CANADIAN NORTHERN READY IN TWO YEARS

(Toronto News)
Sir Donald Mann, who returned recently from the West, stated that though the Canadian Northern will probably link the Atlantic and Pacific by the end of 1913, it is not likely that the road will be ready for through passenger traffic for a couple of years. "We are trying to get the tracks completed by the end of next year and we hope to do so, but they are not likely to be ready for passenger traffic for about two years from this present month."

Sir Donald confirmed the report that the company had decided to build branch lines through British Columbia instead of confining themselves to the main lines, as has hitherto been their stated intention. Several of these spurs will be ready for use as soon as the main line is through, the first and most important running in a southerly direction from Kamloops and tapping the fertile Okanagan Valley.

CROP PROSPECT

Sir Donald is enthusiastic over the western crop situation. "Prospects were never better," said he, "and the farmer west of me goes the better for it." He expects that all previous records will be thrust into obscurity by the returns of the present year. There is not the least probability, however, he believes, that any wheat will find outlet from Canada this year by the Pacific route, so that all efforts to alleviate congestion similar to that of last year must come from the east of the prairie country.

He said that nothing definite had been done with regard to the \$5,000,000 steel plant merger at Port Arthur. Plans for the new C.N.R. shops at Port Mann, the Pacific terminus, have not yet been approved. It is said, however, that the original scheme is being extended, and the total cost of the shops will run into millions.

WRECKER OF FARMERS BANK AGAIN ON WITNESS STAND

Toronto, July 20.—At the Farmers' Bank enquiry on Tuesday afternoon, Prisoner Travers, ex-manager, was again put on the stand.

"You have heard the evidence given by the men, one of whom you said had suggested taking \$3,000 to Ottawa. What have you to say?" enquired Mr. Hodgins.

"I'll say I don't think it was Mr. Stratton, because it was in my office upstairs and he never was there."

"I think that if I had the cheque I could refresh my memory so that I would be able to tell," he continued.

Travers was shown stubs of cheques but said that he was unable to identify the cheque from the stubs.

"I cannot find a C on any of these stubs," he said.

"What is there on the cheque which will assist you to remember who told you to take the money to Ottawa?" asked Mr. Hodgins.

WANTS THE NUMBER.

"I want to see the number on the back. It will be the number of some body's room. I want to see the date that I paid the cheque," replied Travers.

He was shown another cheque and asked if it was the one with which he had drawn out the money to meet the missing cheque.

"I don't think it was," he said. He said he had wanted to have the money in his possession as he knew all the bank's money was in Ottawa, and he did not know when it would come back owing to "the hitch." He could not say definitely just what he meant by "the hitch."

"You got scared and sent Mr. Hunter back?" asked Mr. Hodgins.

"Oh, I wouldn't say so. I heard his evidence and would not care to contradict it," replied Travers.

He said that he could not tell from what bank he had drawn out the money which he kept in his drawer to pay the \$3,000 cheque.

MR. RYAN SAW HIM.

"I want to add to my evidence that on June 17th I was up in the liquidator's office. Mr. Clarkson was there and Mr. Peter Ryan came up. Mr. Clarkson stepped out and Mr. Ryan told me to be brave, that he would look after my interests. I do not know whether the guard heard or not, but I think he could have heard," he said.

HORSE SHOW AT LONG BRANCH

Long Branch, N. J., July 23.—Because of the prominence of many of the exhibitors and the large field of show and racehorses entered, more than usual interest has been aroused in the nineteenth annual exhibition of the Monmouth County Horse Show Association, which will open at Hollywood Park tomorrow and continue

until the end of the week. During the four days' competition a total of fifty-nine classes will be judged and an aggregate of nearly \$7,000 in the prizes will be awarded. In addition to the regular classes for saddle horses, hunters and jumpers, and harness horse classes a number of special features will be introduced in the nature of military jumping competitions and four running races.
