SIR WILFRID SPEAKS TO KNIGHTS OF GRIP

Montreal, Dec. 23—Sir Wilfrid Laurier spoke at the annual dinner of the Commercial Travellers' Association at the Windsor Hotel tonight. On rising to reply to the toast of Canada, the "Chief" was given one of the most cordial and prolonged ovations ever tendered a public man in this city. The large gathering rose to their feet, waved their napkins, applauded and cheered again and again, and ended up with the singing of "He's a Jolly Good Fellow," "O Canada!" and then more cheers, until it seemed they would never stop.

Sir Wilfrid was in a happy humor and delivered an address humorous at times and again touched with pathos, then turning to the patriotic and rousing his audience to fresh outbursts of cheers. The address was characteristic of the speaker. He made himself one with his audience used the terms of the road, the language of commerce, and touched on the incidents familiar to commercial travellers. "The commercial traveller is always the prince of good fellows; his wine is the choicest, his company the best, he is always ready to share with you his last cigar or tell you the latest story. They are the future merchant princes of the country. They have faith in themselves, in the goods they sell, and in the future of their country. They are the pioneers of our commercial expansion."

LONG AND PERILOUS TRIP FROM YUKON

Ottawa, Dec. 23—Fresh from a 7,500 mile trip from his constituency in the Yukon, a great part of which was made in hazard from the perils of freezing cold and drifting river ice, Dr. Alfred W. Thompson, M. P., the long-distance member of the Canadian Parliament, is in the city.

Starting from Dawson on November 3, the member from the Yukon had to turn back again when the steamer on which he was going up the river was frozen up.

"We went up the river 30 miles, stranded on a sandbar, and lay there for 48 hours with ice floes pounding our sides," he said. "The second night one huge lump of ice tore some holes in the planking, and that ended our journey up stream. When we started to turn back to Dawson, however, we were in no better shape, the river freezing over and leaving us marooned. Our 125 passengers were taken to shore in an open boat, a somewhat dangerous proceeding, across 1,500 feet width of river which was filled with drifting ice."

"Dog teams were then sent for from Dawson, but when mine arrived we found the river ice so soft that my team, driver and baggage went through. We had to camp out under the stars that night with no blankets, little food, and a temperature of 20 below. Next morning we did a ten-mile hike to Dawson on half a frozen sandwich, and the following day saw me start off again by stage. I did 300 miles by stage, Concord coach and automobile to White Horse, where we reached the railway, and from there all was plain sailing."

Dr. Thompson stated he would ask the Government for a road from Dawson to White Horse, and for a small dredge to dredge out the Yukon sandbars.
