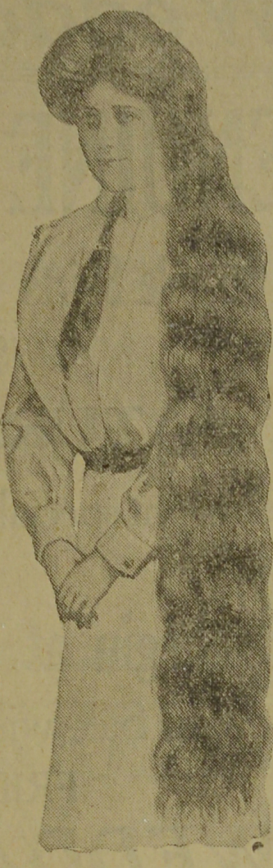

## NEW YORK HONORS NEW CARDINAL

New York, Jan. 25—New York's celebration in honor of the elevation of the Most Reverend John M. Farley to the cardinalate, which began a week ago with the welcome of the new Cardinal upon his arrival from Rome, culminated today in notable religious ceremonies held in St. Patrick's Cathedral. The demonstration was one of the most remarkable of its kind ever held in the metropolis and was participated in by eminent prelates and priests of the Roman Catholic church from many parts of the United States and Canada. The leading features of the service were the celebration of the solemn pontifical mass by Archbishop Predestinate of Philadelphia, a sermon by the Rt. Rev. Thomas F. Cusack, archbishop of New York, and addresses of congratulation in behalf of the clergy and laity, delivered respectively by the Rt. Rev. Mgr. Michael J. Lavelle, rector of the Cathedral, and Justice Victor F. Dowling. Cardinal Farley presided in the sanctuary during the celebration of the mass.

A play of Bohemian and theatrical life by Arthur W. Pinero will be produced in London shortly. It bears the title of "Mind the Paint Girl," and the leading part in it will be played by Marie Lohr.

## LAURIER AND THE QUEBEC HIERARCHY

Ottawa, Jan. 15—Sir Wilfrid Laurier is an old man, but if he is spared another ten years he may yet be remembered as the greatest of Canadians. The task he is now disposed to attempt is one that would rank in history as being much more far-reaching in its consequences than any of his past performances. It is nothing less than the emancipation of Canada from French clerical domination, and the giving to Quebec of liberty of thought and action. For this delicate task requiring both courage and finesse, Sir Wilfrid is remarkably fitted. No man in Canada is by his experience and his natural gifts so qualified to undertake it. Nor does anyone better appreciate the momentous issues involved. So it is a happy fact that the vagaries of fortune have brought Sir Wilfrid to the point where he is disposed to burn his bridges behind him and do or die.

The principles of Sir Wilfrid are truly liberal. His love of autonomy is a veritable passion, but he also loves power, and in his effort he often has done the thing that appeared expedient from the party viewpoint. Hence his reputation for dexterity and nimbleness. But the fact remains that the Liberal leader has frequently been in open conflict with the ultramontanes, that he has secretly chafed over the degree to which they have influenced his policy, and that even when the two have appeared to be working in harmony, distrust and animity have actually existed.

### CAN AFFORD TO CUT LOOSE

The time has come when Sir Wilfrid has nothing to gain by considering the desires of the ultramontanes. Although they knew he had gone no further than was absolutely necessary toward placating Anglo-Saxon sentiment, they broke with him and took an important part in the accomplishment of his downfall. The thing was gratuitous. If he had not done for them all his early speeches led them to expect, he at least had served them better than any other politician could have done. Having been led by them to the slaughter, Sir Wilfrid would be more or less human if he did not chuckle when they found the fruits of their victory had a bitter taste. Nor could he be expected to show any eagerness to console them for their disappointment. Rather one might look for him to reveal his true colors and taking advantage of their distress make a fight for the cause he had always at heart.

### MINISTERS GET ENLARGED VISION

As we predicted immediately after the formation of the Borden Cabinet the three men therein who are supposed to represent the ultramontanes to whom the French Canadians are already looking as the new leaders of their race are coming to regard themselves as the servants of the whole Canadian people. Their vision has been enlarged, the importance of certain phases of Quebec sentiment is being seen by them in its correct perspective and they feel like resisting pressure put upon them to give effect to the sentiments they themselves expressed on the hustings. Consequently a split is already imminent between the Bourassa extremists on the outside and their former colleagues on the inside of the cabinet. It is said that at the Nationalist banquet, which was suddenly postponed two weeks ago Mr. Bourassa intended to make a vicious attack on the premier and some of his colleagues in the hope of driving the French ministers publicly to choose between serving the English of the French-speaking race. The real reason for the postponement is said to have been to afford Mr. Borden time to decide to yield to the ultramontane demands. Should Mr. Borden refuse to meet them, Mr. Bourassa, it is said will probably launch a campaign against the government.

### REJECTED NATIONALISTS ADVANCES

Sir Wilfrid has no desire to play the game of the Nationalists. It is currently reported that they approached him with the proposal that they should again ally themselves with the Liberals and that Sir Wilfrid promptly and scornfully rejected any such idea. He may even have gone further and have told them that while he had strength to resist them he would oppose all their policies. That would only be in line with the written warning that Sir Wilfrid and French Liberals at Ottawa and Quebec sent to his Holiness the Pope. That warning given shortly before the election campaign last September was part of a protest to Rome against the activity of the ultramontanes against the Liberal party. The pontiff was plainly told that nothing but disaster to the church could follow a continuance of their propaganda. The energies of the younger priests and bishops in Quebec who are mostly Nationalists were not so openly exerted thereafter, and as a result of the protest Archbishop Bruchesi failed to secure the red hat

at the last consistory. But the blow fell on Laurier despite all and over a dozen seats in Quebec were lost by the Liberal party. Now we may look for "the disaster" to the church.

### WHAT CALLED SIR WILFRID

It is true that Laurier would have been defeated without the hostility of the Nationalists. That is hardly the point. Sir Wilfrid realizes now that he invited a reverse when he tried to force on Canada reciprocal trade relations with the United States. What calls him worse than the defeat is the thought that the men of his own race turned on him led by hierarchy for whom he had sacrificed liberal principles and the support of large sections of the English-speaking electorate. They drove him to the point where he had either to commit political suicide—which further concessions to the French ultramontanes involved—or ignore their threatened chastisement. He chose the latter course and was punished. Punishment under such circumstances is peculiarly galling.

### MAY REPUDIATE BOURASSA

Of the questions which are immediately before Parliament the two in which the ultramontanes are most interested are the navy and the school system in the Manitoba annex. Bourassa is bitterly opposed to measures of national defence and will likely be even more strongly hostile to the navy measure Mr. Borden will submit than he was to Sir Wilfrid's Canadian navy proposals. As to the school question the National leader always insisted that separate schools should be fastened on any territory added to Manitoba, but Sir Wilfrid when Premier, resisted.

There is reason to believe that the Liberal leader will support Mr. Borden in any refusal to interfere with Manitoba's freedom of choice. Instead, therefore, of gaining strength by chastising Sir Wilfrid, the Nationalists will have been rendered impotent, and at the best be a mere handful of men in opposition to both of the two great parties. Indeed, it seems probable that the so-called Nationalist M.P.'s will all join with the three French ministers in repudiating Bourassa and his policies and that the whole nationalist movement will end in a fiasco. Mr. Bourassa would then have to begin all over again. He is probably sincere in his views and it is doubtful that any "fob" could be found for him big enough to have an anaesthetic effect, Ottawa rumors to the contrary.

### INCITING REVOLT AGAINST CHURCH

The most serious side of Laurier's onslaught on ultramontanism is not likely to be Parliamentary. At least it is more likely to take the form at first of a direct appeal to the people of Quebec to quit the papal nursery and manage their own affairs without priestly interference. It is known that Archbishop Bruchesi, since the recent election sought a conference with Sir Wilfrid, which bluntly refused to see him. His

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Grace of Montreal is anxious to force separate schools on the Manitoba annex, but Sir Wilfrid will have none of it. Sir Wilfrid is about due to abandon the defensive attitude and make an attack. If his days do not come to an early close, his reprisals may deprive the church of its legal right to collect tithes and take from it the power to make the marriage laws of Quebec.

### LET PARTY APPLICATIONS GO

The clerical question in Canada will be acute before the present session in parliament comes to a close. The school issue will be closely related to the alliance between the Conservatives and the Nationalists. Many surprises will be sprung and readjustments all along the line may result. Protestants and Britishers should consider what they stand for and be prepared to punish any and all who violate the principles by democracy or the glory of British institutions, we must consider principles before party ties.
