### TAFT AT NEWARK EXERCISES

Newark, N. J., Nov. 2—With a military parade and interesting exercises a magnificent bronze statue of Washington, a gift to the city of Newark from the late Amos H. Van Horn, was formally dedicated today. President Taft and a number of other notable guests as well as a large concourse of citizens were present. The dedication ceremonies were presided over by Justice Francis Swayze, of the New Jersey Supreme Court. Mayor Hausling delivered the introductory address. President Taft addressed the assemblage and pronounced a splendid tribute to the patriotism and military genius of Washington. The statue was unveiled by Associate Justice Mahlon Pitney of the Supreme Court of the United States.

The monument has been erected on a conspicuous site in Washington Park. The statue which is the work of L. Massey Rhind, the New York sculptor, represents General Washington standing beside his horse. The memorial is twelve feet high, figure of Washington being nine feet in height. Instead of a pedestal, a five-pointed fortress mound serves as the base of the statue. In the facade of the mound there is embedded a bronze descriptive tablet.

### MANY GOING HOME TO VOTE

Washington, D. C., Nov. 1—Outgoing trains today carried the advance guard of officials and Government clerks who are returning to their respective homes to vote next Tuesday. The department employees have been impressed with the possibility that a few votes might change the result in congressional contests if not on the national ticket, and each is going home with the intention of throwing his influence on the right side of the scale as it appeals to him. Many of the department clerks are going as far as Iowa, Nebraska and Minnesota to cast their votes.

### TO CELEBRATE SUPREMACY IN AIR

Paris, Nov. 2—To celebrate the supremacy of France in aerial navigation a great banquet of over 2,000 covers is to be given tomorrow under the auspices of the French National Committee of Military Aviation. The scene of the banquet will be the largest of the great dirigible hangars on the aviation field at Issy les Moulineaux. The gathering will be exceptionally brilliant, the guests including members of the cabinet, heads of the army and navy, several score of French aviators and many members of political and social organizations who have helped to give to France the eminent position she holds as "Queen of the Air."

### ARIZONA WOMEN HOPE FOR BALLOT

Phoenix, Nov. 4—Arizona women today closed a strenuous campaign in behalf of the proposed amendment to the State constitution granting the full rights of suffrage. The fate of the amendment will be decided by the voters at tomorrow's general election.

## MYSTERY OF BIG THEFT MAY BE CLEARED UP

Chicago, Nov. 4—After a lapse of five years since the mysterious disappearance of \$173,000 from the Chicago Subtreasury, George W. Fitzgerald, former teller, who was indicted in 1910 and charged with the embezzlement of that sum, is to appear before Judge Carpenter, of the United States Court, in this city this week to be tried for the alleged theft. Unusual interest is manifested in the impending trial which, it is hoped, will definitely clear up the mystery surrounding this case which for years completely puzzled the government authorities and the shrewdest among the secret service detectives.

It was in the summer of 1907 that the officials of the Chicago United States Subtreasury were startled by the information that \$173,000 in bills of various denominations had mysteriously disappeared from the cage of the teller, George W. Fitzgerald. Fitzgerald himself, who had been in the employ of the Subtreasury for seven years, gave the first intimation of the loss of the large sum. On a Wednesday afternoon he informed the cashier, F. C. Russell, that he was short \$173,000. He explained that the sum which was missing corresponded with the total amount of a package of bills which had been retained in the teller's custody the night before.

An examination of Fitzgerald's books showed that the shortage was not a matter of bookkeeping, but of actual loss. Inquiry at Washington showed that the money had not been shipped to the federal treasury by mistake. Thomas I. Porter, chief of the United States secret service in Chicago, began a careful investigation of the case and ascertained that three previous thefts had taken place it is alleged, in Fitzgerald's cage, prior to that time. The losses were, respectively, \$500, \$600 and \$900. Notwithstanding this fact, Fitzgerald enjoyed the full confidence of his superiors and no suspicion was attached to him. He handled about \$1,000,000 each day and was considered a thoroughly efficient and reliable employee. It was his custom each night to lock the money under his charge in his own private steel box.

When questioned, Fitzgerald laid suspicion upon a party of workmen who had been employed about the Subtreasury the day before the discovery of the shortage. The money, Fitzgerald stated, lay in stacks upon his desk in a dark corner of the cage and might easily have been reached from under the grating. He also said that at least a dozen men had access to the safe. Although at that time considered above suspicion, Fitzgerald was relieved from duty, but not arrested. The officers of the Secret Service began a thorough investigation of the private life of every one of the employees of the Subtreasury, among them Fitzgerald's. His manner of life, it was found, was simple and unostentatious and he was popular among his companions. Fitzgerald asserted his innocence with an air of injured dignity which ultimately was effective in diverting suspicion to other quarters.

The case was so puzzling that, after a consultation with Secretary Shaw of the Treasury, and President Roosevelt, John L. Wilkie, chief of the United States Secret Service, took personal charge of the investigation. Fitzgerald and several other persons were persistently shadowed, but for several years absolutely no evidence could be found which would have warranted any arrest. How-

ever, no reward was offered, as this was considered useless under the circumstances. Fitzgerald, having lost his position in the Subtreasury, tried to earn a living by going into the real estate business and was carefully watched. One day, in making a payment, he offered a \$1,000 bill and on the strength of this and other circumstantial evidence he was arrested on suspicion, but quickly discharged again without having been formally charged with the theft.

The Secret Service officials continued to watch every movement of Fitzgerald and upon the strength of the circumstantial evidence accumulated in the course of several years, a secret indictment was found against him in 1910. The indictment formally charged Fitzgerald with the embezzlement of \$173,000 and he was arrested but the trial was delayed for various reasons until it was set for this week. It is believed that both sides are fully prepared to bring the case to trial and it is believed that Fitzgerald will make a determined fight, assisted by some of the best legal talent in the city.
