Boston Fans Delighted with Showing
 Moncton Boxer Made Against

Boston, April 29--Quite a variety
 of boxers are booked for bouts in
 different parts of the country and the
 list includes our old friend Bob Lee.
 In some of the good bouts a Boston
 boxer will be one of the principals.
 This city is not to be without a
 show, for Sandy Ferguson, who is
 making an effort to get back stronger in
 the limelight, tackles Sailor
 White, one of the Brooklyn hopes, at
 the Central A.C. Friday night and
 Marchmaker McCarthy announces
 that a decision will be given.
 Such a thing will please the local
 fans, for they have no interest in
 no-decision bouts. Sandy has been
 on his good behavior since he re-
 turned to Boston and he promises to
 be in better shape than he was when
 he boxed Harris a couple of weeks
 ago.

He was in good shape then and if
 he keeps his promise the fans will see
 a good bout, for White has shown
 that he can go fast. He has wins
 over several of the heavies, including
 John Reno. The club has three good
 preliminaries.
 Bill McKinnon faces Bob Moha in
 New York Tuesday and the latter
 will have lots of trouble with Mc-
 Kinnon. Pal Moore has Jack Britton
 for his opponent in San Fran-
 cisco. Britton has been showing well
 in that city, but if he is no better

 Moore will have an easy time.

 in Denver Wednesday night. Gardner
 has been quietly working himself into
 condition, and unless he is in his old
 form, Baker, who is a tough custom-
 er, is likely to send Gardner back
 into retirement again.

MATT WELLS VS. HILLIARD LANG

New York, April 29--George Mc-
 Donald, manager of Matt Wells, the
 English lightweight champion, an-
 nounced today that Wells had been
 matched to meet Hilliard Lang, at
 the new stadium, Toronto, about the
 21st of May, and would leave New
 York shortly to begin training in To-
 ronto for the match.

McDonald also issued a statement
 saying that he was "Not surprised at
 Wells putting up such a poor show-
 ing on Friday," when Wells met Pac-
 key McFarland.

McDonald said that Wells was to
 have met Jack Carey in Rochester on
 April 11 and again in Pittsburgh on

 bout off." Meanwhile Wells had sig-

 time to get a fight before the match,
 although Billings, Wells' trainer,

 crossed the plate.


Winters pitched good enough ball
