cation from Constantinople, went to the foreign office and conferred with Sir Edward Grey, the British foreign minister, for two hours.

Vienna, Nov. 4.—The correspondent of the Reichspost with the Bulgarian army says that the retreating Turks committed horrible savagery. All the villages were burned and all the Christians butchered. Many of the women were mutilated.

London, Nov. 4.—A dispatch from Antivari to the Express today says that part of old Montenegro Arsenal at old Antivari exploded Saturday morning. The dome of the arsenal was hurled in the air and eleven men were killed by falling masonry. Bursting shells caused all the havoc of a bombardment. The explosion continued intermittently throughout the day but the main arsenal was saved through the bravery of the Montenegrins who closed the connecting doors of the underground stores.

CALLED TO AMHERST.

Rev. Mr. Forster, who has accepted the position of rector in Christ Church, Amherst, is a son of ex-Warden Forster of Dorchester penitentiary. He has been carrying on successful church work in Providence for some years and is very highly spoken of by the bishop of that diocese. Christ Church is to be congratulated upon securing such an able and energetic rector. He is expected in Amherst to assume his new field of labor about December first. Rev. Mr. Forster was for several years curate of the Parish Church, this city. He is a young man of exceptional ability and made many friends here who will be glad to learn that he is returning to Canada.

WEDDING ANNIVERSARY.

The Sackville Tribune has the following:—"Saturday was the twenty-fifth anniversary of the marriage of Mr. and Mrs. Fred Ryan and on the evening of that day a goodly number of the men of the town got together armed themselves with guns, revolvers, etc., purchased a very fine china dish and proceeded to the residence of Mr. and Mrs. Ryan. Mr. Horace Ford as spokesman, presented the gift, expressing the kindly feeling which was entertained towards the bride and groom of a quarter of a century ago. Mr. and Mrs. Ryan very hospitably entertained the men, who later in the evening proceeded to serenade the happy couple, making the air resound with the discharge of firearms."

AT ST. PAUL'S CHURCH

In the course of his morning sermon at St. Paul's Presbyterian Church yesterday the minister, Rev. Dr. W. H. Smith, remarked that in all the time that he had been in the British Isles during the past summer he had not seen such evidences of drunkenness as he had on Carleton Street the preceding night. In the evening Rev. Dr. Smith preached on the subject "The Original Idiot." preacher traced the development of the meaning of the word from indicating a self-centred person to meaning an insane or weak-minded person. He dealt particularly with selfishness in the home, in the social life and in religion.

quit work. Mr. Hodge said that none of the company's men in Montreal would be affected, those going out being connected with the Ottawa, Pembroke and Arnprior districts. He said that there were fifty-two men in Ottawa and the strike there would likely tie up a part of the railways system until the men could be replaced.

Mr. Hodge further stated that the men interested included office clerks, station policemen, freight clerks and laborers.

The union is attempting to organize a number of departments of the system and is an unwieldy and unworkable affair, stated Mr. Hodge.

The superintendent said that demands made by the men would not be complied with by the G.P.R. and they would hire men to take their places. He said there was no trouble expected from Toronto as the members of the union held a meeting there yesterday and declined to go out.

AT WINNIPEG.

Winnipeg, Man., Nov. 4.—Not many members of the Canadian Brotherhood of Railway Employees obeyed the strike order this morning, only about thirty going out. Others may, however, join these this afternoon.

At Portage la Prairie, Brandon, Regina, Moosejaw and Calgary not more than 125 men went out.

POLICE COMMISSION TO SIT

The Police Commission is to meet tonight for the purpose of investigation the troubles which arose Halloween between the regular and special policemen. A number of witnesses have been called. Ald. Guthrie, chairman of the commission, it is understood, did not consider the matter worth investigation by the commission but other members of that body insisted that an investigation be held.

PREACHED TO LARGE CONGREGATIONS.

Rev. Robert Smart of St. John, preached to large congregations at the Methodist Church yesterday. Rev. Neil MacLauchlan, the pastor, being absent from the city. At the evening service a very enjoyable solo was sung by Mrs. W. S. Carter.

PRESENTATION TO BISHOP.

At a meeting of the Catholics of St. John held last evening, it was decided that the farewell testimonial to His Grace Archbishop Casey take the form of an address and purse to be presented at a reception on the eve of His Grace's departure for Vancouver. It was also decided that the arrival of Bishop-elect LeBlanc be marked by the presentation of an address and chalice as a mark of good will on the part of the people of St. John.
