The chief justice said that he had judgment from Mr. Justice Richrds to the same effect.

IMPROPER AND SUSPICIOUS ACTIONS.

Justice Perdue said that in rief, the effect of his judgment was he same. He felt that although it was shown that the magistrate acted in an improper and suspicious manner, it was not sufficiently established that he had acted from corrupt motives. He thought the court should use its discretion and refuse the order.

Mr. Justice Cameron said that he differed from the others. He thought that a prima facie case of corrupt motive had been made out. He hought, therefore, that the rule hould be made absolute.

INSUFFICIENT EVIDENCE FOR RULES.

Mr. Justice Haggart said that he agreed with the conclusions of Mr. Justice Richards. When the original application was made for the rule nisi, he thought there was insufficient evidence of corrupt motive for that rule. He thought there should be better evidence of corrupt motive produced and there was really no lirect evidence of corrupt motive.
