AUTONOMY NOT A FETISH IN CANADA

The Mail and Empire does not seem to know its own mind clearly about autonomy. It describes autonomy as a "fetish." At the same time it says that "No one is endangering autonomy, but, on the contrary, the Borden Government is taking every precaution to safeguard it, and the British Government is rendering the fullest respect to it."

It rather hard on the Borden Government to represent it as safe guarding a fetish; rather hard on the British Government to represent it as rendering the fullest respect to a fetish. Let us therefore strike out the fetish, and credit the British Government and the Borden Government with paying due regard, not to the fetish, but to a basic principle of government, the foundation of the happiness and prosperity of Canada. Let us all agree that the general respect which is paid to autonomy is not a species of idolatry, but is founded on reason and experience.

Then we may perhaps agree as to the facts. We have never accused Mr. Borden of attacking autonomy—or of sneering at it, as some foolish people do. As to his naval policy, we do not know whether it is consistent or inconsistent with autonomy. It has not been disclosed. We do not condemn it before it is disclosed. We think it rather unreasonable to ask approval before it is disclosed and discussed in the Parliament of Canada.

If there is an uneasiness about autonomy in Canada it is not the fault of the political party which won self-government for Canada and stands by that principle. The uneasiness, if any is caused by sneering reference to autonomy as a "fetish." It is caused by the suggestion that a person who stands up for the principle of autonomy is a "poltroon," unwilling to bear his share in the burden of defence. It is caused by the tendency to ignore Parliament as the body which must settle the naval policy of Canada.

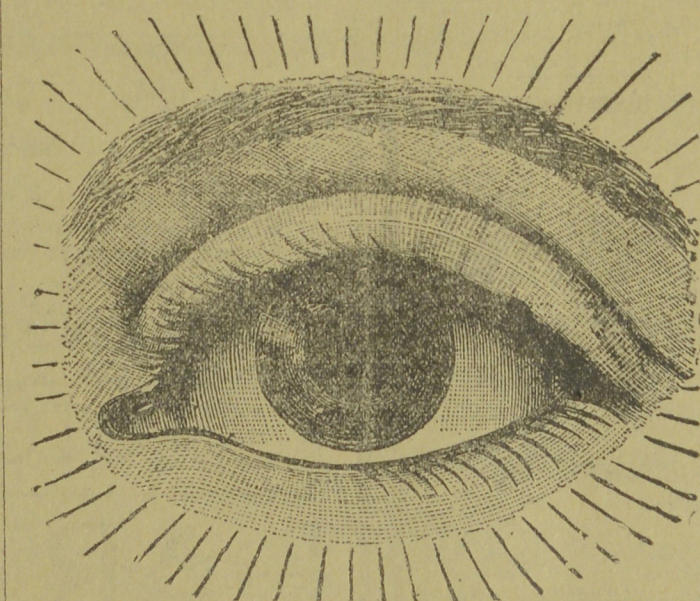
We can assure our contemporary that when Mr. Borden's announcement is made in the regular constitutional way, it will be discussed in that way. If he announces a Canadian policy which fully safeguards our right to control the expenditure of our own money, that will be admitted. If autonomy is attacked, autonomy will be defended. Its friends will neither force the issue if it is not necessary nor will they shrink from the fight if the issue is forced upon them.—Toronto Star.
