HAAG CIRCUS WAS WELL PATRONIZED

First in Fifty-eight Years to Show in St. Marys--Other Showed on Same Ground During Cholera Epidemic

Haag's Circus which showed in Hayes' field, St. Marys yesterday afternoon and last evening is the first circus to put on a performance in that village in fifty-eight years. In 1854 when a cholera epidemic was raging in Fredericton a circus showed in St. Marys and by a strange coincidence its tents were pitched on the same grounds that were occupied yesterday by the Haag Circus.

The show notwithstanding wet weather and counter attractions, had a very liberal patronage. The afternoon performance attracted a crowd of over five thousand people, and the evening attendance was between two and three thousand. People came from all sections of York and Sunbury Counties and seemed to be well pleased with what they saw at the circus.

The circus though not as large as some which have visited this locality in the past, was up to date in every respect. The horses which performed in the ring were undoubtedly the finest ever seen here. The trapeze and acrobatic work was of a high standard and a squad of lively clowns made no end of fun for the audience. The feats of horsemanship performed in the ring have never been called here. The hippodrome races which wound up the performance, were as usual very exciting.

The menagerie was quite up to the standard and came in for a good share of attention. The lioness which mangled the arm of a circus employee at Point du Chene, causing his death was naturally an object of much interest.

Mr. Carleton Gill is the present agent for Haag's Circus and he is certainly the right man in the right place.

The circus left this morning for Bristol Carleton County, where it is billed to show today. It will also visit Edmundston and Woodstock.

TAFT DISAPPROVES OF THE WOOL BILL

Washington, Aug. 9.—For the second time within a year President Taft today vetoes a bill to raise the wool tariff, Schedule K of the Payne Aldrich law.

With a message of disapproval he returned to Congress the bill evolved as a compromise between the house and senate, holding that its low rates would bring disaster to home industries. He appealed to Congress, however, not to adjourn until it had enacted a measure to "substantially reduce unnecessary existing duties," without destroying protection for the wool industry in the United States.

The president's disapproval of the wool bill is to be followed with similar vetoes of the steel bill and the cotton bill. The sugar bill is likely to be vetoed as is the excise tax bill the latter probably on the ground that the President believes it unconstitutional. "I shall stand by my pledges to maintain a degree of protection necessary to offset the differences in cost of production here and abroad and will heartily approve of any bill reducing duties to this level," wrote Mr. Taft.

"Most of the rates in the submitted bill," wrote the President, "are so low in themselves that if enacted, into law, the inevitable result would be irreparable injury to the wool growing industry, the enforced idleness of much of our wool combing and spinning machinery and of thousands of looms and the consequent throwing out of employment of thousands of workmen."

The bill sent to the White House imposed and a valoran duty of 22 per cent. on raw wool and on cloths of 33 per cent. Both rates Mr. Taft held were insufficient to protect the wool growers and the manufacturer.

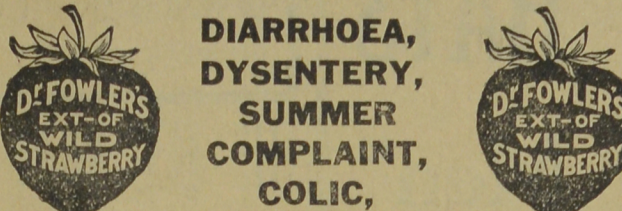
