TO FIGHT CAMPAIGN ON  
HIGH COST OF LIVING

Oyster Bay, N. Y., June 6—A campaign along novel lines is sketched by Colonel Roosevelt. As the progressive candidate of the new progressive party, Colonel Roosevelt intends to make an appeal largely to the farmer and wage workers, on the ground that neither the Democratic nor the Republican party is attempting seriously in this campaign to deal with the fundamental economic and social conditions which confront the country. It is from the farmer and wage earner, Colonel Roosevelt feels, that he has obtained his strength in the past. It is to them that he intends to appeal now.

Colonel Roosevelt said that Senator Joseph M. Dixon, of Montana, who managed his campaign for the Republican presidential nomination, will in all probability be his campaign manager in his fight at the head of the new party.

## LEAD PEOPLE'S PARTY

The former president intends to break far away from the conventional lines of conducting a campaign. He hopes to lead what he termed a people's government.

"This thing has got to be done by the people, or it won't be done at all," he said. "Of course we need leaders, but it doesn't make so much difference about the leaders after all." For that reason, he continued, he was not perturbed at the fact that some of the leaders in his recent

campaign had declined to follow him in his present fight.

Throughout his campaign he will contend that neither of the great old parties has shown the adaptability or the inclination to take the point of view of the average man who has to work for his living.

In this connection the high cost of living is to come in for special attention. The former president said he intends to deal with it, constantly, on the ground that while to some extent it is due to natural economic causes, there are collateral causes which may be reached and remedied.

## NEITHER SHOWS GRASP

Colonel Roosevelt has been engaged in a study of the platform adopted in Baltimore this week, and of the Republican platform, and believes he has found in them valuable campaign material. He said that neither of the party platforms showed the slightest understanding of the social and industrial movement which is under way in this country. They have taken up, he said, the old policies and the old battle cries of other years. It is his intention, he said, to attempt to set forth the conditions which in his opinion are responsible for the high cost of living, and the measure which he believes should be undertaken. Some students of economic conditions, he continued, believed that the trusts were responsible, and others, the tariff. He asserted that

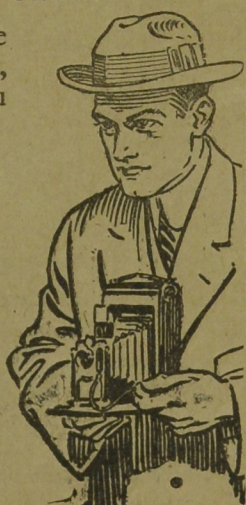

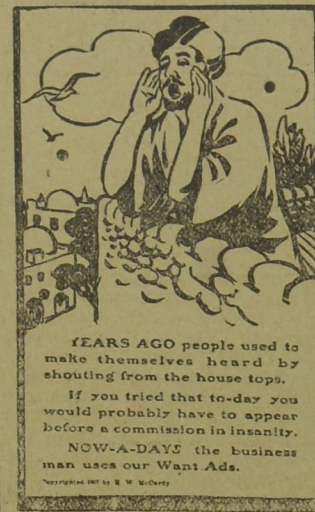
