J. M. ROBINSON & SONS WEEKLY STOCK MARKET REVIEW

St. John, Mar. 30—Although several high points have been established during the past week the strength has been confined more to the industrial stocks than to the Railways. Among the stocks now selling at levels above the high points of 1911 are Amalgamated Copper, American Smelters, Can. Preferred, Sugar Common, Paper Pfd., Interborough Metropolitan Pfd. and Reading.

Since the 1st of March the average of 20 Railways has shown an advance of only 3.03 points, while at the same time the average of 12 Industrials has moved up 7.22 points.

Erie Common in spite of its recent activity and strength is still almost a point below the high mark of 1911.

The market as a whole has been confined to specialties and the advance in the Industrial average almost entirely due to the rise in Amalgamated Copper, American Smelters, Sugar Common and Steel Common which stocks figure in the average, these four stocks having advanced on an average over 12 points.

On Monday of this week we had our first million share day for some time. During the first hour transactions on the New York stock Exchange totalled 432,000 shares or at the rate for a five hour session of 2,160,000 shares. Cautionary signals were displayed however, perhaps from timidity, and a general slow-down after the first hour resulted. A surprising indifference toward coal strikers at home and abroad, political complications, etc., is being mani-

festing by the trading public which has undoubtedly been attracted by the recent advancing prices.

With reference to the anticipated strike of the Locomotive Engineers, the Railroads have demonstrated very clearly their inability, under existing conditions, to advance Engineers wages and this may lead to recognition by the public of the fact that a high scale of wages can be brought about only through increased rates. It would seem that public opinion will not permit railroad securities to be further jeopardized by compulsory increase in wages without a compensating advance in freight rates.

As pointed out in our letters of the last two or three weeks the advance in prices has been engineered by a bull clique who having advanced prices should soon begin to realize. We are informed that from day to day attempts on the part of these professionals to liquidate are quite apparent, but as they themselves constitute the only support which the market has had prices decline very rapidly on any selling movement.

The result of this condition of affairs may be that the bulls will have to put the market higher before sufficient outside buying can be attracted to enable them to unload the stock which they purchased from five to ten points down.

During the week the United States Steel Corporation sold to J. P. Morgan & Company \$30,500,000 of 5

SASKATCHEWAN IN NEED OF LARGER MARKETS

Regina, Sask., March 28—The final feature of the fourth session of the second parliament of Saskatchewan was the adoption in the house of what might be termed a bill of rights of the province, which will be laid at the foot of the throne through a petition to the Lieutenant-Governor. The petition is a summary of the demands that have been made at Ottawa on the unanimous vote of the legislature as well as a request for reciprocity with the United States.

An important announcement was also made by acting Premier Calder to the effect that the tolls on ferries in the province would be abolished. The petition to Ottawa is as follows:—

"To Field Marshal His Royal Highness Prince Arthur Williams Patrick Albert, Duke of Connaught and of Strathern, etc., etc., Governor General of the Dominion of Canada.

"May it please your Royal Highness: We, His Majesty's dutiful and loyal subjects, the Legislative Assembly of Saskatchewan, in session assembled, humbly approach Your Royal Highness for the purpose of representing:

"That one of the fundamental principles of the Canadian Confederation is that all the province which from part of the said Confederation should be in a position of absolute equality in respect of legislative jurisdiction and financial and other assistance, grants and concessions received from the Federal government; and that it has been found necessary in the past to make such changes and readjustments as were required from time to time to be made to bring about, preserve or restore such equality;

"That a necessary condition for the maintenance and strengthening of the said Confederation is that the people inhabiting each of the several provinces should possess such facilities for the proper and profitable carrying on of their various industries, pursuits and occupations as they may enjoy without detriment to the interests of Canada as a whole or of the Empire, and it is the duty of the Federal authorities to endeavor to secure such facilities for the people of each of the several provinces when it is within the scope of federal jurisdiction to secure them;

"That is the opinion of your memorialists the Province of Saskatchewan is not in a position of equality with most of the other provinces of the Dominion in regard to the exercise of the important power of taxation, in view of the fact that the Canadian Pacific Railway company enjoys, by virtue of a Federal act, exemption from taxation in this province.

"That by reason of an extension of territory now being granted to the provinces of Manitoba, Ontario and Quebec, furnishing these provinces with access to Hudson Bay, accompanied by a complete readjustment of the financial terms of the said provinces of Manitoba, the principle of equality of treatment is not being observed in so far as the province of Saskatchewan is concerned.

"That by reason of the said extension of territory granted to the aforesaid provinces and the readjustment of the financial terms of Manitoba, it is more than ever important in order to do justice to the claims of Saskatchewan, that immediate steps should be taken to grant to Saskatchewan the ownership and control of her public domain.

"That the production of grain is the most important industry of the people of Saskatchewan and it is of imperative necessity in view of the rapidly increasing quantity of the said production that new markets be secured for the grain producers of Saskatchewan at as early a date as possible; that the market of the United States is recognized as one of the best and most available markets for the Saskatchewan producer and that the federal authorities should endeavor by means of a reciprocal pact or otherwise to bring about a removal of the tariff barrier that now excludes Saskatchewan products from the United States markets;

"That another urgent necessity of the profitable carrying on of the grain growers industry in Saskatchewan is the securing of additional outlets for our grain products; that the calamitous experiences of the past season have demonstrated the insufficiency of the present outlets, and that more particularly the Hudson Bay railway, operating in conjunction with a line of steamers between a port on Hudson Bay and Great Britain should be pushed on to a speedy completion;

"That we do therefore most humbly pray that Your Royal Highness will cause such action to be taken as will bring about the following measures of relief for the people of the province of Saskatchewan:

"(a) The removal of the exemption from taxation now enjoyed by the Canadian Pacific Railway company;

"(b) Access for Saskatchewan to a port on Hudson Bay;

"(c) The granting to the province of the public domain within its limits

"(d) Free access to the market of the United States for the grain products of Saskatchewan;

"(e) New outlets for our farm products and more particularly a speedy completion of the Hudson Bay railway with a line of steamers from the Bay to Great Britain.

"All of which we humbly pray Your Royal Highness to take into your most favorable consideration.

GRETNA GREEN RECORDS AT AUCTION

London, March 29—Many celebrated romances occurred during the reigns of the three Georges and William IV and in the early Victorian era, were recalled by the sale at Sotheby's today of the original certificates of marriages at Gretna Green. The lot embraces more than one thousand runaway match certificates, upon some of which appeared the names of men and women of wide celebrity.

Gretna was the nearest and most accessible point in Scotland from the sister kingdom, and in its neighborhood fugitive marriages were long contracted. The practice is said to have been begun by a tobaccoist named John Paisley, who lived to a great age and died in 1814. The general assembly, in 1826, vainly attempted to suppress the system of Gretna Green marriages, but an act passed in 1856 made such marriages illegal after that year unless one of the persons married had lived in Scotland 21 days.

QUEEN CITY'S NEW BALL PARK

Cincinnati, O., Mar. 30—Cincinnati baseball fans were given their first opportunity to view the new grounds today, when the home team lined up for an exhibition game with the New York Americans. The new park takes rank among the finest baseball plants in the country. It cost in the neighborhood of a quarter of a million dollars. The grandstands, pavilions, and bleachers are of steel and reinforced concrete and the entire seating capacity is about 25,000.

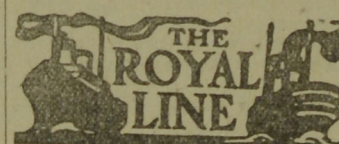

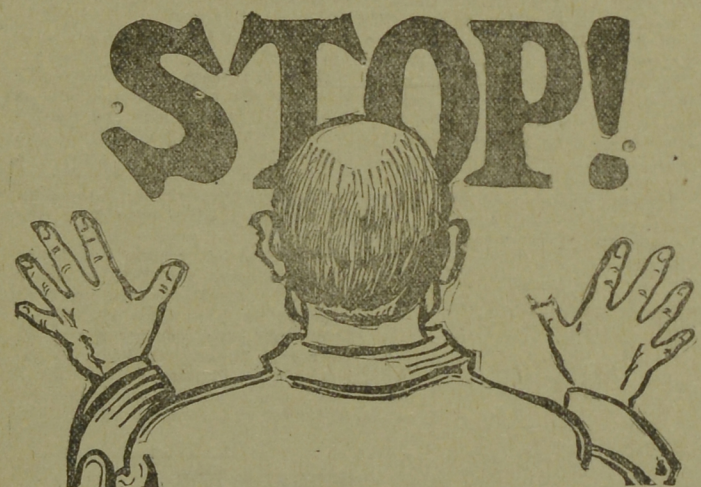
