INDEPENDENCE BOY  
BROKE BONE OF LEG  
AT COLUMBUS

Evelyn W. Won Free-for-all in Five Heats—Bon Zolock Won 2.19 Trot

Columbus, Oct. 3.—The most remarkable long-distance pacing race in history was staged at the Grand Circuit meeting this afternoon, Evelyn W., and Earl Jr., fighting five heats for first honors in the free-for-all class, the time of the event averaging a shade better than 2.03.

The event was marred by an accident to the fast local horse Independence Boy which broke a bone in his left hind leg just after the start of the first heat and will probably never race again.

It was a day of split-heat races, all of the events going five heats, and the 2.07 pace was carried over until tomorrow, unfinished with three different heat winners.

Weather conditions as well as those of the track were ideal and of the 10 heats raced in the two pacing races the fastest was 2.01½ and the slowest 2.08, with an average a shade faster than 2.04½ which shows just how fiercely the side-wheelers were fighting for the money.

## RACE FOR BON ZOLOCK

The Kentucky mare Belle Ashland with which the veteran Crit Davis won such a good race here last week was favorite for the 2.19 trot but the best she could do was to win the third heat taking a record of 2.10.

Miss Davis won the first heat, but the race went to Bon Zolock, a very fast trotter who has been unsteady in his previous starts. Belle Ashland was not equal to beating the flag in the final heat.

The 2.07 paces put up a corking contest and the event is still undecided. Babe and Ty Cobb have two heats each and Walter Cochato one.

SELLS HIS SHARE IN  
CHICAGO CUBS

Received \$40,000 for Stock—Denies That he Will Sever Connection With That Club

Chicago, Oct. 3.—Frank L. Chance, manager of the Chicago National League Baseball Club, today announced that he had sold his stock in the Cubs to Harry Ackerman of Pittsburgh. Chance said that he received \$40,000 for the stock.

Chance's dividends on his stock paid for it all but \$50 the first year he held it and that sum was made up to him by Pres. Murphy. His holding of the stock amounted to about 10 per cent. of the total.

Chance denied that he intended to sever his connection with the Cubs.

"I expect to stay right here and manage the team," he said. "I'm still manager of the Cubs and I have satisfactory reasons for believing I am to be retained in that position."

Chance said, however, that if he did not manage the Cubs he would manage some other ball club. He added that he had had no meeting with Pres. Murphy and had no meeting definitely in view.

Murphy, when asked tonight what negotiations, if any, had taken place during the day between him and his manager, replied that he had nothing to say.
