## Raw Deal Handed Fredericton at St. John

Marathons won 8 to 5 on Saturday--Umpire Evans' Decisions which Cost Runs all Went against Visiting Team--Keaney put out of Game for Striking Umpire with his Cap

A raw deal was handed the Fredericton ball team at St. John, Saturday, when the Marathons won 8 to 5. The rawness was laid on by Umpire Evans, whose great popularity in Fredericton will be considerably increased thereby. This is what can be gathered from what spectators of the game say and the St. John papers corroborate the statement, by saying that Evans' close decisions which cost runs all went against Fredericton.

Keaney, the Fredericton shortstop lost his head and threw his cap at the Umpire. As a result he was put out of the game.

The St. John Telegraph has the following on the game and on the Keaney-Evans incident:

Well up to 2,500 people saw the Marathons defeat Fredericton on the Marathons' grounds on Saturday afternoon, by the score of eight to five. Although both teams made errors that helped their opponents to score runs and while the play was not always up to the league standard, still, the game had many exciting features, one of which was the heavy swatting of both teams. Harrington pitched for the visitors and received ragged support, nine errors having been made by the men behind him. The big pitcher batted in great form, having two doubles and a single out of four times up. Wildes and L. Conley were also prominent with the stick, the former driving out three singles and getting a pass out of time at bat.

Keaney, who started in at short for the visitors, was ordered out of the game by Umpire Evans after the short stop had thrown his cap at the umpire and struck him on the head with it. There was a close decision at the home plate, following one at third, both of which had been in the Marathons' favor and both of which caused an assemblage of Fredericton players around the umpire.

In the second case Keaney left his place at short and walked up to the umpire. There was some talk and then came the assault. The umpire had him removed from the field and this was attended to by Chief of Police Clark and Policeman Perry.

## DICTATOR TODD LOOKS GOOD FOR M.&M. STAKE THIS WEEK

Won 2.15 Trot at Kalamazoo in 2.10 1-4 on Friday--2.24 Trot Produced Some Great Racing--Vernon McKinney and Dudie Archdale Winners in the Free-for-all Events

Kalamazoo, Mich., July 19--Seven M. & M. trotters, two of which won the events in which they started, provided the feature of the gateway day racing here today.

Murphy's Dictator Todd now looks like one of the best in next week's big stake on his clever win in the 2.15 trot, his victory making him the 10th 2.10 performer of the year.

Dorsch Medium, which won the 2.24 trot for Geers, is better than she showed, as Geers made little use of her early heats. Thistle Downe signaled his return to the turf in this event by winning the first heat, but was distanced later on by Mary G, the second heat winner.

### DICTATOR TODD WON

In the 2.15 trot, a \$2000 event, Dictator Todd went into the lead and was not extended until the stretch when he stood a drive to beat Ruth McGregor by a neck. In the second heat, Johnnie Medium led awhile, but Dictator Todd got him when ready and finished easy in 2:08, the second fastest time of any of the M. & M.

Dictator Todd won the third heat all the way making the M. & M. situation more complicated than ever. Arona McKinney raced better than she did last week.

The 2.24 class, trotting was fought to the limit of five heats. Mary G. was the favorite, selling a little over the field.

### FREE-FOR-ALL

In the free-for-alls, the Estabrook stable started the antique, Country Jay, aged 16, and Gold Dollar in the trot and the MacKenzie stable sent Vernon McKinney and Merry Widow to the post in the pace.

In the free-for-all trot, in which Dudie Archdale sold over the field, Gold Dollar went to an early break and Grace Girdle soon jumped. Dudie Archdale and Billy had the track to themselves and went to the half in 1:04, the mare leading by half a length. Billy Burke gained some on the turn and made a strong bid for the heat in the last eighth, forcing Geers to a drive, but being unable to catch Dudie Archdale, the latter winning by a nose in 2:05. The final quarter was covered in 30 seconds.

Nancy Royce was third and Country Jay fourth, but the others were distanced.

Country Jay sprinted to the front in the second heat, but Dudie Archdale had the lead at the quarter and Billy Burke stepped into second position before they reached the half. The latter and Dudie Archdale had it out again. Dudie looked tired in the stretch, but responded to the whip and won by half a length. The time was a little slower, the last half being in 1:02.

### FREE-FOR-ALL

In the free-for-all pace, in which Vernon McKinney was a 2 to 1 favorite, Merry Widow broke her hobbles in scoring. Then McMahon took Flemming's place as her chaperon. Vernon McKinney left his feet soon after the start and Sir R set the pace through the mile, winning easily, as Don Denmore did not respond when called upon in the stretch.

Sir R broke early in the second heat and Vernon McKinney rushed to the front, leading by six lengths at the half and winning, pulled up, in 2:05. Sir R was distanced. Vernon McKinney won the third heat very handsily in 2:04.

George W. Newton, the Western owned pacer, raced by R. L. Parker, won the 2:11 pace. He won the first two heats. Susie Bell, driven by Murphy, won the next two and Lassie Lee, driven by McMahon, won the fifth from Newton, the latter being awarded the race on points.

At no time during the race were the runners separated by more than ten yards and for a distance they ran abreast. The runners were side by side fifty yards from the finish, when inch by inch Longboat drew away from Cameron, breasting the tape three yards ahead of the Amherst boy.

It was a gruelling contest but Longboat could have made the time faster had he so wished. It was Longboat's first appearance in Pictou County and many gathered from all parts of the country to see the Indian. The time is 3 minutes and 13 seconds slower than that made in Windsor on Thursday.
