## Fredericton at Top of League with Twenty Point Lead over Houlton

Locals Shut St. John out 5 to 0 in Fast Game at Scully's Grove--Heavy Batting won Game--Some "Solid Ivory" Stuff by Both Teams--Houlton was Slaughtered by Woodstock score 17 to 7

Fredericton whaled the Marathons yesterday, shutting them out at Scully's Grove, score 5 to 0. At the same time the Houlton Reds were trimmed 17 to 7 at Woodstock. The net result has been to put Fredericton at the top of the league with a lead of twenty points over Houlton and to tie St. John and Woodstock at the bottom of the league.

Fredericton plays at Houlton today and the Reds will have a chance of again climbing to the top of the heap if they can win. Harrington is to pitch today and Bates tomorrow against Houlton here. On Thursday Fredericton will play a double-header against the Greeks at St. John and will also play there on Friday.

### YESTERDAY'S GAME

Dave Brown pitched for the locals yesterday and was a mystery to the Marathons. Five scattered hits was all he allowed the St. John team. In the third inning the Greeks filled the bases. McGovern got his base on balls but was fielded out at second when Riley hit to the pitcher. Corey and Williams each hit safely sending Riley to third. Winter struck out and Fraser flied out to Larry Conley. After that only two St. John men there was no more scoring.

Fredericton's runs were scored in third and fifth innings. Corey the Marathon pitcher was forced for thirteen hits. Five of those came in the third inning and netted three runs. In the fifth Dutton had two errors in succession which coupled with two hits netted two more runs. After that the Greeks tightened up and there was no more scoring.

### BONE HEAD WORK

Both teams gave examples of poor work, the Marathons particularly when Corey put Ganley out between first and second and let Brown score while he was doing it. Fredericton put on some punk stuff when Bob Conley and Wildes were caught on the bases in a double play in the fourth.

## GEORGE GOULDING OF CANADA LOOKS GOOD IN OLYMPIC

Won First Heat of Ten Thousand Metre Walk--American Team Continues to Win

Stockholm, July 8--George Goulding of Toronto, carried the Canadian colors to the front in the first heat of the 10,000 metre walking contest today and is the favorite for the final event.

The Americans had another big day. James E. Meredith of Mercersburg Academy, set a world's record in the 800 metre run, while Melvin Sheppard surpassed his own record of 1908. Meredith's time for the distance was 1 min., 59.9-10 secs. He covered the half mile in 1 min., 51 1/2 secs. A. W. Richards of Brigham Young University, won the high jump. The Greek Tsicliteras captured the standing broad jump.

Joseph Kesser of Winnipeg, was not placed in the 10,000 metre run. United States athletes took 15 points out of the 24 today. England will compete in the finals of the 400 metre relay race. The Canadian team was defeated by Germany.
