**LUCKY DRAW**  
 FOR KILBANE OVER  
 JIMMY WALSH

Champion made no Wonderful Show-  
 ing—Flashy Boxer like Philadelphia  
 Jack O'Brien

On the Kilbane-Walsh bout The  
 Boston Globe has the following to  
 say:  
 Johnny Kilbane, champion feather-  
 weight, showed the Boston sports  
 last night in a twelve-round bout  
 with Jimmy Walsh at the Pilgrim  
 A.A. what he was capable of doing,  
 and the best he got was a draw. He  
 was lucky to get that and he failed  
 to impress the fans that he was the  
 wonderful boxer that he has been  
 touted by the sports of other cities.  
 He is a flashy workman of the Phila-  
 delphia Jack O'Brien type, without  
 having a great sting to his blows.  
 Kilbane is very fast on his feet, a  
 good feinter, but a boxer who does  
 not take the initiative often. As far  
 as cleverness, he had nothing on  
 Walsh, but he did have weight, height  
 and reach on the little Boston lad.

## KILBANE'S HOLDINGS.

One of his tricks, which is a viola-  
 tion of the rules, is holding his op-  
 ponent with the right around the  
 neck and while pulling him about the  
 ring upcutting with his left. He  
 tried it often on Walsh, but the lat-  
 ter was wise and blocked the upper-  
 cuts most of the time.  
 Walsh's boxing was a big surprise  
 to most of the fans, who figured Kil-  
 bane at least a 5 to 1 favorite. The  
 Boston boy showed no fear of the  
 champion, for he did the leading in  
 eight of the twelve rounds, and tied  
 Kilbane up so well in the clinches  
 that the latter did not have much  
 chance to land blows.

The decision, rendered by Referee  
 Maritt Flaherty seemed to satisfy  
 the fans.

When the announcer introduced the  
 boxers he did not state, as is the  
 custom, that the pair were going to  
 box to a decision, and that ac-  
 count many are of the opinion that  
 it was arranged that if both men were  
 on their feet at the end of the twelve  
 rounds, the bout was to be called a  
 draw, as it was.

## LACING FOR CHAMPION.

It is many years since such a  
 crowd attended a boxing match in  
 this city, and among the 4000 persons  
 present was noticed many prominent  
 in this part of the country.  
 The bout was about as fast as any  
 ardent admirer of the sport would  
 care to see and it was a scientific  
 one from start to finish. The boxers  
 agreed to meet at catchweights and  
 break clean at the command of the  
 referee, and Kilbane alone violated  
 that clause.

## KILBANE COMES BACK.

It was not until about half the  
 journey was over that Kilbane dis-  
 played any unusual qualities, except  
 as regards feinting and footwork. He  
 jabbed Walsh often with the left but  
 only a few of them sent the Boston  
 boy back. Outside of the times when  
 he was mixing it with Walsh at close  
 range, Kilbane used his right only a  
 few times and the blows stung Walsh  
 as they landed on the jaw and side  
 of the face.

At times Kilbane made Walsh do  
 considerable missing, but his flashy  
 work did not muddle the Boston boy  
 up to any great extent. Whenever  
 Walsh did start to mix, he had the  
 better of the argument.

In the ninth round, Walsh gave the  
 champion quite a lacing after he had  
 caught a hard left hook on the eye.  
 The champion lost his temper during  
 the rapid fire work and wrestled  
 Walsh to the floor.
