

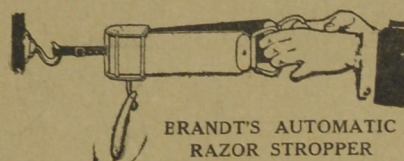
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AGENTS WANTED

MONTREAL BOUQUETS FOR FRANK J. POWER, HALIFAX STARTER

Has Received Many Offers to Officiate at Harness Meets during Coming Season

(Montreal Star.)

Frank J. Power, who officiated as starter at the January meeting at Delormier Park, where he gave such great satisfaction, and is the best known starter in the Maritime Provinces, has already received tentative offers to act in other cities during the coming season for his fame has extended abroad. Mr. Power has been employed for years in the post office department, being superintendent of the office at Halifax, N.S., and he takes the usual holidays allowed officials, on racing dates, and is thus enabled to officiate as starter at harness meetings in the provinces. For over a score of years he has been connected with harness races in that section; for several years he officiated as judge, and later as starter, and has since acted in the dual capacity at almost every prominent meeting in the Maritime Provinces. For years he has filled these positions at the seven days' meetings at the Halifax annual exhibitions, including the Dominion exhibition, when there was a nine days' meeting. His great success is due to the fact that while he brooks no delay, he is particular to see the various horses are on their stride before he gives the word; he gets the horses out in time; he is honest to the core; he treats everybody alike, while he knows the rules thoroughly and uses the best judgment in applying them. He has also officiated as starter at many athletic events, and years ago was recognized as the best ball umpire in Halifax. He is a son of the late Hon. M. J. Power, Speaker of the Nova Scotia legislature, and brother of James W. Power, for over a quarter of a century sporting editor of The Halifax Acadian Recorder.

CALGARY PLAYS WINNIPEG TONIGHT

Winnipeg, Mar. 5.—The first game in the Allan Cup Series for the amateur hockey championship of Canada will be played between the Victorias and the Calgary Athletic Club team. The Victorias won the trophy by default last season, when the St. Michael team of Toronto refused to defend it, when ordered to do so by the trustees. A controversy arose which resulted in the cup being withdrawn and a new set of rules made under which the Victorias will defend it tonight. Two teams have challenged for the mug and both are in the city.

The first game will be between the Victorias and the Calgary team and the second series between the Linton team of Toronto and the winners of the first series.

MONCTON VICS AFTER CANADIENS

Montreal, March 5.—Canadiens made such a good showing down east last spring that the Moncton Victorias are anxious to have them pay them another visit this year. Last night George Kennedy received a telegram from Moncton asking him to make the trip and to set his earliest date. PORT ARTHUR BEAT BY SASKATOON

Winnipeg, Mar. 4.—With a greatly strengthened team the Saskatoon hockey team defeated the Port Arthur aggregation by a score of 5-1. Although the Saskatoon team won the game they did not win by enough goals to make the trip east, Port Arthur having won the first match 11-1 and therefore the Port Arthur aggregation will play the winners of the National Hockey Association for the famous Stanley cup.

MCCOY MATCHED WITH CARPENTIER

Nice, Mar. 4.—Kid McCoy has signed articles to fight Carpentier, the French champion lightweight. The McCoy-Carpentier fight which will be for the championship of Europe and a purse of \$12,000 is booked for May 12 at the New Velodrome, Paris which has a seating capacity of 20,000. The articles call for twenty rounds and state that the men must weigh in at 175 pounds ringside. The National Sporting Club of London has offered a purse of \$15,000 for a fight between Carpentier and Bombardier Wells in May.

HAMBY SHORE OF OTTAWA SAYS HE WILL RETIRE

Has not Recovered from Attack of Laryngitis—Has Played Hockey since 1905

Ottawa, Mar. 1.—Hamby Shore cover point of the Ottawas, announced last night that he was through with hockey for good after this season. He will finish out the schedule and will also play in the Stanley Cup games should the Ottawas land the cup but will not take in the trip to New York and Boston. Shore received a blow on the neck in the second game with the Canadiens here and has had an attack of laryngitis. He intends to take a couple of weeks' treatment for his neck at the end of the season and will not take part in any post season games.

Hamby is the veteran of the Ottawas, having played his first game with them in 1905. He went west and played with the Winnipeg Maple Leafs coming East with them in their effort to land the Stanley Cup. He also played in Pittsburgh.

REGARD TO STANLEY CUP GAMES

(Canadian Press)

Ottawa, Ont., Mar. 5.—Moncton's dates for Stanley Cup games are likely to be Saturday and Monday and Wednesday night, if Wanderers beat Ottawa tomorrow night, but if home and home games are necessary, between these two teams to decide the championship of the N. H. A., there may not be any Stanley Cup games at all.

It is now practically certain that the challenge of the British Columbia professional hockey association for the Stanley Cup will be deferred until the commencement of next season. Mr. William Forgan, Stanley

Cup trustee received yesterday, a telegram from Secretary Smalls of the Coast league as follows: "Our championship may not be decided until March 18. Winners could play in each March 25 and 27. Please advise if possible to play on those dates." There has never been good ice in Ottawa, Montreal or Quebec on the dates suggested by the western league and on this account Mr. Forgan sent a reply to the effect that ice at that late date would be impossible. The latest news on the part of the coast league means that there will be two series for the Stanley Cup.
