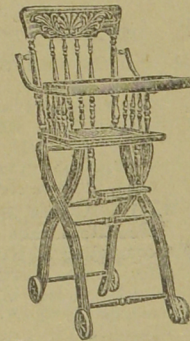
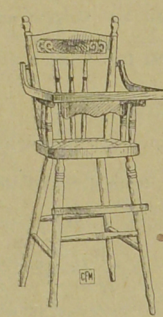

KING'S FORMER CHAPLAIN DISCIPLINED

London, Jan. 24—The Bishop of Norwich, under the provisions of the clergy discipline act, has declared the Rev. F. P. Farrar, formerly rector at Sandringham and domestic chaplain to King George, incapable of holding preferment. The Rev. Mr. Farrar who was domestic chaplain to George and the Queen Mother Alexandria, was recently deposed from his office by order of the King. His wife, who is a sister of Mr. Richard Harding Davis, returned to Sandringham a short time ago, disposed of their effects and joined her husband on the continent.

LLOYDS SELLING WAR INSURANCE

London, Jan. 24—The Times says that one or two large insurances were effected yesterday at Lloyds in connection with the complications arising out of the situation in Northern Europe. Five per cent. was accepted to cover the risk of an outbreak of hostilities between France and Italy within the next four months, and six per cent. was paid on the risk of an outbreak of war involving France, Germany, and this country, within the next six months.

BANK OF NOVA SCOTIA HAD RECORD YEAR

Halifax, Jan. 24—The annual meeting of the stockholders of the Bank of Nova Scotia was held here today. The report of the directors showed a record year's business. The old board of directors was re-elected for the ensuing year.

BURSTING OF PIPE KILLED TWO MEN

London, Jan. 24—The main steam pipe of the British steamer Skipton Castle, burst and killed two of her crew on the voyage from Galveston from where she sailed on January 6, for Antwerp. She was spoken on Jan. 20th, and reported that she was proceeding to Fayal in the Azores, after she had undergone temporary repairs.

MANITOBA GRAIN GROWERS

Brandon, Man., Jan. 26—Six hundred delegates assembled here today for what promises to be the most important as well as the largest annual convention ever held by the Manitoba Grain Growers' Association. The sessions will last three days. In addition to revising the constitution and transacting a large amount of routine business the convention will discuss the subjects of free trade and the preferential tariff, grain inspection, demurrage rates, government operation of terminal elevators and a plan for co-operative selling of farm produce and purchasing and distributing staple commodities. The programme provides also for lectures by prominent speakers on sociological and economic questions of the day.

CAMERA MEN CAPTURE DUKE

New York, Jan. 23—Before the luncheon to which fifty persons had been bidden, the Duke of Connaught went out for a stroll in the most democratic manner imaginable, attended only by Capt. Rivers-Bulkeley, aide-de-camp and comptroller of the royal household. He started out about. Out on Madison Avenue flanking all approaches to the Reid home, were sundry and divers squadrons of h-dakers.

The light was not very good as his royal highness and his military aide came forth, wherefore many a picture gun snapped its trigger in vain.

As the Duke and his companion turned east through 49th street skirmish parties of camera men swarmed about them. There was a twinkle in the Duke's eye as he observed the manoeuvres. At first he had been deaf to appeals that he stand and pose, but at last he laughed heartily, stopped and exclaimed: "I capitulate, I am your prisoner; prime your weapons, gentlemen, and fire away."

The governor-general then permitted himself to be posed and bombarded. When it was all over the victorious army raised their hats in salute and the duke acknowledged the salute by raising his derby and saluting. Still smiling he sauntered on his way, turning into Fifth avenue and strolling down as far as 45th street, followed within a moderate distance by reporters, one Canadian secret service man and an American detective.

Col. Theodore Roosevelt and Mrs. Roosevelt were among the guests at luncheon today.

BARRY WON FROM LANG ON POINTS

Sydney, Australia, Jan. 24—James Barry, the heavyweight pugilist of Chicago at the Stadium here today defeated Bill Lang of Victoria, the former heavyweight champion of Australia. The contest lasted the whole twenty rounds. Barry eventually winning on points.
