QUEBEC LEGISLATURE OPENED ON MONDAY

Quebec, Q. Nov. 5.—The opening of the first session of the thirteenth legislature was held this afternoon and was as usual a brilliant and ceremonious function in which social military and political life in Quebec was largely represented. In spite of the cloudy weather and the fitful drizzle of rain there was a large gathering present to witness the opening ceremonies. Charming gowned ladies graced the galleries as well as the floor of the upper chamber adding to the attractiveness of the scene while the martial color was supplied by the military staff of officers all arrayed in brilliant military uniforms. At three o'clock His Honor the Lt. Governor Sir Francis Langier drove from the gubernatorial residence to the Legislative Buildings escorted by a mounted detachment of the Queen's own Hussars in command of Lt. I. G. Gore. A Guard of Honor composed of joint detachments of the R.C.R. and R.C.G.A. in command of Maj. Roy were stationed at the south entrance of the building and presented arms as the governor arrived while the band struck up the National Anthem and simultaneously a salute of fifteen guns boomed from the Citadel where guns boomed from the citadel where the saluting party was stationed. On mounting the throne in the Legislative council chamber, the Governor commissioned the gentlemen usher of the Black Rod to summon the members of the lower house and that functionary acquitted himself after the manner of traditional custom. On the arrival of the members in the upper chamber the Governor sent them back anew to choose speaker, on their return to the upper chamber the second time, His Honor proceeded with delivery of the speech from the throne.

GOVERNMENT TO OPERATE TRANSCONTINENTAL

Ottawa, Nov. 6.—The Transcontinental Railway Commission has decided in public interests to operate the completed line of the National Transcontinental Railway in New Brunswick, temporarily, i. e., until such time as the Grand Trunk Pacific Railway Company has applied for and been granted a lease of this section of the line under the terms of the National Transcontinental Railway Act.

Accordingly, commencing Wednesday, Nov. 20, a tri-weekly service will be inaugurated for both freight and passenger service between Moncton and Edmundston, a distance of 230 miles, leaving Moncton for Edmundston on Mondays, Wednesdays and Fridays, returning Tuesdays, Thursdays and Saturdays.

W. B. Cronk, heretofore superintendent, has been appointed general superintendent in charge of operation, under the instructions and operations of D. MacPherson, assistant to the chairman.

It is believed that this action of the commission will be greatly welcomed in the Maritime Provinces, as already a considerable business along the line in New Brunswick is demanding the service.

TO TRY LAST OF HILLSVILLE OUTLAWS

Wytheville, Va., Nov. 6.—The last of the trials growing out of the Hillsville court-house tragedy of last March, when the Allen gang of outlaws shot down and killed six court attaches and spectators, are scheduled here tomorrow, when Sidney Allen and Wesley Edwards will be arraigned for trial before Judge Staples of Roanoke. The two were captured in Des Moines, Iowa, some weeks ago, after a country wide search. Edward is to be tried first. Then will come the hearing of the case against Sidney Allen, who is regarded as the real leader of the gang. The prosecution entertains no doubt of the conviction of both, as the evidence against them is considered even stronger than against the others, two of whom have been sentenced to the electric chair and two others to long terms of imprisonment.

ANDREW D. WHITE 80 YEARS OLD

Ithaca, N. Y., Nov. 7.—Andrew D. White, first president of Cornell University and former ambassador to Germany, attained his eightieth year today and was the recipient of a flood of congratulations from the trustees, faculty and students of Cornell and other friends throughout the country. Dr. White was born in Cortland County, this state, in 1832. He graduated from Yale in 1853 and spent the next three years in European travel. In 1857 he became professor of history and English literature at the University of Michigan. This position he resigned in 1862 on account of ill-health and a year later became a member of the New York senate. At the expiration of his term in the senate he was elected first president of Cornell University, a position which he held until 1885. During his presidency at Cornell his work was by no means confined to the university. In 1871 he was a member of the United States Commission on San Domingo, and from 1879 to 1881 he was minister to Germany. After his resignation as head of Cornell he served successively as minister to Russia, member of the Venezuelan Commission, ambassador to Germany and head of the American delegation to the peace conference at The Hague. With his educational and diplomatic services Dr. White has combined much diplomatic labor and is the author of many valuable scientific works.

KANSAS TEACHERS CELEBRATE

Topeka, Kas., Nov. 7.—School teachers from every part of Kansas have gathered in the capital for the fifth annual meeting of their state association. The meeting will continue over tomorrow and will be combined with a celebration of the association's golden jubilee. Leading men of the state will review the advancement of education during the half century that has elapsed since the organization was organized. Other topics are to be dealt with by noted educators from outside the state, including President David Star Jordan of Leland Stanford University, Dr. David E. Smith of Columbia University, Dr. Isabel Bovier of the University of Illinois, and Mrs. Curdun Thorne-Thomson of the University of Chicago.

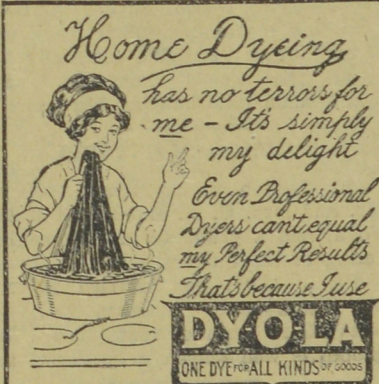
