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WILSON'S CHANCES GOOD

The New York World sees no possibility that the election of a president will be thrown into the House of Representatives. It points out that it will require 266 electoral votes to choose a president, and 178 must be conceded to Governor Wilson at the outset. There 178 votes are represented by the States of Alabama, Arizona, Arkansas, Florida, Georgia, Kentucky, Louisiana, Maryland, Mississippi, Missouri, North Carolina, Oklahoma, South Carolina, Tennessee, Texas and Virginia.

That makes it necessary for Governor Wilson to win 88 out of the remaining 353 electoral votes. Twenty-nine of them can be found in New Jersey and Indiana, which are sure to go Democratic. Fifty-two more can be found in New York and Connecticut, which are reasonably certain to go Democratic. Nebraska, with 8 votes, would give Governor Wilson the necessary majority.

But Democratic prospects are much brighter than this. Mr. Bryan carried Colorado and Nevada in 1908. Governor Wilson is likely to carry them this year, with the addition of North Dakota. These three states have 11 electoral votes. Wilson's chances in Ohio are better than Taft's or Roosevelt's and Ohio has 21 votes. Senator Gardner predicts that Wilson will carry Maine, with 6 votes, and anybody familiar with political conditions in that state can regard this as an idle boast. In addition, Democratic prospects in Massachusetts are as good as any other prospects, and they are anything but discouraging in Pennsylvania. Massachusetts has 18 electoral votes and Pennsylvania has 38.

Any reasonable calculation based on the existence of a Republican party would give Wilson more than 300 electoral votes, but with the Republican party shot to pieces it is a question whether the warring Taft-Roosevelt forces will save anything of value from the wreck.

BOURASSA'S POSITION

It was not many moons ago that the entire Tory press was lauding Mr. Bourassa to the skies as a high-minded, patriotic gentleman of the loftiest personal integrity and unselfish ideals. That was when Mr. Borden was looking to him to loosen Laurier's hold on Quebec. Less than a week ago, The Toronto News thus discoursed concerning him in an editorial article:

"Mr. Bourassa continues to suggest annexation to the United States in order to extort additional privileges from French-Canadians who seem to have repudiated his leadership. The French people have no grievance in Canada. None of their constitutional rights have been or will be assailed. There will, however, be no new recognition of racial or sectarian demands in the interests of any element of the population. This new phase of Mr. Bourassa is interesting and significant. It is the way that all defeated leaders go in to the French province. When Poincaré declined in power and popularity he began to urge political union with the United States. When Mercier fell he sought to rise again by advocating independence and annexation. This way also goes Mr. Bourassa, who save in a stricter integrity, greatly resembles Mercier. It is the familiar device of plunging to save a losing business and going to complete ruin. By the way, it is remarkable how movements of secession and separation seem to spring from the ground when the federal Liberal party is out of office.

Everybody has read the story in the schoolbooks of the farmers' opposition to the first railway in England. Their concern then was the safety of their cattle. When asked whatever would happen if a cow were to stray on the railway line, George Stephenson replied—careless of the farmer's loss, but with a full confidence that the train would withstand the shock of collision—that it would be bad for the cow." A few days ago a bull ran amuck on the Grand Trunk railroad near Ingersoll, Ont., and, charging a freight train, derailed engine and eight cars. In this case it was "bad for the cow's brother," but worse for the train, and merciful that the collision was with freight and not passenger coaches.

Judge Keough of White Plains, N. Y., after a lengthy hearing has decided that Harry K. Thaw is insane and must remain in Mattaween asylum. The court held that his release would be dangerous to the public safety. Since his trial for the murder of Stanford White seven years ago when he was adjudged insane Thaw has expended nearly a million dollars in an effort to secure his freedom. Mr. William Travis Jefom was employed by the State to conduct the proceedings before Judge Keough and it looks as if he was in for a life job.

ROOSEVELT FORCES ORGANIZED

(Canadian Press.) Jacksonville, Fla., July 27—The Florida branch of the Roosevelt National Progressive Party is being organized along unique lines. By mutual agreement the white and negro followers of the movement are to organize and operate separately. A state mass convention of the "Lily Whites" will be held in Ocala today. This convention will select half of the allotted number of delegates to the national convention and it is said will nominate a complete state ticket. The negro branch of the party also will meet in state mass convention tomorrow at St. Augustine. This convention will select the other half of the delegation to Chicago.

SCOTTISH PEDAGOGUES TO VISIT CANADA

Glasgow, July 27—A large party of Scottish school teachers sailed on the Allan liner Scandinavian today for Quebec. The pedagogues plan to spend two weeks in Canada seeing the country and studying its educational methods. The places to be visited include Montreal, Ottawa, Toronto, Niagara Falls and Hamilton.

UNIONIST CANDIDATE WON

Crewe, England, July 27—The Unionist candidate, Ernest Craig was successful in the bye-elections held yesterday in this division of the County of Cheshire to fill the vacancy by the death of the Liberal member Walter S. B. McLaren. The counting of the votes was completed only today. The intervention of a labor candidate was responsible for the loss of the seat by the government. The figures were: Ernest Y. Craig, Unionist, 6,260; H. Murphy, Liberal, 5,294; J. Holmes, Labor, 2,485.

Mr. Craig the newly elected Unionist member, was unsuccessful at the last election, when he was defeated by the late Walter McLaren, the Liberal candidate, by a majority of 1,704.
