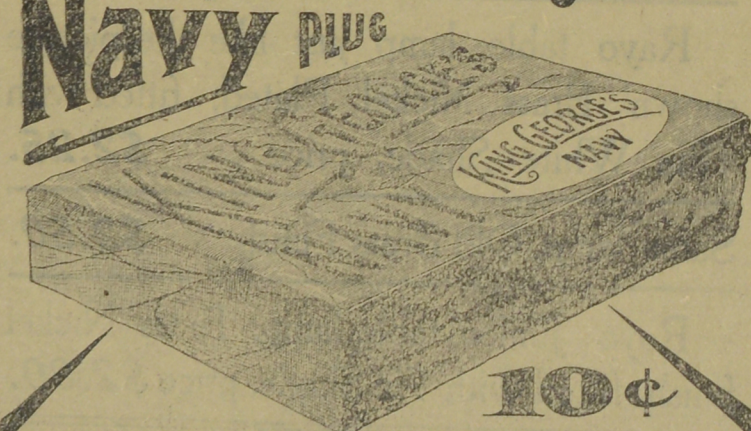

STALLION LOOKS
LIKE REAL THING

The Northern Man Did Mile in 2.06 1-2
at Lexington—George W. Leavitt
of Readville Part Owner

The Lexington, Ky., Herald of Oct. 29 says:

The Breeders' meeting held at the Kentucky Trotting Horse Breeders' Association track yesterday afternoon was a most successful one.

The best performance of the day was a mile in 2.06 1/2 for the little Todd stallion, The Northern Man, by John W. Nash of this city, and Geo. W. Leavitt of Readville, Massachusetts. The stallion came to the track on July 7, after three years' retirement to the stud, during which time he had received no training, and started at nearly every meeting since and each time has set a new and faster record. No little credit is due his trainer George Starr, and Mr. Leavitt, in speaking of the mile said, that with due deference to the others, he believed that no other trainer in the country would have given the care and attention and done so well with the ton of Todd with his legs in the condition they are in. Horse and driver were given an ovation after coming back to the stand.

The horse when first started trotted in 2.15 1/2, then in 2.12 1/2, 2.09 1/2, 2.07 1/2 and 2.06 1/2 respectively and if the weather stays good another meeting will be held at which he will probably be started again, and it would not be surprising if he should further reduce the mark to 2.05. The quarter was reached in 32 seconds, the half in 1.02 1/2 and the three-quarters in 1.34 1/2 and the mile in 2.06 1/2. His dam is Gypsy Dark by Wiltwood, also the dam of the good stake filly Susie N., winner of the Kentucky stake and other races besides second money in the Futurity, and his second dam, Loulon, is the dam of Venetia, 2.09 1/2 and Maude Fealey, trial 2.10 1/2.
