DR. BYRNE HAS FORFEITED HIS BAIL

(Chatham World)

Dr. Byrne's Departure—When Mr. Tweedie asked for an adjournment in the Dr. Byrne case, on the ground that he had not been able to consult his client, Mr. Guthrie, counsel for the Crown, told the court that Mr. Tweedie could not be speaking seriously. It is clear however, that the statement was literally correct as the accused had left town. Dr. Byrne, having apparently decided not to undergo the disagreeable and uncertain ordeal of trial has left for parts unknown, and will probably never return. Many personal friends, attached to him for his lovable qualities and intellectual gifts, and a large number of sick persons who have great faith in his professional skill, very much regret his departure. His offence, which the jury might not have found to be as serious as the charge on which he was held—attempted rape, was committed, no doubt when drunk or an overdose of a drug that he was said to have been in the habit of taking at times had temporarily deprived him of reason and judgment. Such conduct as is charged against the accused in the criminal information can only be explained on the supposition that he was 'not all there' at the time, as it is inconsistent with his talents, education and position. Some persons inspired by personal, political or other reasons are rejoicing in his downfall, but everyone with the milk of human kindness or the salt of Christian charity in his soul must deeply regret the occurrence and sympathize with the sorrowing family of the accused.

BATTLE OF 50 YEARS AGO

Sharpsburg, Md., Sept. 17—Numerous flags and wreaths were placed this morning about the monuments and markers that dot the field where thousands of soldiers of the blue and the gray fought and fell fifty years ago today in the battle of Antietam. The battle was one of the most terrible of the civil war. The Union forces were in command of General McClellan and the Confederates were led by General Lee who had been joined the previous day by "Stone-wall" Jackson. About 100,000 men were engaged, and the conflict raged with great fury from daylight until dark. The Federals were repeatedly repulsed, but at night both armies held the same positions as in the morning. In the eleven hours fight about 16,000 of the Northern Army and 20,000 of the Confederate Army fell, in addition to many thousands who died after the battle.

Philadelphia, Pa., Sept. 17—The Right Rev. Monsignor John J. McCort was today consecrated auxiliary bishop of the Roman Catholic diocese of Philadelphia with the title of bishop of Azotus. The ceremony took place in the presence of a large assemblage of bishops, clergy and laymen. The complete ritualistic ceremony of the church was carried out in the consecration. Archbishop Prendergast officiated as chief consecrator and the Right Rev. Monsignor McDevitt preached the consecration sermon.

The Marconi Company has entered into agreement with the Norwegian Government for the erection of a high-powered station at San Francisco and Honolulu in connection with its trans-Pacific wireless scheme.

RUMORED CHANGES IN MERCANTILE MARINE

London, Sept. 17—J. Bruce Ismay who is shooting in Yorkshire, telegraphs as follows to an inquiry as to whether there is any truth in the rumor that he about to retire:—

"I have no communication to make at present."

Another report which has gained currency is that Harold Sanderson would retire from the Vice-Presidency of the International Mercantile Marine, but Sanderson yesterday gave emphatic contradiction to this, declaring that had not the slightest idea of retiring. Asked as to Mr. Ismay's position, Mr. Sanderson said he had heard no such change as that which had been reported as impending. He was convinced, he said, that had any such thing as retirement been contemplated Ismay would have been the first to announce the fact. Other officials at the company's headquarters gave a complete denial, general substance to the report.

FIRE CHIEFS IN SESSION

Denver, Colo., Sept. 17—Chiefs of the fire departments of many of the leading cities of the United States and Canada were on hand today at the opening in the city of the fortieth annual meeting of the International Association of Fire Engineers. The session will last four days and will be devoted to the discussion of building inspection, the advantages of motor drawn apparatus, the care of fire hydrants, high pressure systems and other subjects pertaining to fire fighting. J. A. Tremblay of Montreal, John Kenlon of New York City, C. W. Ringers of Minneapolis, James Smart of Calgary, F. J. Connelly of New Castle, Pa., and Fred Brodbeck of Salina, Kas., are among the fire chiefs who are on the program for papers or addresses.

SOVEREIGN GRAND LODGE IN WINNIPEG

Winnipeg, Sept. 16—The eighty-eighth annual session of the Sovereign Grand Lodge of the Independent Order of Oddfellows, convened formally in Winnipeg today with what Grand Patriarch Master E. H. Dewart declared is the largest gathering of the craft in the history of the world.

The first session was an informal reception at the Congregational church at which Premier Roblin and Mayor Waugh greeted the delegates. Speeches were also given by the grand officers. The grand lodge immediately opened after the reception, and the military branch of the order convened separately. The insurance branch will meet this afternoon and the Oddfellows' Home Association. Tonight Hon. John B. Cockerill, the grand sire of the Sovereign Grand Lodge, will hold a reception.

It is said that some important legislation bearing on the insurance features of the order will be enacted at the first session.

Winnipeg, Man., Sept. 17—The Sovereign Grand Lodge, Independent Order of Oddfellows, devoted the day to business and much routine work was settled. The Past President's Association held a meeting and the annual meeting of the Oddfellows' Fraternal Press Association was also a big feature of the day. There is a garden party at Government House, given by the Lieutenant governor, this afternoon.

Fred Howard marked the McEwan Farm station, Blue Feather, by Walnut Hall, in 2.19 at Hartford.

listen instead to the voice of reason. "I will go next week to Ontario, to talk to my English-speaking fellow-citizens. I did not do very well in Ontario at the last election."

"You'll do better next time," said the voice.

"But I want them to look at me and say," continued Sir Wilfrid, "He is a true Canadian."

The crowd, English and French alike, cheered the incident.

CRITICISM OF MR. BOURASSA.

Sir Wilfrid's speech was marked with if possible, an even greater optimism than that at Marieville. It differed in that he included in it a lengthy and biting criticism of Henri Bourassa, occasioned by an article written by the Nationalist leader in Le Devoir on Wednesday last regarding his speech at Marieville. One statement made by Bourassa was that Laurier when in power, had signed a secret agreement with the British Admiralty. This he characterized as absolutely false, and challenged Mr. Bourassa or Mr. Borden to produce proofs of the statement.

LAURIER POLICY PLUS DONATION?

There was one other feature of the meeting that is worthy of special note. It was a statement by the Hon. Mr. Lemieux, which may be a forecast of what the Conservative naval policy is going to be.

"The naval law of Laurier will never be abolished," said Mr. Lemieux. "But they will add to it a monetary contribution, pretending that a great peril menaces Great Britain."

GREATER RECEPTION THAN LAST YEAR.

"It was just about this time a year ago," said Sir Wilfrid Laurier, in opening his speech, "that I stood before you premier of Canada and asked you to return me to power. I was not returned to power. Now I stand before you a simple citizen of Canada, yet the reception you give me is greater than that of last year. It is in adversity that one knows one's friends. The day after my defeat messages of sympathy from every part of the Dominion came pouring in a flood, which brought the tears to my eyes. For I was then nothing. I was no longer premier. I was only a citizen like yourselves. But I have found that my compatriots have more respect for me now than when I was in power. They said that I was thirsty for honors, hungry for power. But my friends know that I had never been animated by cupidity, and the day following my defeat I was sitting in opposition with a face as serene as when I was in power."


"It was not that I did not have opportunities to do otherwise. The day will come, which has not yet come, when it will be known what honors I refused."

BOURASSA'S INSULTS AN HONOR

"But I present myself to you today simply as Sir Wilfrid Laurier, a Canadian citizen, and I am just as proud of it as I was of being premier. Not merely hundreds of families but thousands have become happy and prosperous during my administration, and I look back on my work and am satisfied. My ex-friend, Henri Bourassa—I say ex-friend, because we are not now the friends we were in the past—has done me the honor to refer to me this week in his paper, Le Devoir. I had great hopes of him at one time; but he has ill-returned them. I wanted to place in my cabinet in '96 the strongest man I could find in all the provinces of the Dominion. There were two young men assisting me at that time. One of them was Mr. Lemieux, and the other my ex-friend, Mr. Bourassa. Bourassa has gone. Lemieux is with me still and the greatest honor he has is to be insulted daily by his former friend, Bourassa. I was a progressive, Bourassa was a reactionary. He was a Bourbon; he learned nothing, he forgot nothing. He was still at the school of his famous grandfather, Papineau. I read his paper every day however. I breakfast on Le Devoir and dine on The Mail and Empire. It is not because of this that I am getting fat, however. A difference between myself and Bourassa's friends is that I am getting fat since I left the 'trough.' The Devoir, however, is food for me. But what is food for one is poison for another. The Devoir poisons the whole country."

NOT AFRAID OF ANYTHING.

"He accuses me of growing old. It is true. I am growing old. I will be 71 years of age in a few weeks now. I am ready to drop out of the fight as soon as my friends think my strength is not equal to my courage. But I have still good feet, good eyes and good mouth and I am not afraid of anything. I wish I could make the same reproach regarding the age of Bourassa that he does of me. But (Continued on page three.)"
