ULSTERITES SIGN THE SOLEMN LEAGUE AND COVENANT

(Continued from page one)

In comparison with the demonstrations held elsewhere during the past week, the absence of talk of armed resistance was noticeable. Also there was a less display of military spirit in Belfast today. The day, however, gave a remarkable indication of Ulster's determination not to accept Home Rule. This determination was expressed in an orderly and enthusiastic manner which can hardly fail to provide the government with food for serious reflection.

The Weekly Outlook tonight makes the startling announcement that one-third of the officers in the British army are Irishmen, that over ninety per cent. of them are Unionist Protestants, and that they are now considering how to resign their commissions in order to lead Ulster in arms against Home Rule.

A VAST CROWD.

Hours before the time for the commencement of the meeting a vast crowd had congregated about Ulster Hall. The proprietors of neighboring warehouses took precautions against possible trouble by barricading their windows.

When the doors of Ulster Hall were opened there was a wild rush of ticket holders, who speedily filled the 3,000 seats. The hall was tastefully decorated with Union Jacks. The most conspicuous feature of the decorative scheme was a device stretched across the front of the platform in big letters of which read: "We will not have Home Rule."

In the absence of the Duke of Abercorn, who was unable to attend, Lord Londonderry presided. Among those on the platform were Sir Edward Carson, the Marquis of Salisbury, Baron Wilkoughby de Broke, Lord Charles Beresford, the Earls of Kilmorey, Clew William, Erne and Leitrim, Frederick E. Smith and many other Unionist members of parliament.

"ULSTER NOT BLUFFING."

During the wait for the speech-making to commence the crowd frequently burst into song. Among these songs was one beginning: "Ulstermen the time has come again to stand united man to man with all our might and main." This song aroused the greatest enthusiasm.

Lord Londonderry in opening the proceedings said the determination of the Unionists of Ulster to oppose home rule never had been more significantly shown than in the campaign which was just closing. Those that signed the covenant tomorrow he declared would abide by it at all hazards.

"Premier Asquith and John Redmond (loud hooting) will learn from it," continued Lord Londonderry, "that Ulster is not bluffing. The covenant is something that they cannot ignore."

Many letters from prominent Unionist leaders were read. These apologized for their inability to attend and expressed sympathy with the objects of the meeting. Andrew Bonar Law, the Unionist leader in the

House of Commons writes: "Victory in my opinion is certain. As leader of the largest party in the house of commons I am in a position to assure the people of Ulster that in this struggle they do not stand alone but can rely upon the support of the whole Unionist party."

Arthur J. Balfour's letter said: "Nothing can make me believe that the British people or even the house of commons which now so grossly misrepresents them would dare attempt to drive Ulster out of the union. Let me not be told that there will ever be found a British government sufficiently wicked or a house of commons sufficiently subservient to say to Ulster 'leave us or we'll shoot you down.'"

"The government has wrecked the constitution," said Lord Lansdowne's letter "but it also has succeeded in wrecking its own reputation. The recent bye-elections revealed the extent to which it is discredited and in its attempt to wreck the union it will fail as its predecessors failed in 1886 and 1893."

The lord mayor of Belfast after the reading of the letters moved a resolution denouncing home rule.

BATTLE OF BOYNE FLAG UNFURLED

There was a dramatic scene when Sir Edward Carson rose to speak. The entire audience stood and cheered him for several seconds and then burst into the refrain 'For He's a Jolly Good Fellow. Then the stalwart Col. Wallace, representing the Orangemen advanced slowly to the platform, and unfurled and waved solemnly and presented to Sir Edward Carson the flag which was carried to the front by King William at the battle of the Boyne. In making the presentation Colonel Wallace delivered a stirring speech concluding with "this flag will be borne before Carson at the signing of the covenant tomorrow."

BRING ACTION

The members of the Nepisiguit Real Estate and Fishing Association have brought action against the Drummond Iron Mines, Ltd. for alleged damage to fishing properties on the Nepisiguit River caused by mining operations. The association is composed of wealthy Americans.

London, Sept. 28.—The league and covenant against Home Rule as well as the women's declaration was signed today in London and other cities of the United States.

CARSON WAS FIRST.

Belfast, Sept. 28.—Sir Edward Carson today wrote his name as the first to sign the solemn covenant of the Ulster men which binds them "to use all the means that may be found necessary for defeat of the present conspiracy to set up Home Rule in Ireland," and also to refuse to recognize the authority of an Irish parliament. He was followed by many men who have become noted leaders in the campaign against Home Rule and these were succeeded by thousands of the rank and file of the Orangemen and Unionists in the northern provinces of Ireland.

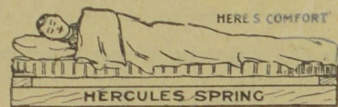
