



MURDER WAS

CLEVERLY PLANNED

Moosejaw, Sask., Dec. 13—Cunningly planned and cleverly carried into effect was the murder of Ralph Warwick on a homestead near Iverman on the night of November 18th. Last night his wife on the witness stand at the corner's inquest told how she and Stanley Price planned the details. Mrs. Warwick is a Newcastle Eng. girl, pretty and barely out of her teens.

Looking the crown prosecutor squarely in the eye, she told of having met Stanley Price nearly a year ago. She fell in love with him and six months later went to live at his homestead as housekeeper and common law wife. She had been there a month when Price proposed she should marry Ralph Warwick, get him to turn all his belongings over to her and make a will in her favor. To this she consented and laid her snares for Warwick. After wooing him two months, he proposed marriage. She lived with her husband until he was beaten to death, but all the time kept up relations with Price.

BOSTON NATIONALS SIGN

NEW RIGHT-HANDER

Ira B. Hogue of the Anderson Club of the Carolina Association, was signed last Thursday for next season by Manager Stallings of the Boston National League Club. Hogue is a right-handed pitcher and his record is a promising one. During 1911 he won 22 games, lost 10 and tied 1 game. He was taken out of 5 games and finished 2. His pitching percentage that year was .670 and he batted for .279. His record for 1912 is even better.

He is 24 years old, 5 feet, 11 inches tall and weighs 175 pounds. He pitches right-handed but is a left-handed batsman. Hogue, whose home is in Yosemite, Ky., played semi-professional baseball in 1910, was a member of the Norfolk Club of the Tidewater League, and was formerly a member of the New York American League Club, going to the Highlanders from the Richmond Club.

FROM BILL MAHONEY



MOSES SCHAFFER

AWARDED \$2,800

Ottawa, Dec. 9—Decision has been given in the Moses Schaffer case by Judge Cassilis awarding the plaintiff \$2,800 and all costs. This is a case that has been watched with much interest by a large number for years. It will be remembered that in July 1908 an Orange excursion was run from Loggieville to Marysville, and on the return trip Mr. Schaffer, who was one of the passengers for Blackville was thrown from the car steps at Blackville Station and received injuries from which he was laid up in the hospital for several months. An enquiry was held by J. S. Leighton, the then claims agent of the I.C.R. and from the report submitted by him the government refused to settle with Mr. Schaffer.

Later on Robert Murray, K.C., of Chatham filed the petition of right in the Exchequer Court, claiming \$20,000 damages and the case came on for trial at St. John in October 1911 before Judge Cassilis. On account of the illness of one of the important witnesses the case, was on application of R. A. Lawlor, K.C., who represented the Crown postponed until the next court.

The case came up again in Chatham last May before Judge Audette, associate judge of the Exchequer Court and many witnesses were heard.

Two weeks ago the case was argued before Judge Cassilis in Ottawa and the decision was given Saturday as above stated.


