



THE WORK OF THE ST. JOHN RIVER COMMISSION

(Bangor Commercial.)

The International St. John River
Commission was in session Friday
and Saturday at Van Buren, and
while there was no evidence taken the
meeting of the commission was an
important one, the members being
given an opportunity to witness the
sorting of logs on the river at the St.
John Lumber Co.'s mills. It was
the delay in sorting of the logs of
the spring drives that led to the
bloodless "Van Buren War" of sev-
eral years ago, and was the climax
of a series of river difficulties that
led to the appointment of the present
commission by the governments of
the United States and the Dominion
of Canada to investigate the condi-
tions and uses of the river. The
commission started out to investi-
gate the river in connection with its
navigation for log driving purposes,
but its authority was extended to a
broader field and it was instructed
to look into the question of the ad-
visability and feasibility of conserv-
ing the waters of the river and the
tributaries.

All the members of the commission
were present at Van Buren Friday
and Saturday: M. G. Teed, K.C., of
St. John, chairman; Hon. John
Keefe of St. John, Hon. George A.
Murchie of Calais, and Peter Charles
Keegan, Esq., of Van Buren; A. J.
Gregory, K.C., and W. P. Jones, K.
C., counsel for the Canadian side, and
Hon. O. F. Fellows of this city, coun-
sel for the United States, were also
present. The board of consulting en-
gineers, which has been working in
connection with the commission, mak-
ing an important survey of the river
in order to furnish the necessary data
upon which the commission will base
a large part of its report, was not
represented.

The commission visited the plant
of the St. John Lumber Co., and
watched the work of sorting the logs
of the drive as they passed through
the sorting gaps and on down the
river. In addition to that they made
an inspection of the river from Wood-
stock to Van Buren.

PERIL FOR BABIES IN VACUUM BOTTLE

"Do not use the milk in any cir-
cumstances if the temperature has
fallen below 115 degrees," is the
warning sounded in an article in The
Journal of the American Medical As-
sociation, just issued, in which at-
tention is called to the dangers of
the vacuum bottle when it is used to
store liquid food for infants. Through
tests, however, the article asserts, it
has been learned that "properly used,
the bottle not only keeps the milk
warm but effectually pasteurizes it."

In describing the tests the article
says:

"For the first set of experiments an
initial temperature of 150 was cho-
sen. The milk was heated to the de-
sired temperature and transferred to
vacuum bottles which had previously
been warmed by immersion in hot
water. When treated in this way the
temperature of the milk remained
germinal for from six to ten hours,
depending on the temperature of the
place in which the bottle was stored.
After that time and as the tempera-
ture fell below 115 the bacteria began
to multiply rapidly and soon reached
enormous numbers."

The following directions are given
for using the vacuum bottle:

"Warm the milk, properly modifi-
ed, until a thermometer immersed in it
registers 150, and pour it into a
vacuum bottle previously warmed by
hot water. Stopper the bottle tight-
ly and put it in a warm place. At
feeding time take the temperature
with a thermometer. If the reading
is above 115 fill the nursing bottle,
allow the milk to cool a few minutes
and proceed with the feeding."

It was arranged at this meeting to
have another session in Van Buren
June 18. This will be an important
meeting as the two consulting engi-
neers, Hardy S. Ferguson of New
York, and S. J. Chapleau of Ottawa,
are to file their report before the
commission. This report will repre-
sent the result of many months' work
done by a large engineering crew un-
der the direction of Mr. H. Ranney of
Mohawk, N.Y., who was field engineer
for the commission.

The report will be filed at the
meeting in June, but it is understood
that the examination of the engineers
will not be made until later, at a
hearing which is to be held in this
city.
