### DATE CAKE

The ingredients for the cake are half a cup of butter, one cup and a half of sugar, one cup of cold water, three cups of pastry flour sifted twice before measuring, then sifted again with two slightly rounding teaspoonsful of baking powder, one tablespoonful of vanilla and the white of four eggs. Mix and bake in the usual manner. Bake the cake in two layers or in one large sheet. For the filling cook one pound of stoned dates washed in boiling water before stoning, one cup of sugar and a half a cup of water until the dates are very soft, stirring often while cooking. Cook very slowly adding water if needed. When smooth and thick pour on the whites of two eggs, beaten dry. This may be used as filling and covering for the cake—or it may be used as filling and a frosting made of one-fourth a cup of hot syrup and sifted confectioner's sugar, flavored to taste, be used for the top.

### BAKED FISH FILLETS

Remove skin and central bone with as many small bones as possible from a whole fish to secure two large filets. Cream one-fourth a cup of butter, beat in the yolks of two eggs, one at a time, hand add two table-spoonsful each of fine chopped onions, parsley, capers and pickles with two table-spoonsful of lemon juice, half a teaspoonful of salt and half a teaspoonful each of fine chopped onions bits of salt pork sprinkled over a fish sheet or piece of tin the length of the filets, spread with one half the prepared mixture and set the other fillet in place and spread with the rest of the mixture. Bake about thirty minutes. Serve with potatoes, maitre d'Hotel or with mashed potato, Hollandaise or drawn butter sauce.

## INTERESTING FIGHT FOR CONTROL OF U. S. SENATE

Washington, D. C., July 20—Terms of one-third of the members of the United States Senate will expire next March. The present Senate is composed of fifty-two Republicans and forty-three Democrats, with one vacancy. Can the Democrats pick up the five men they need to insure their control? Will the next election cost them some of the seats that are now theirs?

Of the thirty-two senators whose terms will expire in March, nineteen are Republicans and thirteen are Democrats. Contests are already on for nearly all of the seats to be made vacant. In some of the States the contests within the next few months will settle the others. Some of the contests promise to be exciting and spectacular. A review of the situations as existing in the different States at the present time presents many features of interest.

Taking up the list of States alphabetically, the first of the senators whose terms are about to expire is Jeff Davis of Arkansas. The result of the recent Arkansas primary assures the re-election of Senator Davis.

Next comes Colorado where two senators are to be elected next winter, one to fill the vacancy caused by the death of Senator Hughes and the other to succeed Senator Guggenheim, who will not be a candidate for re-election. The Democrats expect to control the legislature and elect two of their party to the senate. Among the names mentioned as probable candidates are Governor Shaffroth and Representative Rucker. Democrats, and ex-Representative Bonynge and J. F. Valle, Republican. Delaware will choose a successor to Senator M. A. Richardson, Republican. The Republicans believe they will be able to hold the seat but many politicians are inclined to place the State in the doubtful column.

Senator A. C. Bacon of Georgia will have opposition but the indications are that he will be re-elected without any great difficulty.

Idaho Republicans believe Senator Borah will be able to pull through but the Democrats are confident that he will give way to one of their political faith.

The fate of the veteran Shelby M. Cullom of Illinois already has been settled by primary. If the Republicans control the next Illinois legislature Senator Cullom's successor will be Lawrence Y. Sherman. In the event of Democratic success the next senator will be J. Hamilton Lewis.

Senator Kenyon of Iowa, has been named by the Republicans to succeed himself. The Democratic choice for the senatorship is D. W. Hamilton.

Kansas is to be the scene of a lively scramble for the seat of Senator Charles Curtis, who is a candidate for re-election. Curtis is believed to be handicapped by his vote for Lori-

mer. His opponent on the Republican side is Governor W. R. Stubbs, the Roosevelt leader in Kansas. Four Democrats are in the race for the Democratic endorsement. The nominations will be settled in the primary next month.

Congressman Ollie James, who presided over the recent National convention at Baltimore, already has been picked by Kentucky Democrats to succeed Senator Paynter.

Louisiana likewise has disposed of the senatorship contest by selecting Congressman Joseph E. Ransdell to succeed Senator Murphy J. Foster.

Next on the list comes Maine, which is conceded to be doubtful by the leaders of both parties. Obadiah Gardner, Democrat, who was appointed by Governor Plaisted to fill out the unexpired term of the late Senator Frye, will come up for re-election next January. The Republicans in the Pine Tree State feel rather confident that the Democrats have done their worst there and cannot come back to the extent of controlling the next legislature. Former Congressman Edwin C. Burleigh is the Republican choice for the senatorship.

Senator Crane of Massachusetts, one of the old guard on the Republican side, has announced his intention to retire next March. Curtis Guild, Jr., the American ambassador at St. Petersburg, former Governor Eben S. Draper and Congressman McCall, Gardner and Weeks are among the prominent Republicans mentioned to succeed him. The Democrats of Massachusetts have made decided gains the past two years and they are hopeful of capturing the legislature next November and of sending a member of their party to the senate to succeed Crane. So far Mayor John F. Fitzgerald of Boston, is the only Democrat in the field for the senatorship.

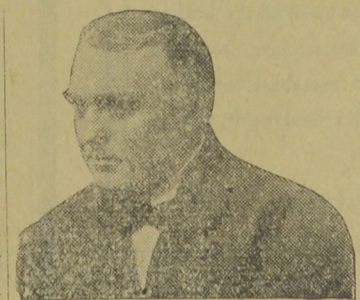
