New York, Jan. 25—Locomotive engineers on all the railroads in the eastern territory have made demands for a general increase in wages amounting from twenty to twenty-five percent. The demands involve all roads east of Chicago and North of the line of the Norfolk and Western Railroad and of the Ohio River. Letters from brotherhood officials to the president of these railroad demand increased wages in varying scales, the object being to standardize the wage scale on all lines in this territory which was done by trainmen and conductors in 1910.

WOODSTOCK TO HAVE ILLUSTRATION ORCHARD

Woodstock, N.B., Jan. 24—Following the example of other cities, Woodstock is to have a demonstration apple orchard. This was settled at tonight's meeting in the court house, presided over by J. T. A. Diblee, president of the board of trade, and addressed by A. G. Turney, provincial horticulturist, his subject being "Apple Culture in New Brunswick."

Premier Flemming also spoke.

This afternoon Mr. Turney visited some of the neighboring orchards in company with George E. Balmain, E. W. Mair, A. D. Holyoke, J. T. A. Diblee and W. S. Carr.

During his address, Mr. Turney showed what had been achieved by the department with the three demonstration orchards in Albert, Sunbury and York counties and illustrated by means of views thrown upon the canvas the methods of cultivating the trees to get the best results. He presented figures showing the expenditure in connection with each orchard and also gave the net revenue from the same.

The amount required to establish a ten-acre orchard near Woodstock was subscribed in a short time, the estimated cost being about \$1,000. This would be sufficient to buy the land trees and cover all the cost to be incurred by the stockholders. He estimated that from the inter-cropping there would be a return of five per cent. on the investment before the trees began to yield. The government would assist in selecting the site, plant the orchard, and, for demonstration purposes, would get what was necessary for inter-cropping the orchard. Five gentlemen present agreed to subscribe \$200 each and it is thought possibly a twenty-acre orchard will be chosen at a cost of about \$2,000.

London, Jan. 25—After a lapse of nearly two and a quarter centuries since his death, London paid a belated tribute to the memory of John Bunyan today, when the national memorial window in the north transept of Westminster Abbey was unveiled with the impressive ceremony. The memorial of the "inspired tinker" was designed by J. N. Cowper and executed at a cost of \$6,000, raised by popular subscription. 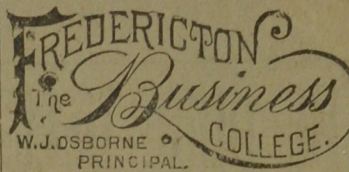

Belfast, Can. 25—The Unionists who are opposing so strongly Winston Spencer Churchill's appearance at Belfast on February eighth, on behalf of Home Rule, have found a staunch ally in the Belfast Harbor Board which has practically notified the first lord of the admiralty that in its opinion he had better keep away from the capital of Ulster. Mr. Churchill announced to the commissioners of Belfast Harbor yesterday that he desired to visit the Harbour and docks on February 9th the day after the proposed home rule meeting.

At a special meeting held by the Harbor Board today, the commissioners drew up a reply to the effect that February 9 would not be a convenient date for him to inspect the harbor and docks.

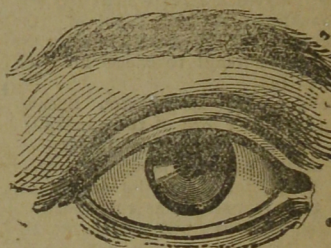
