WHITELAW REID

PASSES AWAY

(Continued from page one)

London, Dec. 15—Whitelaw Reid, the American ambassador to Great Britain, since 1905 and formerly editor of the New York Tribune, died at his London residence, Dorchester House, shortly after noon today from pulmonary oedema. The end was quite peaceful. Mrs. Reid and their daughter, Mrs. Hubert Ward, were at the bedside.

The ambassador had been unconscious, since nine o'clock in the morning twenty-four hours, he had been lying, and at intervals during the previous twenty-four hours, he had been slightly delirious as a result of the drugs administered to induce sleep. Sir Thomas Barlow, physician to the king, who was called in, last week, when Mr. Reid's illness became acute, and his regular physician, Dr. William Hale White, issued the following bulletin as to the cause of death:

CAUSE OF DEATH

"A fortnight ago the American ambassador had a slight bronchial attack, similar to others from which he had suffered at considerable intervals. On Wednesday last asthma supervened, and the asthmatic paroxysms became very severe, leading to extreme exhaustion. It was hoped that he might rally, as no pneumonic symptoms had appeared. With difficulty the paroxysms of asthma were got under control, but Sunday morning the exhaustion became extreme and he died from pulmonary oedema at 12.10 a. m."

The Hon. John Hubert Ward, who with his wife had been at Dorchester House continually since the Ambassador's condition became serious, notified the staff of the embassy when the patient began to sink, and when death occurred he sent word to the King and Queen at Buckingham Palace, the Queen Mother Alexandra at Sandringham, and the officials of the court.

Almost immediately the King sent his enquiry, Sir Harry Legge, to express the confidence of himself and the Queen. During the afternoon messages conveying the warmest sympathy were received from the Queen Mother Alexandra and the other members of the Royal family. The court officials, members of the government and of the various embassies and legations, while many who had heard the news of the Ambassador's death, or who had seen the flag at half mast, on Dorchester House, called at the embassy. A wireless message was also sent to Ogden Reid, the son of the Ambassador who had left New York yesterday in the hope of reaching his father's bedside before death.

VERDICT OF ACQUITTAL

For over a half an hour after the adjournment of court, the crowd in the court room rushed forward to grasp the hand of Mr. and Mrs. Emelius, Mrs. Jacobson and their attorneys, R. W. Shaw and Herschel Shaw. The happiest people in Maine last evening were the three who have been on trial for the past ten days. At the railroad station last evening The Telegraph representative saw them as they were taking the train for their home in New Sweden. Mr. Emelius said:

"I knew the truth would finally be revealed. We are so grateful to all who have been so kind to us. We will never be able to show half the gratitude for the many kindnesses shown us by our attorneys. I shall go back to my church at Stockholm and take up my duties once again."

In his charge to the jury, Judge Haley said in part: "To you is given the responsibility for deciding on the facts of the case. You are to decide the case on all the evidence. Consider whether witnesses testified truthfully or falsified. Take no sides. Weigh the testimony and see what it is worth."

He explained the difference between manslaughter and murder, and told the jury to give no weight to the indictments returned by the grand jury against the respondents. "You should disregard the suicide note except the suicide intent. A chain of circumstantial evidence is too strong for the weakest link," said Judge Haley. "It should stand the test."

"Use your own judgment in regard to the testimony of the experts. Weigh the testimony of Dr. Lagerstrom, who first declared August Jacobson was a suicide and afterwards that he had been murdered."

He charged that they must be convinced beyond a reasonable doubt that murder was committed.

LEGAL FIGHT OVER INTERNATIONAL BANK

Montreal, Dec. 12.—The affairs of the International Bank are once more in a legal tangle. After many rumors of absorption by various banks and subsequent denials, a sale was finally made to Sir Henry Pellat today. The sum of \$286,000 was paid over to the National Trust Company for 52,275 shares of stock held in France. The money, however, was no sooner paid to the National Trust Company than seizure was made upon it, and now it is tied up pending a long legal fight.

The firm of Sir Rodolphe Forget made the seizure, as some twenty of Paris shareholders of the International Bank are indebted to the Paris agency of the firm.

The legal fight may tie up the money for some months. In the meantime the Pellat syndicate are in control of the bank, and will undoubtedly proceed with their plans. The present trouble is a personal one between Sir R. Forget and the Parisian shareholders of the bank.
