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### MORRISSY MUST GO

The Newcastle Advocate, a Tory newspaper, which is supposed to voice the sentiments of Hon. Donald Morrison, is angry at Hon. John Morriessy because of a speech he delivered before a Liberal club at Calgary during his recent visit to the west. The Advocate takes the ground that Hon. Mr. Morriessy as a member of a Conservative government—not a coalition government, mark you—has no right to do missionary work in the west for Sir Wilfrid Laurier and his party. The Advocate in accusing Mr. Morriessy of inconsistency seems to be unmindful of the fact that the Chief Commissioner labors under the belief that the government of New Brunswick is coalition and therefore he has as good a right to express his views as a Liberal as Premier Flemming or Provincial Secretary McLeod have to promulgate the doctrine of Toryism. Looking at the matter from that standpoint the Chief Commissioner's position is quite tenable. If he was honest in the opinion which he gave expression to at Calgary, the people of this province who applaud the partisan utterances of the Tory members of the administration have no right to complain particularly when Hon. Mr. Morriessy was considerate enough to travel a couple of thousand miles from home to give expression to his Liberal views.

The Advocate is good enough to concede Hon. Mr. Morriessy the right to hold whatever opinions in Dominion politics that commend themselves to his judgment, "but" it says "If the Conservatives in this country who put him in the position he now occupies should resent his public advocacy of policies to which they are strongly opposed, and take practical steps to make their resentment effective, he must not be surprised."

This is certainly interesting. Mr. Morriessy is told that he owes his present position to the Conservatives of Northumberland. We were under the impression—in fact we have heard the Chief say so on more than one occasion—that he owes his position to the Liberal voters of Northumberland, and that he does not care the snap of his fingers for the Tories of his county, and never did.

After reading the Chief's lecture for his supposed breach of discipline the Advocate proceeds to tell him that the Tory party in Northumberland is stronger than ever, and that Mr. Morriessy who is described as a "quasi" Tory and an "anomaly" is not to be tolerated much longer. "If he only had sense enough, continues the Advocate "to bridle his tongue a little, and not proclaim his Liberalism from the house-tops, matters might be allowed to drift along; but when he takes no pains to conceal the fact that he is prepared to assist in thwarting the policy which the party which placed him in office is doing its best to carry out and instead to foster one to which it is bitterly opposed, he cannot be surprised if they say he must go. The welfare of the Conservative party in this county demands that he should."

It really is beginning to look as if the Chief would not be able to ride astride of two horses very much longer. He has rendered good service to the Tory party in this province by posing as a Liberal but since the recent election they have become embued with the idea that they can get along without his assistance and he will likely be called upon before long to walk the plank.

The Newcastle Advocate, organ of Hon. Donald Morrison says that Chief Commissioner Morriessy must go. Commodore Stewart should get busy and file his application for the job. He is a good Conservative and on that ground surely he can count on the support of the Advocate.

Carleton County potato growers are being offered fifty and sixty cents per barrel by shippers for their potatoes. Across the line in Houlton the price ranges from \$1 to \$1.10 per barrel and shipments are reported to be brisk.

During the election campaign of a year ago the flag flappers insulted the intelligence of the farmers by telling them that they were unable to grow hay of a quality suitable for the American market, therefore they would derive no benefit from the reciprocity agreement. What are the facts? During the months of April, May and June of this year according to the records of the Consular agency here, no less than eight thousand tons of hay were shipped out of Central New Brunswick to the American market.

It is evident from the reply made to a telegram sent to their convention by the Grain Growers' Guide that the Canadian Manufacturers are not keen for an increase of the British preference.
