SHARP FIGHT IN ATLANTIC CITY

Atlantic City, N. J., July 9--This
most famous of the world's seaside
resorts has experienced many situa-
tions in its time, but it is safe to
say that nothing has ever aroused its
inhabitants to such a high pitch of
excitement as today's municipal elec-
tion--the first to be held here under
the commission plan of government.
The commission plan was adopted
about a month ago following the
exposure of alleged political corrup-
tion and graft in municipal affairs
that would have put to shame the
political ringsters in some of the
largest cities of the country. The
exposure was brought largely by De-
tective William J. Burns and his
diatribe.
When all the evidence of alleged
graft had been made public the bet-
ter among the citizens decided they
had had enough of the old order of
things and turned to the commis-
sion as the best remedy in sight.
On June 11 a primary was held
for the nomination of ten candidates
for members of the Board of Com-
missioners, and today's election was
held for the selection of five of the
ten. These five will comprise the
board.
When the results of the primary
were tabulated the public was some-
what jarred to find that Mayor
Harry Bacharach, under whose ad-
ministration the grafters are alleged
to have flourished, received the high-
est vote and was entitled to first
place on the list of candidates for
commissioners. Also among the suc-
cessful ones were Dr. Jesse B.
Thompson, millionaire banker and
hotel man and leader in the fusion
movement a year ago to oust of
"machine" from office, and Dr. P.L.
Hawkins, a negro physician.
A peculiar feature of the situation
was the fact that in today's elec-
tion the old "machine" which put
Mayor Bacharach in office last fall
worked strenuously to prevent his
election as a commissioner. The
reason for this is to be found in
the practical certainty of Dr. Thomp-
son's election to the board and who
with Mayor Bacharach and others
running with them on the ticket, are
pledged to sweep the city hall clean
of all the present officeholders. The
new commissioners will take office
on July 16, when the present sys-
tem of government will cease to ex-
ist.

START OF THE GRAND CIRCUIT

Grand Rapids, July 8--Quartered at
the beautiful racing plant just be-
yond the city limits of Grand Rapids
are the trotters and pacers who are
to furnish the sport that marks the
first link of the Grand Circuit which
had its opening this afternoon at the
Comstock Park track. The program
here is a splendid one made up of
nearly a score of events, but all the
talk is of the two big fixtures the
Furniture Manufacturers' \$10,000
purses for 2.12 trotters and the \$5000
Comstock purse for 2.11 pacers.

AMERICAN WHIST CONGRESS

New York, July 8--Whist players
from almost every part of the coun-
try are in town to take part in the
twenty-second annual meeting and
tournament of the American Whist
League which was opened today at
the Hotel Majestic and will last a
full week. There are two champion-
ship contests on the program, the
Hamilton Club trophy for teams of
four and the Minneapolis trophy for
pairs besides four special contests
for teams and pairs and thirteen pro-
gressive games.

OBJECT TO FABRIC ADULTERATION

St. Louis, Mo., July 8--The neces-
sity of legislation to prevent frau-
dulent adulteration of fabrics by mill-
ing companies is one of the chief
subjects to be discussed at the an-
nual convention of the National As-
sociation of Dyers and Cleaners, which
met in this city today for a three
days' session. The members of the
association declare that much wool,
silk and linen is adulterated, and
that salts and veners used in the
adulterations cause the costly fabrics
to fall to pieces while being cleaned.
The association proposes to inaugu-
rate a nation-wide campaign for a re-
form in the manufacture of fabrics.
