CALGARIAN WELL KNOWN HERE LOSES HEAVILY BY BURGLARY

Residence of I. S. G. VanWart Entered During Absence of Family and Property Valued at \$1,400 Was Stolen

Mr. I. S. G. VanWart of Calgary, a former York County man, brother-in-law of Hon. J. D. Hazen, and a cousin of Ex-Ald. A. H. VanWart of this city, suffered a considerable loss by burglary recently, valuable property being stolen from his home in Calgary during the absence of his family from his city home.

The Calgary Albertan of Saturday printed the following concerning the incident:

Cut glass, silverware and furs valued at \$1,400, were stolen from the residence of I. S. G. VanWart, Thirteen avenue and Sixth street, west, recently, by burglars during the absence of the VanWarts at Banff.

Entrance was gained by forcing a rear window with a burglar's "jimmy." The thief or thieves were evidently aware of the absence of the occupants from the city and evidently consumed considerable time in ransacking the residence. The theft was discovered upon the return of the family from Banff.

Chief Cuddy's men, within twelve hours after being notified of the theft, arrested a colored man, Onie Giggins, and his wife and charged them with robbery. Some of the stolen property was recovered. Giggins and his wife will be tried on Wednesday.

SPRAINED ANKLE AT WINNIPEG

Word has been received here that the journey of Dr. and Mrs. Atherton who are on their way to California to spend the winter was delayed some days at Winnipeg where Mrs. Atherton had the misfortune to sprain her ankle. The Calgary Albertan of Friday last had the following item concerning the Dr. and Mrs. Atherton at that time in Calgary:—"Dr. A. B. Atherton of Fredericton, N.B., one of the leading surgeons of the Maritime provinces, is in the city on his way to the Pacific coast. Dr. Atherton was the Liberal standard bearer in York county, N. B., in the Federal election. He is accompanied by Mrs. Atherton and they intend spending the next few weeks at Vancouver. They will go to California to spend the winter."

NORTON GRIFFITHS CO ASK FOR SUBSIDY FROM PROVINCE

W. Burton Stewart of Montreal and W. H. Thorne of St. John interviewed Provincial Govt. This Morning--Other Business

Mr. W. Burton Stewart of Montreal, representing the Norton Griffiths Company, which is making the improvements at Courtenay Bay, East St. John, and Mr. W. H. Thorne of St. John, president of the Imperial Dry Dock Company, appeared before the provincial government this morning and asked that the province assist the undertaking of the Norton Griffiths Company by guaranteeing the sinking fund on its bond issues with regard to St. John improvements. The company has made a similar request of the City of St. John, desiring joint action in this particular by the province and that city. Mr. Stewart, interviewed by a representative of The Mail after the session of the government, stated that the proposition had been placed before its members and consideration promised.

THE PROPOSITION.

The company is asking the City of St. John and province to guarantee the sinking fund on its bond issue and propose as a consideration for this assistance to reclaim about 250 acres south and east of the breakwater which will be available as a site for an iron and steel plant, a shipbuilding plant and other industries.

The federal government is guaranteeing the interest on the bonds out the company has had to make provision for a sinking fund. They want St. John and the province jointly to agree to guarantee a payment equal to about one per cent. on the bond issue, which would be applied to the sinking fund. Supposing the dry dock earned nothing this would mean that the local government and the city together would be asked to put up about \$48,000 a year. If the dry dock earns \$80,000 the first year then the city and the province will only have to put up the balance, or \$18,000.

CONSIDERABLE BUSINESS.

A considerable amount of routine business is to be transacted by the government which began sessions last night. The alterations in the moving-picture show regulations have not yet been considered. It is possible that the business may not all be concluded tonight.

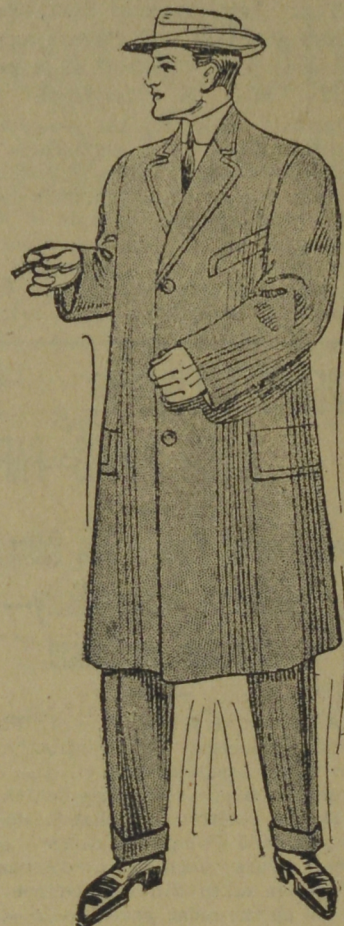
