## FLORENCE FAIRBANKS ON FADS AND FASHIONS

New York, January 20.—Velvets and corduroys have become extremely popular for tailored costumes and are used a great deal. Now the French are adding plush, that soft supple, rich fabric with a satin sheen, to the materials of the tailored class. This material lends itself most charmingly to handsome suits, particularly in combination with broadcloth. A distinctive model much admired by the friends of its charming wearer, was of a rich olive green plush in combination with broadcloth. The rather long coat of the plush closed to one side with a full length line of handsome enameled buttons. The wide-draping revers were of a similar shade of green broadcloth, as was the upper part of the skirt, lengthened by a knee-depth flounce of the plush.

A negligee to be thoroughly practical should be washable, though cleansing is now so quickly and cheaply done that anything at all dainty is usually sent to the cleanser, and for the cheap cold weather negligees of washable character outing flannels, fine French flannels, challis and albatross cloth are the materials usually chosen. Albatross is the material with which the designers secure the best effects. In pink and blue it is charming, and white albatross made up over a pink silk is perhaps even more effective. Unlined sacks and boudoir robes of pink or blue trimmed simply by embroidered scalloping of the edges and by an embroidered collar of the material, or possibly a collar of lingerie or lace, are exceedingly attractive and easily tubbed.

Without the hand embroidered scalloping models are sold at very moderate prices. A lining of India silk throughout the robe or merely from the waistline up adds something to the cost, but adds also to the warmth of the garment without interfering with its laundering qualities. If tubing is not to be considered, more latitude is allowed in the trimming of the albatross robe, though the character of such a garment should always be unpretentious and simple. A heavy lace insertion and edge of Cluny, Irish or heavy torchon may be used as trimming, and bands of puffing in silk or in the albatross are sometimes used effectively. Much depends upon the collar in such a robe and, of course, upon the line. The modish negligee, like all modish garments of the season, achieves a clinging narrowness, but needs also ample fullness for the ease and comfort of the wearer in her hours of relaxation.

Cashmere too is used for simple negligees and some smart simple looking simple robes in light blue or pink cashmere or broadcloth are trimmed in wide, flat white silk braid or in the white braid with an effective narrow line of black braid edging the white. The flannels are warm but less satisfactory in other respects than the albatross, because they are rather more clumsy and show soil more readily.

Some of the simple boudoir robes in wool have fringe borders as their only trimming, but even narrow fringe is apt to tangle and muss, and of course the fringe makes laundering difficult, if not impossible. The challis are extremely pretty this season and some of them are very cleverly used by the designer of negligees, bordered effects being particularly successful. The material wears well, tubs well and has pleasant warmth without bungleome thickness; but for some reason it is not considered quite so smart as other materials and is used but little by French makers.

For the very warm robe wadded silk or zenana cloth is the thing and both are offered in models more or less expensive, and more or less elaborate. Japanese hand embroidered robes lavishly adorn some of these wadded robes. The ordinary ready made robe of wadded silk is a comfortable but unbecoming thing, with its bulky turnover collar, and the handsome zenana robes with embroidered collars of lace and lingerie are usually very expensive to buy the zenana cloth in the color wanted and have the robe to fit well and with detachable lingerie and lace collars, which lend daintiness to the robe but may easily be removed and washed.

Among silk for negligees there are many weaves and many grades. Quaint kimono silks of Japanese designs come in varying degrees of beauty and quality, but the silk preferred by the French designers are the one tone crepes of dull or crinkled satin finish. Some attractive models are made up in the India silks, but these silks are more popular for the summer negligee than for the

winter garment and are usually made with much tucking and lace, while the chic winter negligee robe is, as has been said, of a knowing simplicity. Where India silk is used it is as a rule over some contrasting color which shows softly through its semi-transparency, and even for three effects a very sheer crinkly crepe or something approaching a satin mouseline is better liked.

This season ribbons are used to make bodices, panels, boleros, casques and all sorts of collars and cuffs, and various blouse garnitures. There is also a marked and growing preference for girdles of ribbon. Some of the smartest of these girdles are of three or more breadths in pastel colors in messaline or gauze ribbon, or in breadths of several tones of the same color. The belt is generally draped. In another style the ribbon and in still another it is twisted.

Almost every kind of ribbon is used as trimming for party and evening wear. Floral ribbons are in high favor, as are also bordered styles and two-tones, and all with some gold or silver. The color preference seems to be for a delicate shaded pattern on a light ground, and the widths range from six to ten inches.

**GALLEY TWO—Florence**—Double face satin with a contrasting back, and about four inches wide is made into very double box-plaited ruffles sewn in the middle with a very pretty color effect. Gauze and gold or silver ribbons about five inches wide are shirred into conventional patterns over a cord, and fancy styles of every width and style are gathered into flounces ruffles and frills. Very narrow ribbons are largely used as an edging to lace or net ruffles, or are put in like braid, in a pattern. Rich and exquisite patterns on satin and used as panels, tablier and other trappings.

Among the most quaint hat shapes for children are the Dutch bonnets with puff crowns and the strikingly prominent sides curiously bent and standing away from the face. This style is built up in fascinating ways, the ears being of contrasting material and quite ornamental. Metal laces are often employed for that purpose.
