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
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

CHARLES KRAMER

CONFESSES CRIME

Chicago, Nov. 5.—Broken by thirty-
six hours "silent treatment," Chas.
N. Kramer confessed this afternoon
that he killed Sophia Singer, the Bal-
timore heiress found murdered here
recently.

Kramer, whose stage name is Con-
way, added a new feature to the
statement made by his wife, Beatrice
Ryall Kramer, known on the variety
stage as the "burlesque queen." He
said that he knocked Miss Singer
down in self-defence when she attack-
ed him with a razor after he had re-
buked her for making, he said, a
suggestion to Mrs. Kramer, to go out
and meet some men. Kramer exoner-
ated his wife from all blame in
connection with the crime.

Kramer, the former clown, high
diver and circus acrobat, paced his
cell all night begging for a word
from the turnkeys, who refused to
vouchsafe him a syllable. He heard
his wife's outcries as she made her
confession yesterday, but could get
no information as to their cause or
what she said. Today Captain Noot-
baat began a systematic passing of
Kramer's cell, occasionally saying,
"Well, do you want to see me?"
Finally Kramer broke into tears and
begged to be allowed to tell his
story. First he pleaded to see his
wife. It was not allowed.

"Don't send me back to that black
cell," he cried. "I'll tell it all."
Kramer's story differed from his
wife's only in the detail that he
claimed self-defence. He said that he
never meant to kill Miss Singer, but
when he took the covered door knob
away from her she came at him with
a razor from his dresser and he
struck her down with the door knob.
He said that he bound and gagged
her to prevent her making an out-
cry. He said he took \$25 from Miss
Singer's purse and two suits of
clothes belonging to W. R. Worthen,
Miss Singer's fiancé, because he was
penniless and was shabbily clad. He
and his wife fled through the alley,
he said, hoping to get away before
Miss Singer revived, believing that
she would not want to come into
publicity by prosecuting them.

The man told his life history from
the time he ran away from his home
to join a circus. He said that he
had been convicted of horse stealing
and that he had served eighteen
months sentence in a reformatory.

Kramer, after promising to tell,
was confronted by his wife. He de-
manded to hear from her own lips
that she had confessed to what she
knew. The woman was brought be-
fore him weeping. Then he ended his
resistance.

"Yes, I did it," he said. "I killed
Sophia Singer."

Kramer said he was born at St.
Mary's, Ohio, in 1886.

LOOKS LIKE A REGULAR
NATIONALISTS CAMPAIGN

Montreal, Nov. 3.—It is believed
that the challenge made by Mr. Ar-
mand Lavergne to Hon. L. P. Pel-
letier will be carried still further, and
will develop into a campaign by the
Nationalists against Premier Bor-
den's naval policy.

The revelations made by Lavergne,
the ardent Nationalist, regarding
the "inside" history of Cabinet ap-
pointments, will be followed by others,
which will all tend to embarrass
the government.

It is expected that a some-
what similar challenge to the
one made to Hon. Mr. Pel-
letier will be made to Hon.
Louis Coderre. At the last election
he subscribed to all the Nationalistic
doctrines in regard to a plebiscite on
the navy, etc., and as he has broken
all his pre-election pledges the Na-
tionalists are determined to remind
him of his sins of omission and com-
mission.

The Nationalists believe the time is
ripe to test once and for all the at-
titude of French-Canadians towards
the navy, and those who know be-
lieve that a Nationalist candidate
will be in the field within the next
few days.

The Liberals are taking particular
pains to select a good man, and it is
believed that Mr. Leduc, a wholesale
butcher of St. Henri, will be the
party's choice. The Liberals realize
that they have a big majority against
them, but they are not a bit dis-
couraged. The fight promises to de-
velop into a very warm and exciting
contest. The Liberals will not have
anything to do with the Nationalists
in the campaign, and would prefer
to see it a straight fight between the
Conservatives and themselves.


TELEPHONE SYSTEM
