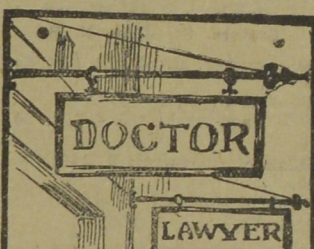

BOB ROGERS

TRIED TO WIN

The Toronto Globe, under date of
 July 10th, the day preceding the
 Saskatchewan election, had the fol-
 lowing:

"THE CONSERVATIVE PARTY
 IS THE ONLY ONE THAT CON-
 TROLS THE PUBLIC LANDS. ALL
 HOMESTEADS MUST BE OBTAIN-
 ED FROM THE CONSERVATIVES."

Worthy of the party that issued a
 bogus royal proclamation calling
 upon the Indians of Haldimand to
 vote for a Conservative candidate
 are the appeals now being made to
 the immigrants from Continental

Europe to vote for Mr. Robert Rog-
 ers' nominees in the Saskatchewan
 election. That reproduced above is
 the most striking feature of full page
 advertisements that appeared last
 week in the four Catholic church
 papers published in Winnipeg. The
 papers that carried the advertise-
 ment were The Northwest Review,
 published in English; The Canada
 West, German; The Gazeta Kato-
 licks, Polish, and The Ruthenian
 Weekly.

Mr. Rogers or the agent who pre-
 pared this gigantic cheat on his
 behalf, does not leave the foreign
 settlers in doubt as to the meaning
 to be attached to the notice, which
 goes on to say:

"There are thousands of acres of
 land now held under lease which are
 closed to settlers, but these will soon
 be thrown open by the Conservative
 for homesteading. Many more thou-
 sands of acres are now locked up
 from the settlers, and it is the party
 that expects the settlers' support.
 The Scott government can do nothing
 for the settler, for it has nothing to
 do with the granting of home-steads.
 There is only one party that can
 help settlers—the Conservative
 party."

The political history of Canada
 contains no such flagrant public at-
 tempt as this to bribe the electorate
 of an entire province, and to drag on
 such as cannot be bribed. What do
 the decent Conservatives of the east
 think of this public announcement to
 the Poles, Ruthenians and Galicians
 of the west that "all homesteads
 must be obtained from the Conserva-
 tives," and the inference intended to
 be drawn and that will be drawn
 from it, that the man who wants a
 homestead or desires to keep the
 homestead he has, had better vote for
 the Conservative candidate?

That is politics as played by the
 Hon. Robert Rogers, minister of the
 interior in the Borden cabinet. What
 does the Hon. W. T. White think of
 it? Does he believe that it will ad-
 vance the cause of Canadian nation-
 ality to turn a political wolf like
 the minister of the interior loose on
 the ignorant foreign settlers of the
 west? It was sometimes alleged by
 the Conservatives that the homestead
 inspectors of the department of the
 interior, under Liberal rule, put pres-
 sure upon the settlers to vote Liberal
 but few specific instances were given,
 and nothing of a flagrant nature dis-
 closed. Here, under a government
 that is held up as a model of all the
 virtues, we have public warning given
 to the settlers of the west that the
 Conservative party "expects the sup-
 port of the settlers," accompanied
 by the grim reminder that "all home-
 steads must be obtained from the
 Conservatives."

Fair minded men of both parties
 will be glad to learn that the people
 of Saskatchewan despise Rogers'
 bribes and scorn his threats. The
 Rogers method of campaigning, if
 it had been successful, would have
 reduced the settlers of the west to a
 condition of bondage, little short of
 slavery itself.

A BETTER TOWN

Last Thursday Campbellton cele-
 brated the second anniversary of the
 great fire, which wiped that town out
 of existence on July 11, 1910. The
 celebration included parades and
 sports and the formal opening of the
 new grammar school, one of the finest
 public school structures in the
 province. For one who has visited
 Campbellton recently it is impossible
 to comprehend the tremendous strides
 made in building up a new and splen-
 did town on the ashes of the old one
 while those who have witnessed the
 up-building of the town it is nothing
 short of a marvel what the enter-
 prise, loyalty and faith of their peo-
 ple have accomplished. The Graphic
 voices the indominate spirit of the
 citizens when it says:

"The fire did much damage to the
 town but with it all was a blessing
 in disguise. From the ruins of the
 old has arisen a new and mighty
 Campbellton, a better and stronger
 people, a more virulent society, and
 a happier community.

The spirit which animated the peo-
 ple in the re-establishing of their
 homes after the great calamity still
 remains, and in the knowledge that

London, July 17—Frances Dyke
 Ackland, Parliamentary under secre-
 tary for foreign affairs in reply to
 questions in the House of Commons
 today on the subject of atrocities
 in connection with the rubber indus-
 try in the Putumayo district of Peru
 stated that the British Government
 throughout had been in close com-
 munication with the United States

 and support would be helpful, they
