MEDUCTIC WANTS FIRST SOD TURNED

Meductic, N.B., May 6—This enterprising place has taken off its coat to secure what it regards as justice in the matter of the turning of the first sod of the Valley Railway. Having heard that Woodstock is bidding strongly for the ceremonies connected with the beginning of actual work on the new railway, the business men of Meductic called a meeting of the board of trade recently, and passed strong resolutions demanding that the ceremonies in question be held here.

The resolutions set forth that the Meductic board of trade began the agitation for the Valley railway which resulted in the project being carried forward, and state that as Meductic set the thing going it is only fair that the turning of the first sod of "this wonderful undertaking" should take place "in this historic village." The resolutions provide that the facts in the case shall be brought "before the proper authorities" at once.

President Scott was in the chair, and the meeting was one of the largest and most earnest seen here in a long time. It is understood that Meductic's case will be placed before Premier Flemming and others, and that there will be trouble if Meductic does not get what it wants.

STUDY OF SOUTH'S PROBLEMS

Nashville, Tenn., May 7—Several hundred delegates representing sixteen southern states, all men of earnest thought and devoted to the best interests of their country, assembled in Nashville today for a southern sociological conference. Governor Hooper of Tennessee, issued the call for the gathering and stated the object to be the study and discussion of numerous problems peculiar to the south. During the several days that the sessions will continue attention will be given to every form of social endeavor—charity, correction, religion, fraternal organizations, the press, libraries, schools and public health. Many well known speakers, including the governors of several states, have accepted invitations to address the gathering.

year ended June 30, 1911, resulted in 3,519 killed and 60,235 injured. Aviation claimed 76 victims in '11.

In New York city the street traffic death toll for last year was 423. The injured numbered 2,004. This record was 13 per cent higher than 1910.

There were 142 deaths and 1,031 injuries due to automobiles in 1911, an increase of 38 per cent. Trolley cars killed 109 and injured 504 persons. Wagons killed 102 persons and caused serious injury to 309.

No disaster ever has checked speed madness and it is not likely it ever will be checked until public opinion forces it. Until this happens the vessels that cross the ocean at the highest speed and the fastest railroad trains will be the best patronized. The swiftest racing automobiles will command the highest prices. And need less waste of human life is the penalty that must be paid.

RECEPTION IN YUKON'S GOVERNMENT HOUSE

(Dawson News, April 12.)
Government House glowed last night. This historic seat of Yukon's social functions never before saw such a brilliant affair. Commissioner and Mrs. George Black last evening held their first formal public reception since they took possession of the house on behalf of the people of Yukon two weeks ago. And they demonstrated that for cordiality and genuine hospitality Canada could produce none to excel. Yukon has seen many a memorable gathering under the spacious room, but none more generally attended and none more thoroughly enjoyed.

From the throng that poured through the ample corridors and promenade through the drawing rooms and elegant saloons, one would think the whole of Klondike had stampeded. Many were in evening dress, and the ladies came arrayed in elegant gowns. But there were numerous friends of Mr. and Mrs. Black from far distant points who did not stand on ceremony, and accepted the pressing invitation to come regardless of the strict conventionalities. This made the gathering most emphatically what Commissioner and Mrs. Black desired, thoroughly representative of all the Yukon. The democratic ring of the frank invitation to visit the Government House brought out many who never before were across the threshold of the palatial home. And all who went were treated royally. Not a dull moment was permitted for anyone from the arrival of the first guest at eight o'clock until the conclusion of festivities at five o'clock this morning.

The ever-elegant interior of the stately structure was doubly beautiful under the effect of the additional decorations of flowers and flags, and the presence of the hundreds of happy guests, suffused with floods of light from resplendent globes of electrical cluster lamps.

Striking up the musical program of the evening with the appropriate overture "Martha," the orchestra was unwearying until fifteen delightful numbers had been rendered. By that time the guests all had arrived and the floor was cleared in the drawing room and the reception hall for dancing. Waltzes, two-steps and three-steps added delightfully to the pleasures of the evening.

As the guests entered they were introduced to Commissioner and Mrs. Black by Mr. Nelson McDonald. The Commissioner and Mrs. Black greeted each visitor with a firm handshake and a cheerful word and smiles that indicated they were truly happy to meet their many friends. After greeting the chief executive and the first lady of the land, the visitors found the genial commander of the Royal Northwest Mounted Police, Major F. J. Horrihan, in line. Then Mr. Justice and Mrs. Macaulay, American Consul George C. Cole and the Right Rev. and Bishop and Mrs. I. O. Stringer. This completed the receiving party. Passing that point, the visitors were in the resplendent drawing room, where they scattered, some passing across the hall to the dining hall, where refreshments were served; or to the study, where was a supply of liquids and solids; or to the foot of the staircase, where stood the huge punch bowl with attendants; or to the second floor, where were two card rooms, with several tables supplied with all the requirements for a number of informal competitions; or to the third floor, where the billiard room was ready.

CHINESE FLEEING FROM MEXICO

Washington, May 6—Several hundred Chinese, fleeing from the disturbance in the State of Coahuila, Mexico, are appealing to the United States government for a temporary asylum in this country. Terror stricken by the memory of the Chinese massacre of the last revolution, Chinese are pouring into Phodras Negras, opposite Eagle Pass, Texas. Their urgent request for permission to cross the border line reached Washington today.

Chicago, May 6—Alexander Hickey, 28 years old, striking newspaper delivery wagon driver was severely beaten by a crowd of citizens this morning after he and several strikers are said by the police to have assaulted an old man who was selling newspapers at a North Side elevated railroad station. Cries of "Lynch him" were heard in the crowd, and the police were obliged to stop a passing taxicab and drive away with the striker to save him from a more serious attack.
