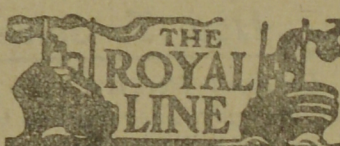

## St. John Won from Fredericton in Hard Fought Game Last Night, Score 4 to 3

Local Team not up to Standard of Play—Displayed in Marysville Game—Shooting was Poor—St. John Team Strong and Fast—Lots of Rough Work with Fredericton Getting Heavy End of the Penalties

### ST. JOHN ALL THE WAY

It was St. John all the way during the first half. Fredericton started out with a spurt but failed to last. Cribbs stopped a couple of hot ones Galloway and Gilbert were the players who were doing the most of the playing. St. John kept Pond busy. Galloway carried the puck down again and again but failed with his shots Coleman doing the same. McAvity was relieving the pressure on the St. John goal by rushing. Play went from end to end. McAvity got away on an end to end rush and scored on a magnificent shot.

Fredericton failed to get going properly. Walker tried a long shot and put the puck in the net but the referee stopped the puck in the net but Referee Staples had whistled for an off side just before the shot was made. ### FREDERICTON WAKES UP.

The second half began with Fredericton displaying a little more ginger. George Walker ran through the St. John forwards, but "Bumps" McAvity took the rubber back. The visitors' defence were given all they could attend to, but Fredericton, as all through the piece, showed they could not shoot. Face-off after face-off took place right in front of the St. John net and it was after one of these that Coleman poked in the first Fredericton goal three minutes from the beginning of the half.

St. John got busy and took the play to the Fredericton end, but could not keep it there. Byron Burden tried one of his long shots, which proved so effective in the Marysville game. To some of the spectators it looked as if the puck entered the goal, but Cribbs cleared and the goal-judge did not signal. Play became pretty lively. Pugh was caught using his stick on Percy McAvity and was given a short rest on the side. With six men against seven, Fredericton dug right in and Coleman scored his second goal just as he did his first.

Pugh and Walker were both hurt at this stage of the game. Players were showing ill-feeling and scrapping was frequent. Fredericton's final goal was tallied by Walker on a long shot.

With but a few minutes left Fredericton did not let up a minute. Clawson and Walker, who had been after one another all through the game, clashed again and both went off for the balance of the game. St. John worked hard to keep the lead and succeeded. Fredericton's failures in shooting giving them the game.

The St. John team won its first game of the season last night, beating Fredericton 4 to 3, and having to work all the time to do it. The play was rough and fast practically all through, the players mixing it up frequently. Walker and Clawson were "chased" by the referee just before the end of the game. These two got into a mixup before that and Walker went to the bench, although the St. John man started the racket. Pugh, Gilbert and Walker were all disabled at various stages of the game, Walker's injury being the most serious. Some spectators who should have known better yelled out that he was quitting. Walker has yet to be seen to quit. Gilbert got a crack over the head that put him away for a time and Pugh collided with the end of the rink. There was lots of tripping and other illegal play, much of which the referee let go unnoticed. He penalized the home team pretty heavily, however, and was hissed by the crowd for some of the penalties handed out.

### ST. JOHN TEAM STRONG.

The St. John team was practically the same as that which has represented the Winterport for the past two seasons. "Wizard" Cribbs was in the net and did his work well. Art Tully who learned his hockey at St. F. X., was point and pulled off some of his old-time hurdlings stunts, which, though looking very pretty, do not figure in the scoring. Malcolm McAvity put up a steady game at coverpoint. Of the forwards, "Brad" Gilbert, Hallie Clawson and Percy McDonald, late of Sydney, played left wing and put up a good game. Gilbert was the star of the forward line, skating faster than any forward that has been seen here this season and covering a lot of ice. Clawson departed from his usual tactics by attempting a lot of foul play and got by with the most of it, too. George Walker was the object of the most of Clawson's attentions, and paid them back with interest. P. McAvity was outskated by Pugh and had all he could do to watch the U.N.B. midget. Tully and M. McAvity, with their runs down the ice, started the plays which were most dangerous to Fredericton and which resulted in scores.

### FREDERICTON OFF COLOR.

The Fredericton seven played away below the form showed against Marysville, not striking their gait at all until the second half and then losing chances to score through poor shooting. Walker was a brilliant exception, playing hard from start to finish, but roughed things up so that the referee noticed it too much. Pugh and Galloway on the wings took care of their men all right, but at centre Channery Coleman was away off, not playing at all like he did against Marysville. Two of his shots figure in the scoring summary, but on the whole his shooting was bad. The same was true of Burden, who persisted in trying long shots. Sterling was prominent with some rushes and had his usual siesta with the timers. Pond made some good stops and shots that passed him were pretty difficult.
