IT COST MONEY

At a public meeting in Toronto, the other night, a statement was made by one of the campaigners in the recent South Renfrew by-election which throws some light on the wholesale corruption practised by the Tory Party in their efforts to beat Hon. George P. Graham. He stated that not less than \$100,000 was spent by the Tory party in the South Renfrew campaign. From \$35 to \$150 and even as high as \$300 was paid for votes while \$5,000 worth of whiskey was used to corrupt and debase the purchasable element in the riding. In fact it would appear that there has not been such a pouring out of rum since John Stanfield's famous "Choice Tomatoes" campaign in Colchester some years ago. And after all this expenditure, Mr. Graham was returned to parliament by a handsome majority. No wonder Hon. Geo. E. Foster admitted that the election of Mr. Graham was "a knock-down blow for the government." Now the Tories are talking of protesting Hon. Mr. Graham's election on the ground of corrupt practices. Great is Toryism.

A bill to amend the game act has been introduced in the Nova Scotia House. It seems that they have a close season on railfisks in the sister province, and complaint has been made that partridges sometimes get caught in the snares so it has become necessary to make a change in the dates. There is a pointer here for Premier Flemming. He should immediately establish a close season for rabbits and charge a fee for the privilege for snaring them. In due time no doubt it would become quite a source of revenue, and it is revenue this government is after.

If the parties who instituted the outrageous proceedings against Mr. George Hayes of St. Marys were compelled to pay the costs in connection with the case, perhaps it would have a wholesome effect on their future conduct. The city has no right to pay one cent of these costs and the county authorities will not pay them if it can possibly be avoided. Perhaps the member of the government who is known to have given a lot of gratuitous advice to those behind the prosecution will see that the costs are paid from the provincial treasury.

Commodore Stewart and other good Tories belonging to the fourth estate will be interested in a return brought down in the Legislature a few days ago which shows that Mr. John A. Bowes has been paid the sum of \$1,169.15 by the Local Government for printing done since the close of the fiscal year on Oct. 31st. Only last session Mr. Bowes was engaged in the very laudable work of exposing the shortcomings of the administration through the medium of the opposition press.

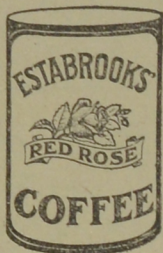
Mr. Pinder, who is building the Southampton railway has a bond guarantee of \$10,000 per mile from the province and a subsidy of \$3,200 per mile from the Federal treasury. The Federal and Local subsidies given in aid of the York and Carleton Railway amounted to only \$5,700 per mile, yet the Company were able to construct a line of railway which will not greatly suffer from a comparison with Mr. Pinder's road.

Isn't it strange, isn't it remarkable that the Canadian Pacific Railway Company with its enormous property interests in New Brunswick has up to the present time offered not the slightest opposition of a public nature to the Valley Railway project either at Ottawa or Fredericton? Such laxity on the part of the great corporation needs some explanation.

The city assessment this year has been fixed by the City Council in committee at \$87,000 an increase of \$9,000 over last year. This is certainly our growing time.

Notwithstanding the fact that thousands of dollars of farm produce are shipped out of this province every year Tory members of the legislature appear to have got it into their heads that our farmers do not raise enough to supply the home market. If this is true today, why did the Flemming government spend \$3,000 last year on "Extension of Markets?"

Hon. C. W. Robinson contributed an important speech to the budget debate in the Legislature last evening. Incidentally he announced that it was not his intention to offer for re-election. Hon. Mr. Robinson is easily one of the ablest men in public life in New Brunswick and his retirement will mean a serious loss to the Legislature and to the province.

Thousands of dollars worth of farm produce have been shipped out of York County this season to the American market. Farmers who have produce to sell must realize by this time that a colossal blunder was committed when the country on September last pronounced against reciprocity.

The recent debate in the Dominion Parliament on the Valley Railway question and the heated outburst by Premier Flemming in the legislature a few days ago should convince all those not blinded by paritanship that there is "a nigger in the woodpile," in connection with this great project.

The County Councillor from the western section of York, who has been promised a Tory nomination at the next local election is likely to come out at the little end of the horn.

CUSTOMS RETURNS SHOW INCREASE

The number of entries for the past year was 2244 as compared with 2159 the previous year, an increase of 85.

OTHER DETAILS.

The number of freight and express manifests received for the year ending March 31st, 1912, was 2,831, and the number for the previous year was 2,530, showing an increase of 301 for 1911-12 over the previous year.

The number of express parcels under the value of \$25 entered for the past year was 2,280 as against 2,059 entered for the year ending March 31st, 1911, showing an increase of 221 for the past year over the previous year. The amount of duty collected on these was \$2,765.68, as against \$2,251.15 in 1910-11, an increase of \$514.53 for 1911-12.

The number of postal parcels received for duty during the year ending March 31st, 1912, was 3,031, as against 3,171 received during the previous year.

The amount of duty collected from these in the past year was \$1,109.15, as against \$954.94 collected during the previous year, an increase for the last year of \$154.21.

Y., March 30.—The market opening was moderately active and irregular many stocks showed fractional declines as result of usual week end realizing while reading was strong on improved labor outlook. The first sale of Reading was at an advance of $\frac{1}{8}$ and while suspension of work in Anthracite fields is inevitable, it was believed that an agreement between miners and operators would soon be reached. In Union Pacific initial decline, amounted to $\frac{1}{2}$ point. There was a continuance of bear pressure on Steel which opened quarter lower. Erie and C. P. R. also started fractionally lower.

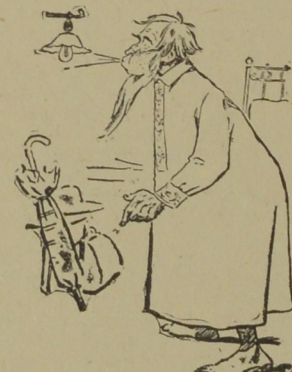

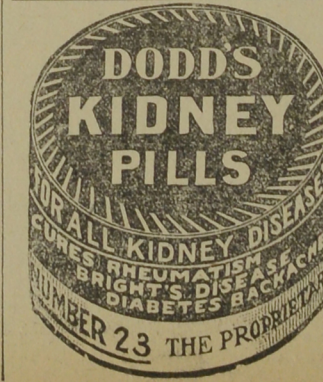
