DEFINITE DATE OF  
VICE-REGAL VISIT

Program to be Followed by Duke of Connaught and Party while here Forwarded for Approval--Military Orders Out

TO ARRIVE BY C.P.R. AT  
8 A.M., LEAVING AT 8 P.M.

Definite word has been received that the visit of H.R.H. the Duke of Connaught Governor General of Canada to Fredericton will take place as originally announced on Saturday August 24th, and not upon the Monday day following as had been expected. The original program of entertainment for the vice-regal party will be adhered to.

## MILITARY PORTION

Orders concerning the military portion of the day's proceedings already have been issued by Col. W.M. Humphrey, A.A.G., 6th Division, Halifax. The orders are to the effect that a guard of honor shall be furnished by the 71st York Regt and an escort by the 28th New Brunswick Dragoons. The guard of honor is to consist of one hundred and six officers and men and the escort probably will consist of twenty-six.

## PROGRAM FORWARDED

The program for the entertainment of the duke and his party while in Fredericton has been forwarded to the governor general's secretary by Mr. R. S. Barker, private secretary to His Honor the Lieutenant Governor, and on approval will be made public. The vice-regal party will arrive by C.P.R. at 8.30 a.m. and will leave by C.P.R. for Montreal at 8 p.m. on the same day. His Royal Highness will attend the rededication services at Christchurch Cathedral at 11 a.m. The presentation of civic and provincial addresses will take place some time during the day. "Frogmore" the Randolph residence which has been offered to His Honor the Lieutenant Governor as a residence during the stay of the vice-regal party probably will be used for that purpose.

CAPTAIN RICARDO  
FEATURED BY FERRARI

Lion-tamer of Renown is with Shows which will be here during Old Home Week

Ricardo is now the star animal trainer with the Ferrari shows and will appear at each performance with a mixed group of forest bred lions, leopards and panthers all of which he has trained to perform many wonderful tricks. The Ferrari shows will be here during the week of August 5th as one of the features of the Old Home Week Celebration.

SPEEDING MOTORISTS  
NOTIFIED TO APPEAR  
IN POLICE COURT

Ald. Kitchen and Mr. Frank Doody the Offenders--Speed Limit Exceeded in Race on Queen St. Last Night

CASE TO BE HEARD BY  
MAGISTRATE TOMORROW

Two automobiles, one of which was driven by Ald. Kitchen and the other by Mr. Frank Doody, made things rather lively along Queen street last evening. They started to race on the lower part of Queen street and dashed up that thoroughfare at an exceedingly rapid rate. Fortunately no person was along the street at the time but Mr. N. A. Edgecombe, who was driving around the corner of York and Queen streets at the time and had a narrow escape from a collision.

Ald. Kitchen stated that morning that both Mr. Doody and himself had broken the law and that they should be fined and that he was willing to pay his fine. One of those in one of the autos stated that the car he was in was going at the rate of sixty-four miles an hour.

Scores of people gathered along Queen street after the race and discussed the whirlwind run, which is said to have been a record breaker and to have eclipsed anything seen around this city for some time. If any person had been coming in an opposite direction at the time there would have been a serious accident.

Policeman Duncan tried to stop the racers but they went past him like a shot out of a gun and he had to stand back and swallow the dust. He immediately went to the Police Station and entered a complaint against both Ald. Kitchen and Mr. Doody. In the car with Ald. Kitchen was also Ald. Calder, a member of the Police Commission, while Mr. J. F. VanBuskirk occupied a seat in the car with Mr. Doody.

The case will come up before Police Magistrate Marsh tomorrow.

BUILDERS' LABOR-  
ERS UNION WANTS  
INCREASED WAGES

Union Members Claim that Notice was Given Employers one week ago--Employers Disclaim Knowledge of Union

INCREASE IN WAGES OF \$1.75  
TO \$2.00 PER DAY ASKED

According to the statement of members of the Builders' Laborers' Union the members of that body are preparing to strike unless they are given two dollars per day by the builders. The men concerned in the strike are employed chiefly on the construction of the factory buildings of the Palmer-McLellan Shoeapack Company and of the John Palmer Company Limited. Their present rate of pay is \$1.75 per day and the increase they demand is twenty-five cents per day.

## EMPLOYERS' FIRM

It is understood that the two contractors who are erecting the buildings named, Messrs J. Fred Ryan and Moses Mitchell show no inclination to accede to the demands of the men on the ground that it is not difficult to procure laborers for the wage of \$1.75 per day which is now being paid and also on the ground that many of the men employed as laborers on the contract named are not worth the wage paid and for that reason are frequently discharged.

"There is no strike that I know of," remarked Mr. Ryan this morning. "We're not laying brick this morning on account of the heavy rain. As soon as it lets up we will start. The men who are there will be employed as usual. If some of them will not be at work that is their own business."

## UNION FORMED.

The members of the union state that their organization was completed a fortnight ago and that their membership numbers thirty-five. They claim that the condition of building in Fredericton warrants an increase in their wages and they are after it. Notice of the demand for increased wages they say was given a week ago.

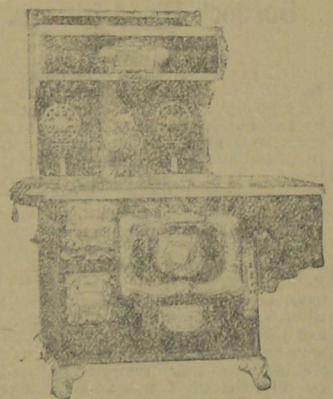
