### COMMISSION GOVERNMENT

The Toronto Globe begins its reference to the meeting of the Ontario Municipal association by saying: "Government of cities by commissions instead of by councils is not regarded by the Ontario Municipal association as a panacea for whatever ills the municipalities in this province may suffer from under the present council system. This was made clear yesterday at the opening of the association's annual convention in this city."

The president of the association, Controller F. S. Spence, of Toronto, declared himself as opposed to the commission idea. His remarks are thus summarized:

He claimed that the commission plan was an experiment, and did not embody the British principle of representative and responsible government. While taking the ground that municipal councils were preferable to commissions, he advanced the belief that the board of control system should be perfected. "The board ought to be the exclusive administrative body," he said. "The duty of municipal councils, in cities, at least, ought to be purely supervisory and legislative." He stated that the board of control and council plan had in it elements of strength and safety which the commission plan did not possess.

Mr. Wickett said that commissions had supplied a measure of relief to a number of municipalities in the United States where the ward boss prevailed and conditions were intolerable, but he did not think such conditions were likely to prevail in this country. He thought that men should be trained to be experts in municipal affairs, and Mr. Mikel, the city solicitor of Belleville, thought there should be colleges to train men in municipal government. No one seemed to have a good word for the commission system, although no resolution on the subject was adopted.

### ON PENSIONING MOTHERS

Colorado under her initiative and referendum system will have to vote at the next election on a bill to pension "widowed and needy mothers." It is understood that Judge Ben B. Lindsey and a large number of charitable workers have advocated the scheme. This does not involve any attempt to waive or lessen the responsibility of a husband or father to provide for his family. But wives with children, who have been deserted, wives whose husbands are in prison, wives whose husbands are bed-ridden, seem to be entitled to equal consideration with widows, when all have little ones depending on them. It is highly probable that Colorado will decide in favor of this measure. There is reason to believe that other States would do so if a vote could be forced. The idea prevails everywhere that there is no disgrace in "pensions" and that there is no disgrace in aid to "paupers." But what seems to be certain is that the proposed system if adopted in Colorado or elsewhere will need to be administered with cold justice or it will become intolerably burdensome to the State. Such administration is going to be very difficult to secure—even in Colorado.

One of the most perfect types of classic buildings in America, according to architects, has been built by the United States government at Denver, Col., to be used as a post-office and to house the various federal offices in that city with the exception of the mint, says Popular Mechanics. The building is of pure white marble from Colorado quarries and is 310 feet long by 180 feet deep and four stories in height. The style is a type of Roman architecture adapted to modern conditions and the facades are regarded as notable in the faithfulness of their classic lines. On each of the longer sides there are sixteen massive columns, and on the shorter sides six columns. Symbolic statuary is used in groups and in single figures to relieve the

building of the severity of its general outlines, the entire structure giving an idea of simple beauty that makes it a striking example of public building architecture.

Mr. D. P. MacLachlan ex-M.P.P., in a letter in the Chatham Gazette takes Commodore Stewart, M. P. P., severely to task for insinuating that a forged telegram was made to do duty in Northumberland at the recent election. Mr. MacLachlan says in effect that the Commodore is 'a grouch, that his election was due to an extraordinary fluke and that he has a life long habit of working solely for the interests of Mr. Stewart.' Mr. MacLachlan says he knows nothing of any forged telegram "but the committee who had the matter in hand stated that they had received it from him". A few observations from Chatham's statesman-journalist would now seem to be in order.

When in 1858 Russians founded the capital of the Amoor province, they named it Blagoveshchensk. This means "Good News." Three years later they founded the capital of Primorskaya, and gave it a name that plainly showed what it was intended to be—Vladivostok, "Ruler of the East." Near the end of the great transcontinental railway Russia made a brand-new city and called it Dalny, "Farthest," a very appropriate name for a place 5,800 miles from the starting point of the road.

Moving pictures are to be used by the Central Georgia Railroad, a Harriman line, to teach the elements of railroading to the more ignorant of the employees, many of whom are negroes and illiterate. It is believed that by substituting pictures for textbooks, they can be taught to perform their duties more intelligently. Almost every detail of train operation can be shown effectively on the screen and pictures can be run over as many times as may be needed to teach the processes thoroughly.

Millions of brown moths of an apparently harmless type have invaded the city during the past few days. They swarmed about the street lamps and this morning were piled up on the streets in places to a depth of three inches. The health authorities should see to it that the refuse is removed with the least possible delay.

### VIVID NARRATIVE OF REGINA DISASTER

At least one Montrealese was a sufferer in the disaster at Regina on Sunday. Mr. R. Bruce Bennett, an old High School boy, a son of Mr. R. B. Bennett, of 1320 Greene avenue Westmount, went through a most exciting and extraordinary experience. In a letter to his father he says: "Our block is a mass of ruins. There is nothing left of our house, and everything in it is destroyed. I was in my room when it happened and probably owe my life to the fact my room was on the top flat. There were a lot of people in our house and I don't know yet who or how many were saved. It was awful. "I was sitting in my room when it started to rain very heavily. I closed my window to keep it out, and thinking that it might come in at the back went to close the windows there. I had only been there a minute when something struck the window and broke it.

"Then things started to whirl past my face and I don't know what was the matter. I got back to my room and several things hit me on the head. I realized then it was a cyclone. I tried to get into the clothes closet and shut the door, but couldn't get to it. 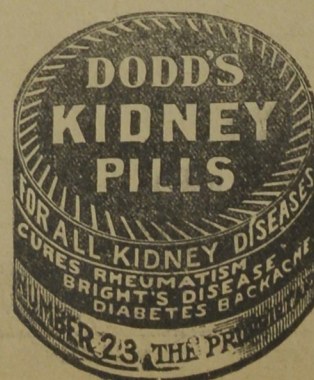
