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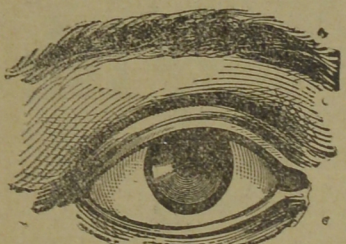

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COMMISSION

MAKES NEW RULING
ON FREE AGENTS

Player Transferred Without his own Consent Becomes Free Agent if Full Salary is not Paid

Cincinnati, March 22.—In one of two decisions made public today by the National Baseball Commission a new rule was adopted affecting players known as "free agents."

Player Charles A. Deal complained to the Commission that while a free agent he signed with the Philadelphia National League team at a stipulated salary for the playing season. On reporting on March 9 to go on the training trip with the team, he was informed that he had been released to the Lancaster team of the Tri-state League at a salary fifty per cent. less than he had signed for.

The Commission annulled the release to the Lancaster club and restored Deal to his status as a free agent. The rule adopted declared that a free agent who signs a contract with a National agreement club and is transferred without his consent to another club or is released without a trial, shall be declared a free agent if the club to which he is released does not assume the salary his original contract calls for.

Charles L. Herzog of the New York National League team was allowed \$375, half of the draft price paid by the Cincinnati National League team in 1911 to the Reading Club of the Tri-state for Pitcher Horsey. Herzog was allowed the amount because he had a written agreement with the Reading Club that he was to receive half of the draft price for the player in case he was drafted in 1910 or 1911. Herzog having induced Horsey to sign with the Reading Club.

NEW EDINBURGH CHAMPS

TO PLAY IN STATES

Ottawa, March 22.—The New Edinburgh Hockey Club, champions of the Interprovincial Amateur Hockey Union, have arranged to play games at Boston and New York next week. They leave Sunday and will play one game in each city. The New Edinburghs will take over their strongest team. Following the cancellation of the balance of the professional games they received an invitation this afternoon, which they will accept. They will be the third Ottawa team to go to those cities this winter. The Allan Cup trustees have definitely promised them games against the Victoria team next December.

The New Edinburghs have placed their team at the disposal of the committee in charge of the Ridpath benefit, and the game will take place Saturday night at the Arena. The weather turned cold here today, and ideal hockey conditions prevail.

CHARLOTTEVILLE

Washington American League Team also at that Place—Royals Look Good at this Stage

Charlottesville, Va., March 21.—Manager Billy Lush arrived at the training camp here yesterday morning only to find he was the first arrival. A short time later Eddie Bridges, the catcher secured by Montreal from Pittsburgh, two years ago reported for duty. Lush waited in vain for further additions to his battery staff. Late in the evening, Parsons and Leclair arrived and both declared they were in excellent shape. Several of the other pitchers are expected today.

The Washington American League team have been practising here for two weeks and Lush was a spectator at the game at Lambeth Park between the Washington regulars and yanigans.

Lush and Manager Clark Griffiths, of the Senators had a long talk at noon, and completed arrangements for the use of the ball park during the next few days. The Royal battery candidates are to work out with the Senators both morning and afternoon. Bridges and Lush both donned baseball togs and worked out with the Senators in the afternoon. It was ideal baseball weather. The thermometer registered 70 in the shade and the sun was heating down.

As the two Washington catchers, Tinsmith and Henry are slightly banged up, Bridges went in behind the bat and handled Walter Johnson, the Kansas City cyclone in great shape. Manager Griffith remarked to a number of onlookers—"That kid knows his business all right."

Bridges has taken care of himself this winter and says he is out to gain a regular berth on the Royals. His suspension last year has evidently taught him a lesson.

Lush is pleased with Charlottesville and the warm weather which greeted him. He says the Royals can get into splendid condition during their short stay.

As the Washington players do not leave until next Tuesday, the Royals are quartered in a down-town hostelry, the Gleason Hotel.

Manager Lush has four catchers and nine pitchers under contract. The catchers are Roth, Curtis, Angermier and Bridges, and the pitchers Barberich, Carroll, Viebaum, Leclair, Parsons, Taylor, Sitton, Zackert and Pressy.

The rest of the team will report for duty next Wednesday.

BASEBALL COM. SUEd BY CLUB

Staubenville, O., March 22.—The Staubenville-Mingo Baseball Association, owners of the Follansbee, W. Va., franchise in the Ohio and Pennsylvania League, this evening engaged a firm of local attorneys to bring an injunction suit in the United States District Court against the National Baseball Commission and the National Association of Minor Baseball Leagues, to restrain them from placing Staubenville on the "black list."

The new owners cannot play their games here unless the National Commission sanctions their action. Sunday baseball is allowed here, but not at Follansbee, and the new owners want the commission to withdraw the "black list" order so they can play their games here.

It is reported the injunction petition will charge the National Commission constitutes a baseball trust and is a combination in restraint of business in its domination over baseball.
