CHARLIE DOOIN CHARGED WITH DOCTORING BALL

President Lynch will Investigate Alleged Attempt At Chicago on Friday Afternoon Last.

President Lynch of the National League has promised a thorough investigation into the facts regarding the banishing of Charlie Dooin of the Phillies from the grounds by Umpire Rigger in Friday's game with the Cubs at Chicago. Dooin was caught by Rigger putting a mysterious chemical on the ball in the third inning, in an effort to hamper Lavender, the Cubs' pitcher. Dooin has been known to have attempted the same thing on other occasions and Evers and Chance bore a close watch on him Friday. A ball was fouled toward the Philadelphia bench and when Dooin, who was not playing retrieved it, he held it longer than Rigger thought necessary. The umpire detected odors which gave strength to his belief that Dooin was working his old game. Chance then made the charge openly.

From the beginning of the game Lavender had complained to Chance that several balls which had been retrieved after being fouled had been smeared with something that burned his lips and fingers in the same manner in which O'Toole had suffered a week ago.

The ball in question will be submitted as "Exhibit A" at the investigation.

TYRUS COBB'S BATTING FEATURE OF BIG LEAGUES

Twenty Three Hits in Eight Games--Tris Speaker Second to Cobb in American Batting List--Burns Leads National League With 500 Average

The phenomenal batting of Tyrus Raymond Cobb of the Detroit team overshadowed anything else in the hitting line in the American League last week, the Georgian wonder putting in the best six consecutive days of his career. In eight games Cobb got 23 hits, in 36 times at bat, for a total average of .44. These bingles included two home runs, six three-baggers, three two-baggers, and an even dozen bingles.

Just what Cobb did with the stick last week is here recapitulated:

All this heavy sticking brought Ty's batting average up 26 points in a single week and unless he has a decided and prolonged slump, it is unlikely that he will be found back in the 300 crowd again this season.

Incidentally, Cobb's average for last week alone was .635.

Next to Cobb is Tris Speaker of the Red Sox, who is marked at .394. Of the 19 others at present in the 300 group Jackson and Lajoie are respectively third and fourth. Two other Bostonians in the list are Jake Stahl and Larry Gardner, who are hitting for .303 and .310 respectively.

M. & M. AT DETROIT TOMORROW GREAT GRAND CIRCUIT EVENT

Record Breaking Entry List--Bergen Heavily Backed to Win Race--Dictator Todd Also Favored

The Grand Circuit carries in Detroit this week, and sport that will surpass anything the beautiful Michigan city has seen in the nearly a quarter of a century it has been a member of the big chain is anticipated. The entry list is a record breaker, and the field in the famous \$10,000 Merchants and Manufacturers' purse is a sensational one.

After three days of unpleasant weather the clouds broke yesterday afternoon, and the promise is for sunshine with a fast track this afternoon. For the first time Frank Walker will do the starting, and it will be a relief to Detroit crowds not to see some of its high class fields scored to death.

The M. and M. on Wednesday is the star attraction, and only five years ago when Sonoma Girl and Highball raced for the rich prize has this famous event had a field of so much known speed.

Bergen, 2:06½, on public form has the foot of the field, and despite his bad manners will carry a lot of public money. Geers has won this race the past two years, and the talent will play his mount to the limit. If the master can keep his pupil on a trot he ought to make a third in a row, for none of the other starters has shown ability to race a mile in 2:06½.

Murphy will start both Dictator Todd and Queen Worthy. He will probably drive the Todd horse as the Queen has shown to be as fast. The Connecticut trotter has improved since his first race, and acts as if he would continue to. On a trot all the time and able to step in 2:08½, with something left, he will be dangerous.

Queen Worthy is a daughter of The Queen who 13 years ago was a factor in the M. and M. won by Royal Baron from Kingmond. She is good headed, but up to date has not appeared to have lick enough to top the summary.

The Cochrane 4-year-old Biene Holt will have quite a following, as he won easily at Grand Rapids. He did not race last week, being shipped direct to Detroit so as to be in the best of condition. Dave Halle, the Peter the Great 4-year-old, who who was beaten last week after winning a heat in 2:09½, is apt to be in the running. He was short, having been laid up with a bad leg in his first start, but Shank is confident he will race faster and longer this week.

LAST DELEHANTY DEPARTS FROM BIG LEAGUE BASEBALL

Detroit, July 22—Jim Delehanty, the Detroit infielder and outfielder has been released by Manager Hughie Jennings. The release of Delehanty marks the passing out of the big leagues of the last member of the famous Delehanty brothers all of whom were wonderful diamond stars.

Delehanty was considered one of the best players in the American League when he was traded to Detroit by Washington several years ago. At the time he was an infielder and covered second base for the Tigers. "Del" like his brother Ed, who is now dead, was a great b. b. his timely wallops for extra bases winning many a game for Jennings' crew when the Tigers were fighting for the pennant in the American League. Delehanty showed up this season and has been playing the outfield. Jennings is planning several more changes in his club.
