played in this city took place yesterday afternoon on the Marathon grounds when the Marathons defeated Fredericton by the close score of two to one.

The weather was rather cold and there was considerable delay on account of the rain, but despite these had conditions the game was hard fought from start to finish and was not a sure win for the Greeks until the last Fredericton man was called out.

The Marathons played an errorless game, while their opponents had four errors, but these four did not figure in the scoring with the exception of one and that was in the second inning when Dutton reached first on a fumble of Eddie Ramsey who was playing the second sack for Fredericton. Dutton, however, was sent to second on a sacrifice, and reached third when a foul fly was captured far from the plate and he was scored on Winckler's clean hit to centre field. Three other Greeks reached third base by errors by Ramsey and Wildes, but they did not get near the plate.

Winckler was the pitcher for the victors and his work was never better this season. He struck eight Fredericton men out, gave two bases on balls and was only found for six hits. Of these Ramsey beat out a bunt along the line, Ganley beat out two bunts to the pitcher, while those

were two singles to right field and one single to left. Only three Fredericton men reached as far as the third base and only two others got as far as the second bag. It was real work for Winckler and he deserved all the congratulations that were heaped upon him. In addition to his good pitching his support was perfect there being some sensational clean fielding and the Greeks never let one chance get by.

Frank Harrington was the twirler for Fredericton and his work was also of the first class variety as he was only found for four singles and one of these was made by Fraser for the seventh inning when he let one to Bob Conley who had a hard run for it and it was too difficult for him to handle. Pinkerton, O'Donnell and Winckler made the other three singles. Harrington like Winckler had eight strike outs and gave three bases on balls. Five Greeks reached as far as third base, and only four others got as far as the second bag during the game.

Of the six hits made by Fredericton Bob Ganley, Fredericton's captain made three of them, Ramsey, Duggan and Harrington each one.

BUY CONTROL OF  
BROOKLYN CLUB

Prominent Horsemen and Baseball Fans  
---Charles H. Ebbetts Still Remains  
at Head of Organization

More Brooklyn capital has been put into the Brooklyn Baseball Club of the National League. Said capital is about all that will be needed for a long time to some and heroic persons from Cincinnati and elsewhere with the itch to become major league magnates, just like John M. Ward was and Jim Gaffney it, will have to wait awhile until they find some other plant in which to invest.

The new stockholders in the club are ex-Alderman Stephen W. McKeever and his brother, Edward J. McKeever, both of our upright city and as good two-handed mosquito fighters as Brooklyn has produced in years. They are also good forehanded business men, and when they found that they had a chance to break into baseball via the Brooklyn route, they took it without much parley.

WELL KNOWN MEN

The McKeever brothers are well-known contractors and also the operators of a big fishing and oil-making plant at Egg Harbor, N. J. Both are baseball fans of high degree and of many years standing, the ex-alderman being proud of the fact that that one time he considered himself among the best amateurs on either Long Island or Manhattan Island. O'necent years they have been prominent in harness horse racing. Miss Dearie McKeever and her mother, Mrs. Stephen W. McKeever, are also well-known drivers of Speedway horses and are frequently seen handling the reins on Jotah, Mr. McKeever's prize winner.

EBBETTS STILL THE BOSS

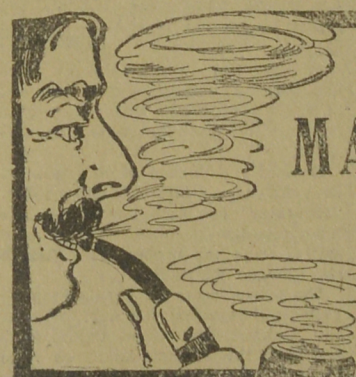
What proportion of the stock was bought by the McKeever brothers was not disclosed, but it was from the supply possessed by Charles H. Ebbetts, president of the club. Mr. Ebbetts still retains full control of the organization and will be the "boss" in matters baseball as he has been in the past.

An election of officers were held yesterday and the talent now lines up in the following impressive array: Charles H. Ebbetts, ex-president; Henry Medions, treasurer; Charles H. Ebbetts, jr., secretary. Fred Hanlon will continue to be busy as a hen with one chicken in the office whiling away his lunch time pool-pooling suggestions that Nap Rucker be traded for this star of some other team. When the announcement of the plans for the new ball grounds at Ebbetts Field, which is bounded by Bedford avenue, Cedar place, Montgomery and Sullivan streets, was made, President Ebbetts said that he could get all the Brooklyn money he needed to carry out the enterprise along the ambitious lines he proposed, and the assertion was promptly backed by a number of the leading bankers and other financiers of the city.

Mr. Ebbetts really had a choice of partners and finally decided to in the McKeever who were old personal, political and baseball friends, thoroughly in sympathy with his ambitions to build for Brooklyn the most modern and best equipped ball park in the country.
