AVERAGE HAY CROP AT LEAST EXPECTED IN THIS SECTION

Heavier Exportations to United States Market Expected During Coming Year--Requirements of Market Now Better Known

MORE THAN \$200,000 WORTH OF HAY SHIPPED LAST YEAR

Reports from various sections of the western portion of the province are to the effect that the hay crop will be up to the average as far as quantity is concerned if not above and that with favorable weather for cutting the quality will be excellent. The haying season is well under way but has been interfered to some extent by wet weather. If the present rains do not continue any great length of time however the hay-crop will be cut in good condition.

Heavier exportations of hay to the United States market are expected this year as provincial dealers have obtained a good foothold and in spite of an adverse tariff expect to remain and increase their share of the market. New Brunswick hay was criticized during the past spring and winter on account of its quality not being up to the standard required by the Boston and New York markets, and suggestions concerning earlier cutting and changes in method of curing and pressing were made by dealers in these cities and are being followed in some cases.

Some idea of the value of the United States market to the farmers and hay-shippers of this part of New Brunswick can be obtained from the statement of exports to the United States entered at the Fredericton Consular agency of that country during the fiscal year ending June 30th last. The statement is as follows:—

BUILDERS LABORERS STRUCK THIS MORNING

Forty five Men Walked off the Jobs --Both Strikers and Employers are Firm

The Builders' Laborers' Union this morning called out its members on strike, the employers not having acceded to the demand of the Union that the daily wage be increased from \$1.75 to \$2.00 per day. The members of the union say that about forty-five men have walked out and that they have good prospects of carrying their point. The strikers include not only members of the Union but also prospective members.

The employers state that conditions do not warrant giving the increase in wages that is demanded and are of the opinion that they can replace the strikers. The latter say that they have the support of the Masons and Bricklayers as well as other organized labor and state further that their demands are not unreasonable in view of existing conditions.

The factory buildings of the John Palmer Co. and the Palmer-McLellan Shoe-pack Co. are most seriously affected but laborers have also been called off other building operations in the city.

EXPRESS OFFICIALS GET INFORMATION RE DELIVERY LIMITS

Prominent Officials Arrived Last Night by Special Car over Gibson Branch --Were about City this Morning

JAS. HARDWELL OF RAILWAY COMMISSION HERE

Fredericton today is visited by a number of prominent officials of the Dominion and Canadian Express companies who, together with a member of the board of the Railway Commission, are here for the purpose of inquiring into local conditions as far as the delivery of express matter is concerned. The party arrived over the Gibson Branch of the C. P. R. last night, travelling in Supt. Downie's private car, Rosemere.

This morning accompanied by Mr. J. W. Smith, local agent for the Dominion Express Company, the visitors were driven about the city and inspected the limits which it is proposed to place upon the area for the delivery of express matter.

The party is composed of Mr. V. G. Vickers of Montreal, superintendent of the Dominion Express Company, Mr. James Hardwell of Ottawa, a member of the board of Railway Commissioners; Mr. H. C. Creighton of St. John, superintendent of the Canadian Express Company, Mr. W. H. Burr, of Toronto, manager of traffic of the Dominion Express Company and Mr. J. W. Branscombe of St. John also of the Dominion Express Company.

The visitors waited upon his Worship Mayor Hooper this morning and also upon the City Clerk. The civic authorities however are taking no part in the matter which is between the Railway Commission and the express companies. Sometime ago the commission ordered the limits for the delivery of express matter to be extended to the city limits. As far as Fredericton is concerned the companies claim that such an order is unreasonable and have asked that the limits be placed as they were before. Mr. Hardwell will make a recommendation on this matter to the Railway commission.

C. P. R. POLICE FAILED TO LOCATE MISSING WIFE

Resident of Tracy Wired To Have Woman Arrested and Sent Home--Understood She Left Train

MEN FINED AT MCADAM FOR BEATING WAY ON TRAIN

On the strength of instructions wired to McAdam by Fred Golden of Tracy, the C. P. R. police at that place last night made careful search of all west-bound trains for the purpose of locating his wife, who had left home yesterday. The telegram received instructed the police to arrest the woman when they found her and send her back to her home.

The trains were searched by Officers Gardner and Foster but the missing woman was not located. It was learned that she had boarded a west-bound train at Tracy but had left it at Harvey Station and that her whereabouts were unknown.

On the south-bound express from Edmundston yesterday two men attempted to beat their way and locked themselves in a toilet room refusing to pay the conductors their fares. Officer A. R. Foster of the C.P.R. police arrested the men and took them to McAdam. At that place they appeared before Magistrate David Lawson and were fined ten dollars each or two months imprisonment. They gave the names of David Watkins and John Hamilton.

The C.P.R. authorities are determined to put a stop to the "beating" of way upon their trains and all who attempt to so defraud the company will be dealt with sharply.

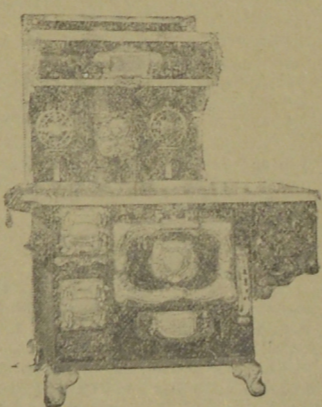
